A few moments' thought could bring to mind the lives of many people who lost something very precious, and because of it, have made an outstanding contribution to society. Louis Braille, a blind Frenchman, invented a system whereby the blind could learn to read and write. That was nearly 150 years ago and it is still used by blind people for all languages. Francis Lyle returned to England from convalescing on the continent to discover that his beloved church was in theological chaos and disharmony. Out of his sorrow and heartbreak he wrote the hymn "Abide With Me" that has sung its way into thousands of discouraged souls, bringing hope and comfort. The same story could be told of education, music, sports, religion and almost every field of life.

It is good to be thankful for the beneficial things of life but it is a better discipline and a greater good to be thankful for the things we miss.

Forsyth and other members of the family. Miss Beatrice Gardiner has resigned Ebor, left this week for Winnipeg, where she intends joining the armed forces.

### 50 YEARS AGO (Oct. 19, 1922)

the Sinclair district were over 30 bushels to the acre for wheat, and oats, rye and barley also yielded well. Unfortunately the acreage was damaged by hail. The first snowfall of the season occurred on Saturday morning, later turning to rain. A second snow fall took place the next day. Farmers are busy fall plowing and as freeze-up comes how many acres will have to be left. Many farmers haven't harvested their potatoes as yet, and these will have to be left in the ground also. A number of members of the Oddfellows and Rebeccas Lodges motored to Melita on Tuesday for the district meeting. One car went out of commission on the trip over but managed to limp into town with a burnt out bearing. The G. S. Munro Co. are offering boys Heavy Tweed Overcoats at prices from \$12.50 to \$14.50 depending on the size.

### 60 YEARS AGO (Oct. 17, 1912)

Three years in succession we have been paying tax for fire and light and the lights have never been purchased by the committee. Now they are trying out a street light of the Moore type at the corner of Main Street and Railway Ave., and it appears to be satisfactory. Before installing more, the light will be given a thorough try-out as lights of the gasoline type have proven failures in many other towns. Various estimates have been made of the amount of wheat threshed, some say not more than 30 per cent—but 40 per cent is the general opinion. The wheat will average better than 25 bushels to the acre. Farmers who have stacked their grain were able to start threshing on Friday, while grain in the stock was not ready until Monday. The Lake of the Woods elevator at Bede is taking in a lot of grain this fall. N. J. Breen and his assistant are busy as proverbial bees. Rev. S. P. Riddell will give a magic lantern lecture in the Methodist Church on October 17th.

## The Editor's Jotbook

Had the unusual experience of seeing three coyotes the other night in the Woodnorth district. Either they were coyotes, or German Shepherds, but we believe they were the former. When we first saw their eyes

shining in the lights, thought they were deer, but we got closer and saw that they were coyotes. After spending Saturday hunting, we are more convinced than ever that the long season on upland game is unjustified. We saw two coveys of Hungarians, one with four birds and the other with about 20 and in all about 25 chickens, not very many for the area hunted. Seems to this observer that we have had more than our share of wind this fall. It seems that practically every day the wind blows at gale force. However, on the other hand it may be that we are getting older and our chill factor is lower. This is the kind of weather that a cab on a tractor or combine is a must. We noticed in our travels on Saturday that there are still a few fields of grain to be combined. We saw a couple of combines working and some flax fields that still had to be swathed. Mrs. Alma Henuet of Pipestone, harvested a 11½ pound turnip from her garden. Big enough for a whole meal, said Mrs. Henuet, even when the whole Henuet family was at home.

## Outdoors Only...

In more senses than one, leaves, colors, seasons and earth have turned. Two weeks have sharply turned the feel of fall to one of winter, now that trees are bare, colors are chiefly varieties of brown, and caps, coats and gloves are back in use. Many a shiver likely shook the daring on Monday when the chill breath of the North blew in and sent feet scurrying for shelter and warmth. How cars have turned us into crowds of softies! And so it's up the thermometers are turned.

Much change is going on in nature to prepare for a cooler season's effects around us. Hawks have gone, barring the few hardy Marsh Hawks, and Magpies have become prevalent again. Rodents appear little having moved to cover and burrowed quarters. Sap is thickening, slowly; cover tissues are toughening. Yet it was only recently that lively sightings occurred, even though they fore-described, warned changes related to ones

For example, on September 29 Jim and Don O'Rourke saw a pair of Bluebirds about three miles east of Woodnorth, ground-diving and sky-hopping

in a quest of food. Just two days previously George Dodds had had a view of a Bald Eagle in a tree at his place. This eagle may be one drifting slowly southward from the Qu'Appelle Valley or from the Duck or Riding Mountains. Then, October 2, Mrs. A. G. Senkbell saw and heard three, maybe four, Blue Jays in some trees at the farm. These birds are more usually found in heavier woods such as along the Pipestone Creek or the Souris River. Anyway, there they were: crested on the head; chattering together; and marked with blue, white and black.

October 4, Mrs. Burton Busby beheld the colorful sight of a cock Pheasant in the area of the farm. It's a satisfaction not only to see a member of this species but also to know that the species is becoming more wary of man. Few Pheasants are seen, yet evidence suggests there are many more in this district than there were a year ago.

Then, week ago Sunday, on the flats south-east of the former Agnew railway siding, we witnessed 1500 to 2000 Snow Geese and Blue Geese coming down to goasp and rest. At the south end of Oak Lake, over 100—maybe up to 200—Whistling Swans bugled on the pools, or lifted as leisurely winging fans. Geese and ducks were numerous, Lesser Yellowlegs were few, and Common Coots were uncommon, only one appearing. Another sighting of Snow Geese took place October 8 and 10, when Gwen and Debbie Jorgensen and Geordie Smith saw between three and four hundred of them land and rest on a stubble field about three miles west-northwest of Ebor.

Whooping Cranes have started arriving home at the Aransas Reserve in eastern Texas. A few more birds from the summer broods have further added to the gratifying and increasing number of Whooping Cranes.

Now that the middle of October has arrived, the time has come for loading up the bird-feeder trays and the suet logs. Raisins, chopped nuts, grain screenings, bread crusts and crumbs form a good beginning. These items may be supplemented by a few sunflower heads tacked up. Keep the feeders and trays clean & regularly checked and filled; for birds are creatures of habit and come to depend on regular sources of food. Try also to provide a degree of shelter for feeding birds at least; they are much more likely to be regular and entertaining visitors at your feeding-trays if protection is provided against wind, cats and sight of noisy and violent activity.

Next Sunday the moon will be at one of its closest points to the earth, only 222,600 miles away. How about a weekend trip?

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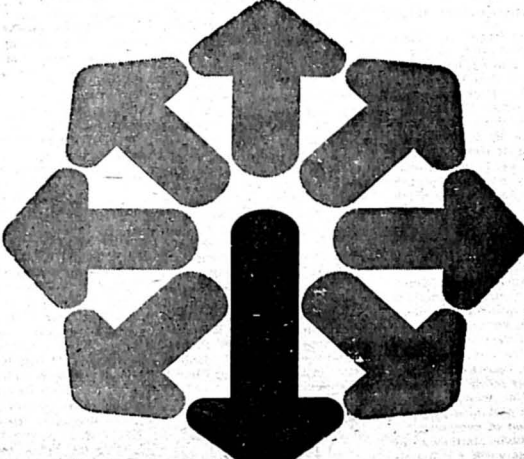
