The senior marketing partner for Woods, Gordon and Co., a firm of management consultants, Mr. Chown was well known in the city's business community. He is survived by his wife of 30 years, Tannis, and two children, Ed and Kirby.

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## Road building is discussed by Pipestone council

RESTON—The road building program for the coming season was discussed during the morning session of a special council meeting held on Thursday of last week with Reeve Carl Wedow in the chair and all members present.

It was decided that 9 1/2 miles of standard road would be built during the season, at a cost of approximately \$4,000.00 per mile and 3 1/2 miles of access road at a cost of approximately \$2,000.00 a mile.

It was also decided that one

mile of road would be clayed and 40 miles gravelled.

The afternoon session was concerned with road machinery and it was tentatively decided that the present equipment including the rubber tired Wagner unit, would be retained and consideration would be given to the purchase of a crawler type tractor in the 160 h.p. and up class.

Four machine companies, the Prairie Equipment and Radiator, Jim Reid of Winnipeg, representative; Powell Equipment, Orval Gustaf and Gerry McDonald of Brandon, representatives; Kane Equipment Co., Andy Mitchell of Brandon, representative and Construction Equipment, Gus Schully of Brandon, representative, made presentation to the council.

A decision was made to ask for firm prices on new and used crawler type tractors in the horse power range of 160 and up. A committee from the council made a trip to Winnipeg on Monday of this week to look over available machines.

## \$10,000 PROBLEM

The committee of the newly formed Reston Unincorporated Village District are facing a serious budget problem, because of the provincial government's ruling that all centres with more than 500 of a population must provide their own policing. If the population is below that figure policing is provided without cost through the province who have a contract with the R. C. M. P.

In Reston, who the population is just over the magic figure, the cost of an R. C. M. P. contract for a year is over \$10,000 and based on an assessment of approximately \$730,000.00 it will mean a mill rate of 14, quite a considerable figure.

## SAID IT ISN'T TRUE!

"Retire: small towns: chambers" a headline in the Winnipeg Tribune on Monday, makes one wonder why a local chamber, like the Reston Chamber of Commerce pays dues to support the provincial chamber of commerce, whose official position appears to be that of phasing out such communities.

If the Tribune's story is correct, the Chambers position arose from a conference dealing with rural life held in Brandon in February. We wonder how many people from the rural communities, which the Chamber would phase out, were present at the meeting.

The community concept recommended by the Chamber would have all services available within an hour's drive of any resident of the area. We wonder how many farmers, as an example, would appreciate driving one

protested to the provincial authorities, pointing out the injustice of the present policy. For example, a community of 1000 population with an assessment of over \$2,000,000 pays exactly the same amount for an R. C. M. P. contract.

Protests so far, have fallen on deaf ears, but certainly there is an injustice here. For instance, if Reston's population were to decrease only slightly then the province would provide the police protection.

Somewhere there must be a more equitable way of providing police protection—the same protection in one community costing 14 mills and in another where there should be more police work, because of a larger population, the cost is less than 5 mills.

My father, the late Wm. Forsyth, who oldtimers will remember as an occasional contributor to this paper had the gift of being able to put song and story into rhythm. He once wrote, justifying the stand of the allies in the first World War. Who will not yield to reason, yields to force, five nations said there is no other course.

And history has shown us that "The war to end wars", was only a continuation of past and future ones.

A Canadian who came from England in 1904 returned there, leaving Halifax on April 9, 1916. The convoy consisted of three troop ships and two destroyers. When out at sea they got word that submarines were on their track and were ordered to split up and try to outwit the subs. ## 1907 Auditor's report

RESTON—Tax collections for 1907 in the R.M. of Pipestone were \$24,080.62, according to a 1907 auditor's report, which is in the possession of John Berry. The report in the form of a 20 page booklet, was audited by John Turnbull and C. K. Newcombe.

Total receipts for the year, including a \$15,000.00 advance from the Union Bank of Canada and \$4359.86 collected on 1906 taxes, was \$44,343.07. Expenditures totalled \$41,940.95 including \$10,748.62 for schools.

The report shows assets of \$13,643.44 which includes uncollected taxes of \$11,358.38.

A detailed list of schools accounts which includes the municipal grant and special levy is as follows: Bardal \$306.40; Mayville \$469.20; Bellevue \$420.78; Prairie Rose \$740.34; Daybreak \$68.60; Sanderson \$153.60; Hillside \$380.00; Sproule \$265.20; Pipestone \$1761.50 (including cost of school by-law vote); Lanark \$560.00; Reston \$2465.60; Sinclair \$452.00; Hillview \$637.00; Humberton \$500.00; Elm Valley \$390.00; Lambton \$470.00; Ormo \$320.00; Crowell \$551.40.

The booklet lists in detail, tax refunds, accounts payable, salaries and fees; wolf bounty and interest account. All details of spending in each ward are listed separately.

During the year \$32.00 was expended on the Sinclair Cemetery and in the auditors' notes, special mention is made that in the case of Reston and Pipestone cemeteries neither revenue or expenditures are shown in the Sec-treasurer's books for the past two years.

Evidently there was a Smallpox Epidemic in Reston that year. Expenditures in connection with controlling it amounted to \$631.21 including \$177.00 paid to Dr. Chapman as Medical Health Officer.

## Inquiry into welfare policy announced

WINNIPEG—Appointment of Professor Clarence Barber, head of the Department of Economics, University of Manitoba, to conduct a systematic, independent inquiry into all major aspects of welfare policy and Canadian Assistance Plan regulations, has been announced by Premier Ed Schreyer.

The premier said the investigation will start immediately and is expected to be completed by October.

Prof. Barber, who has wide experience in directing economic research into national and provincial problems, will conduct the welfare survey as an independent consultant to the planning secretariat of the Planning and Priorities Committee of the Manitoba Cabinet. He will have a small staff to assist him in his work, together with technical support by the Department of Health and Social Development and other government agencies.

Premier Schreyer said the review would be wide-ranging, but particular areas to be covered would be:

\*The question of the reciprocal obligations between the individual and society in welfare matters, and the need for review of the methods by which reports of alleged welfare abuse are investigated.

\*A systematic survey and analysis of welfare statistics, with attention to each of the particular categories of assistance.

\*The pros and cons of various alternatives to some of the traditional categories of assistance.

\*The factors that have determined the path of welfare costs to the present, and the likely behavior of welfare costs in the future.

The social welfare review was forecast in the speech from the Throne at the opening of the current session of the Manitoba Legislature. The speech referred to the appointment of "a person with experience and reputation in systematic, scientific inquiry to investigate all major aspects of welfare policy and Canada Assistance Plan regulations."

Author of numerous economic studies and papers for governments and professional journals, Prof. Barber has been associated with the University of Manitoba since 1949 and is currently chairman of the university's Department of Economics. He obtained his B.A. from University of Philosophy (Economics) from the University of Minnesota in 1952.

He was commissioner of the Royal Commission on Farm Machinery from 1966 to 1970 and was director of research for the Royal Commission on Flood Control-Benefit, Province of Manitoba, 1957 to 1959.

"As a distinguished economist, with wide experience in scientific, systematic inquiry, Dr. Barber was an obvious choice for this inquiry into social welfare policy," said Mr. Schreyer.
