WINNIPEG-Appointment of Professor Clarence Barber, head of the Department of Economics, University of Manitoba, to con-duct a systematic, independent duct a systematic, independent inquiry into all major aspects of welfare policy and Canadian As-sistance Plan regulations, ha as been announced by Premier Ed Schreyer.

The premier said the investi-gation will start immediately and is expected to be completed by October.

by October. Prof. Barber, who has wide experience in directing economic research into national and prov-incial problems, will conduct the welfare survey as an indep-endent consultant to the planning and 'Priorities Committee of the Manitoba Cabinet. He will have o small'staff to assist him in his work, together with technical support by the Department of Health and Social Development and other government agencies.

Premier Schreyer said the re-view would be wide-ranging, but particular areas to be covered would be.

He ob-tained his BA. from University of Philosophy (Economics) from the University of Minnesota in 1952.

He' was commissioner of the Royal Commission on Farm Ma-chinery from 1066 to 1970 and was director of research for the Royal Commission on Flood Cost-Benefit, Province of Man-ltoba, 1957 to 1959.

"As a distinguished economist, with wide experience in scienti-fic, systematic inquiry, Dr. Bar-ber was an obvious choice for this inquiry into social welfare policy," said Mr. Schreyer.
