## Gordon McLaren laid to rest at Pipestone

PIPESTONE—Funeral service was held in the United Church on Friday, May 12th for Gordon McLaren, 88, who died in the Reston Community Hospital on May 10th. Rev. E. Schurman and Mr. H. H. Barkman officiated. The Pipestone Choir with Mrs. S. Campton, organist, were at

Mayville district with his parents in the early 90s.

Gordon farmed for most of his adult life, except for five years spent as a teacher. Education and anything he felt was for the betterment of the agriculture community was top priority with him.

He was a frequent contributor to many western papers and also wrote for the Family Herald, a weekly in Montreal devoted mainly to agriculture. He was a speaker and debater of great ability.

Local papers too, received many letters and contributions including reports of historical events and his signature will be missed by the readers of the Recorder and New Era.

He took an active part in many farm organizations and was a charter member of the United Farmers of Manitoba and a district director. This organization among other achievements was primarily responsible for the organizations of Co-operatives in the west.

He was a member of the Pipestone United Church.

Left to mourn are three sisters, Mrs. L. V. Hart, of Winnipeg, Mrs. Thos. Toppings, of Kipling, Sask., and Miss Emily at home. He was predeceased by a brother Thos. Ewing, killed in World War I, a brother Kenneth and sisters, Mrs. Wm. Forsyth and Miss Lily McLaren.

Burial was in the family plot at the Pipestone Cemetery with the pallbearers being: Terry Patmore and Mark Gould and grandnephews, Morley, Ken and Glen Forsyth.

## R. M. of Pipestone favors more use made of the seaport of Churchill

RESTON—The R. M. of Pipestone Council at an abbreviated meeting in the council chambers here on Thursday morning of last week, went on record as favoring the increased use of the Port of Churchill, and urged that both the provincial and federal ministers of agriculture investigate the matter.

Reeve Carl W. occupied the chair and for the first time in 18 years, Councillor and Deputy Reeve Harold Forde was not able to attend. Health reason was the reason for his absence.

Council decided that advertisements be placed in the Reston Recorder and Empire-Advance, Virden, to the effect that anyone carrying on a business within the boundaries of the Municipality and not paying a business tax is required to purchase a business licence.

Other actions of the Council included:

• The passing of a by-law setting the levies for the current year. (Outlined in the April 27 issue of the Recorder).

• Passed a by-law selling lot 27, block 11, plan 154 in Reston to Allan Bloomer.

• Asked the Manitoba Telephone System to raise the wires opposite the Cromer Rink as they too low for the grader to pass under.

• Set a wage of \$2.00 per hour for work done by municipal machinery operators when engaged in work other than operating their machines.

• Authorized the payment of accounts: General \$5,398.77 and Waterworks Operating \$2,428.10.

RESTON—Appearing before Magistrate Harry Forrest at Souris on Monday, May 15th were:

He was also charged of failing to comply with his probation and was given a three months jail term on each charge to run concurrent.

The charges arose as the result of lighting on April 15th on the Oak Lake Reserve where he used a broken beer bottle on Norris Eastman's face and also assaulted Duncan Fox, a taxi driver from Virden.

Grent Leslie Patterson, of Souris, Man., charged with break, enter and theft and with break and enter with intent was given a suspended sentence of six months on each and is on probation and good behaviour for this length of time.

The offence occurred on the Oak Lake Resort in which cabins were broken into in December of 1971. Two other parties will appear on June 19th in connection with these offences.

## PARENTS SHOULD QUIT SMOKING

Since evidence of the harmful effects of cigarette smoking is overwhelming, should it be legal to manufacture and sell them? Lots of people think not. But pause a moment. When liquor was banned in the early 1920's bootleggers grew rich on the increased consumption.

The same thing would happen today if cigarettes were prohibited. Illegal manufacturers would simply go underground and get wealthy while the death rate from smoking would rise like a sales graph.

Society cannot prohibit a person from taking his own life—suicide

was recently taken out of the Criminal Code—and we have seen what prohibition does. So, in the case of cigarettes, it seems that people will continue to follow the path of disaster.

However, we can protect our children from this evil. Better policing of the law regarding the sale of tobacco to minors is needed. This might mean more prosecutions of vendors, but more in-home examples of abstinence is a must.

Anyone with a lung problem as a result of being hooked on tobacco can find you in on its merits as a pacifier.

you may consider dull, commonplace, or unimportant may be just what other persons consider relevant, interesting, useful or important. Do make a point of reporting your sightings.

Swallows, sparrows, warblers, thrushes, sandpipers, ducks, geese, cranes, and more—they're all around. All it needs is eye and ear, maybe a pair of field glasses, oh, and of course some interest. So far one could believe that an immense amount of personal pleasure and inspiration is being allowed to go to waste out of doors.

Soon again, storms will flash on the prairie scene. Some will arise quite suddenly and strike unexpectedly. In this regard it may be well for us all to consider the following interesting, researched facts about lightning.

Lightning does strike the same place twice. The Empire State Building in New York is struck on an average of twenty-three times per year. Lightning does not always strike the tallest object. The Empire State Building, for example, has been struck fifty feet below the top. There is no thunder without lightning. For thunder is the noise created by lightning when its hot gases expand suddenly, violently. Hence, one may be far enough away not to receive the sound of thunder, but the flash will indicate the presence of thunder. Trees do not offer safe refuge from lightning. Most human deaths caused by lightning resulted from people who sought safety under trees. As many as one-third of these were golfers. If you swim during a storm, lightning striking the water nearby can electrocute you. Wearing rubber-soled shoes provides no safety from lightning; it is unaffected by such minimal insulation. You think airplanes in flight are secure from lightning? Wrong. On the average of once in every 5,000 to 10,000 hours of flying time, commercial planes are struck by lightning. Fortunately, almost all continue to fly. Lightning occurs not only in rainstorms but also in snowstorms, sandstorms, and even near atomic explosions and erupting volcanoes. Some think lightning has little to do with forest fires. Actually, facts show that each year about 10,000 forest fires are caused by lightning in the United States alone.

With reference to pipestone. Many kinds of red stone, from other deposits in North America, have been used for making pipes. Few of these stones, however, are as well known or as widely used as Minnesota pipestone.

The pipestone deposit is about

a foot thick and is made up of several beds lying between massive layers of an ancient formation, the Sioux quartzite. The exact origin of the pipestone is unknown. It is believed it was originally of a clay-like composition, buried between thick deposits of sandstone. The great weight of overlying beds, together with accompanying heat and associated chemical action, changed the sandstone to quartzite and the clay to what is now called catlinite.

The quartzite as seen today was once deeply buried. The earth's crust in that region was gradually lifted by earth forces so that most of the overlying rock was removed by erosion. This erosion brought the pipestone or catlinite within a few feet of the surface of the ground.

Nearly 8 feet of quartzite must be removed to reach the pipestone. Indians alone mine the pipestone, using only simple hand tools to remove the overburden; explosives may not be employed since their force would shatter the pipestone.

Returning to our local activity, here is a message that, it is hoped, safety-loving parents will pass along to their outdoors-loving children. Sidewalks are for pedestrians—not for cyclists. The left-hand side of the road, facing on-coming traffic, is for pedestrians—not for cyclists.

C. Forsyth read the presentation address and Mr. Wm. Cooper made the presentation.

20 YEARS AGO (May 22, 1952)

The store at Nottingham, Sask., belonging to Murray Duncan, was completely destroyed by fire on Sunday afternoon. It also housed the post office and living quarters. Coring is underway at the Karpinski well in the Sinclair district and it is reported that there is a good oil show. The Reston Baseball Club are sponsoring a sports day on June 9th when \$200.00 will be offered in baseball prizes. This is the third to be sponsored by the Club, the first two not doing too successful financially. Dr. C. E. Bradley, now in training in St. Boniface Hospital, Winnipeg, will arrive in Reston the first week in June to commence practising his profession, it was reported at a meeting of the Reston Hospital Board on Tuesday. A total of 2046 had chest x-rays when the mobile X-ray unit visited Pipestone Municipality. This is just less than three-quarters of the population.

30 YEARS AGO (May 21, 1942)

All the present school staff at Reston are leaving and the trustees are faced with the task of filling the position. When teachers are doing a good job it is well to reward them with more than just words of praise. It is regrettable but true that the teachers are the poorest paid professionals in our province. Practically all wheat seeding in this district was completed last week and the farmers are now busy seeding flax and other coarse grains. The early sown wheat is up and showing good growth. Classes are being organized at Pipestone to give the women and girls some training in nursing the sick and injured. This training will be in charge of three nurses, Mrs. Hewitt, Mrs. A. Grant and Miss Ethel McLachlan. The following from Antler had dinner together in Toronto on Mother's Day: Pies, Doug Brown, Keith Dyon, Clarence Borreson, Jack Down, Harvey Brown, Gordon and Arthur Leverton. Pte. Percy Reid from Red Deer, Alta., is visiting at his home at Pipestone for the week.

40 YEARS AGO (May 19, 1932)

Along with other deductions in wages paid, teachers' salaries are being cut in nearly every part of the province. Unless this is done many of the schools would have to close for a portion of the year. R. Mazur of the Clover Hill district, has purchased a Ford coupe which was previously owned by Mr. Thoms. At a meeting held recently in Reston it was decided that some improvements should be made at the swimming hole in the Pipestone Creek near the C.P.R. bridge and anyone interested is asked to join the boys at that point on Saturday morning when the work will be done. Saturday was one of the windiest this spring and clouds of dust permeated the air all day. At night the weather turned cold and on Sunday overcoats and sweaters were again quite necessary. E. H. Berry is offering Gutta Percha tubes with prices ranging from \$4.20 for a 30 x 3 1/2 to \$8.40 for a 500 x 20.

50 YEARS AGO (May 18, 1922)

The young people of Ewart held a meeting on May 6th and organized a Tennis Club with

Miss Frances McMunn as president and Miss Grace Patterson, sec-treas. Owing to the rainy weather the seeding has been delayed this week, but with favorable weather all the seeding could be completed by next week. After many delays, caused by the material being lost enroute and later the rainy weather, the Reston Hardware Co., got their block underway on Monday and good progress is being made with the building. It has taken 6000 years to convince man that the pen is mightier than the sword but it has only taken about 6 days of wet weather to convince the average farmer that the horse is mightier than the car! On Thursday next a special Agriculture Train will be at Pipestone with lectures at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. The train carries live stock, labor saving devices for the farm and home and in addition, displays movies for the children and parents. Experts from the various branches of the Agricultural College accompany it.

60 YEARS AGO (May 16, 1912)

Ballasting of rail line between Reston and Antler will be done this summer in preparation for the laying of heavier steel. The Arlington House (now Pipestone Hotel) is undergoing complete renovation. The general proprietor is busy wielding the paint and kalsomine brush. A tight board fence is also being erected around the premises. After boring for 300 feet and not finding water, it was decided to try a new place. Mr. Bolton of Reston, has located several streams and his judgment will be put to the test—Ewart News. C. C. Campbell of Reston, has built an addition to his house. The new part will be used as an office. A. E. Bridgett went to Virdeon on Saturday and returned to Pipestone driving his new Mitchell car. Those who have ridden in it speak enthusiastically of its silent riding qualities, its easy control and its speed. The Agricultural College train will be at Sinclair from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and at Reston from 2 to 5 p.m. on June 1st.

### No livestock entries at Brandon Exhibition

BRANDON — For one year, and one year ONLY, there will be no livestock entries at the Provincial Exhibition of Manitoba, August 7th to 12th, 1972.

Long a major event of Manitoba's major agricultural show, the livestock classes have been cancelled for 1972 due to the major construction now under way on the Keystone Centre and its supporting buildings. The Keystone, a \$4,000,000 home for agricultural and industrial displays, is now more than half-complete. The completion date for the 5,000 seat arena and show ring is September 15 of this year. The supporting structures including convention and display areas, will be ready for the '73 edition of the Royal Manitoba Winter Fair.

The Provincial Exhibition board was faced with one of two choices: reduce the show in size and number of classes and attempt to operate it in the area now under construction; or to cancel it entirely for one year. All breed associations and exhibitors have been advised of the one-year curtailment. Thro' Keystone, and greatly-expanded barn and show ring facilities, livestock shows in future years will be considerably expanded.
