But consider: Dr. Norman Al-the Canadian nuclear physicist cock, the Canadian nuclear physicist who gave up a promising career in 1959 to found the Canadian Peace Research Institute, has been studying human conflict ever since. He says the world is getting better, although "so slowle."

world is getting better, althougn so slowly." Alvin Toffler, author of the best selling book 'Future Shock' says: "I'm optimistic about many things people are pessimistic about. For example, I do not believe for instant that people are in danger of being enslaved by the machines." But he added: "I'm also pessimistic about some things most of the people haven't begun to think a-bout (such as dwindling resources in a time of cancerous population growth.) A report by an Ontario Govern-

ment agency a few years ago perhaps best summed up the progress we en-joy today. "Then man did the work of machines. Now it is the time for him to do the work of human beings."

An ordinary Canadian today has personal comfort, has a freedom from personal contrort, has a freedom from the fear of instant mysterious death, has a long life expectancy, has access to knowledge and music and news and other people, and has an ability to tra-vel that no king or emperor, had, thr-ough all the ages.

Yes, the world is getting better. But we must be wise enough to see that it is at the same time getting worse, and is in serious danger. Our top priority should be to use our knowledge to change the things we can so that the world will become where it

become better in those areas where it is now slipping. We are not powerless, we can do something to make the world safe and joyful home for the children of today and tomorrow.

> Editor, Reston Recorder Sir:

This is an unrecorded incident a the winter of 1934-35.

In the winter of 198453. There was very little snow that winter-there is a large poplar bluff on the northwest corner of our half section-lit was inhabited by Jack Rabbits in large numbers. You could see a bunch of Jack Rabbits running across the snow-they were be-ing chased by coyotes. From the farm yard they looked like a small flock of white sheep. It is still a mystery what made the still a mystery what made Jack Rabbits so thick that ter.

We had loose hay on the feed yard about one hundred feet from the barn. We had a small stack of hay in the feed yard and rabbits started to eat the dry hay so I put the hay in the barn loft.

the barn loft. There was a market in Winn-ipeg for frozen Jack Rabbits, 13c a rabbit I believe. Frank Pat-more came one afternoon to shoot rabbits, He had a .22 cal-ibre Winchester repeater. The magazine held eight cartridges, he emptied it and shot six rab-bits.

Further I got two loads of green oat hay from George Fair-lie. I had to cover the hay with rotten frozen straw out of an old stack bottom.

It is worth recording that where there was a patch of vol-unteer sweet clover the rabbits did not eat it. They did not eat any of the patches of Russian thistle. In the spring of 1933 you could have picked up a wagon load of dead rabbits killed by some disease.

Mother never would cook Jack Rabbits or allow them to be Rabbits cooked to feed the hens. Before, our folks left the East she would not cook any of the Eastern Bush Rabbits. Gordon McLaren
