IS THE WORLD GETTING BETTER?

Is the world getting better? When you look at recent wars, the zooming population, the rise in crime, and at people being torn in confusion from their moorings, it is easy to answer "no."

But consider: Dr. Norman Alcock, the Canadian nuclear physicist who gave up a promising career in 1959 to found the Canadian Peace Research Institute, has been studying human conflict ever since. He says the world is getting better, although "so slowly."

Alvin Toffler, author of the best selling book 'Future Shock' says: "I'm optimistic about many things people are pessimistic about. For example, I do not believe for instant that people are in danger of being enslaved by the machines." But he added: "I'm also pessimistic about some things most of the people haven't begun to think about (such as dwindling resources in a time of cancerous population growth.)"

A report by an Ontario Govern-

ment agency a few years ago perhaps best summed up the progress we enjoy today. "Then man did the work of machines. Now it is the time for him to do the work of human beings."

An ordinary Canadian today has personal comfort, a freedom from the fear of instant mysterious death, has a long life expectancy, has access to knowledge and music and news and other people, and has an ability to travel that no king or emperor had, through all the ages.

Yes, the world is getting better. But we must be wise enough to see that it is at the same time getting worse, and is in serious danger.

Our top priority should be to use our knowledge to change the things we can so that the world will become better in those areas where it is now slipping. We are not powerless, we can do something to make the world safe and joyful home for the children of today and tomorrow.

PLEASE DON'T CHANGE THE NAME

On the subject of the RCMP we would like to draw the attention of our readers to the movement afoot by some federal efficiency "experts" to change the name of our most honorable and respected police force to something other than Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

You may have noticed that there has already been one change made in the identification of the RCMP patrol cars. The familiar white crest has blossomed out in several colors and the large letters R. C. M. P. which used to be located under it have been replaced with the word POLICE and under that is the full name of the force in both English and French.

There are some who would like to drop the words Royal and Mounted from the name. While it is true that the Mounties are no longer mounted (on horses at any rate) a change in name at this point would be nothing less than blasphemous. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police is known

throughout the world and holds the respect of people everywhere. Within two years the force will celebrate its 100th anniversary and the years of tradition and honest service mean too much to be cast aside so casually. To call the Mounties simply "Canada Police" or some such other connotation would not command the same respect at all.

The people in the west provinces feel very strongly about this matter and already massive protests have been organized in some localities. In Edmonton 15,000 people signed a telegram petitioning the federal government against any change of name. Our readers can help, too, by letting their thoughts be known to their member of parliament. In this case "A rose by any other name" does not smell as sweet. When 100 years of faithful service has been carried out in that name it deserves to be preserved as something good.

Outdoors Only . . .

If temperature is any indication of the springing of spring, then last weekend and days following it were a beginning leap toward that season. When a canoe is needed to ford the lake between the street and the Reston post office, it is another sure sign that the slushy season is slipping towards us with sudden certainty.

Even though time yet permits possible blizzards, let alone icy nights, the arrival last week of common spring birds made winter a fading fellow for some.

On March 10, Conrad Barkman saw a Crow flying eastward over the family farm. The same day, Mr. George Toews, Grant and Kelly observed another Crow 10 miles east of Carberry. March 11, Mr. Reg Berry sighted a lone Crow sailing in the morning over Reston. That day, too, Murray and Bob Jago witnessed two Crows in the act of sitting on top of a Blackbilled Magpie and giving it merry heck. The Magpie escaped but in a bedraggled and staggering manner. March 12, we saw our first Crow at the nuisance ground in the company of about 80 Common Starlings. The same morning, Mark Gould sighted three Cawyers (one who saws is a sawyer, hence one that caws is a cawyer) over the home farm. Moreover, as though not to be outdone by the black fellows, one Mountain Bluebird showed up on Highway 252 South for Mrs. Ross Gould and Mark, Sunday, on the way home from Church. Sunshine, Crows and Bluebird—what better way to signal the

birth of Spring!

Reports of Ring-necked Pheasant are trickling in from different quarters, and it is welcome news to receive and comment on. Provided that conditions and circumstances remain favorable for this species, including non-molestation by trigger-happy gun-toters, the year may come again when hunters may enjoy a local season for Pheasants. Otherwise, the species will need all possible protection in order for it to survive as a scarce member of the natural environment.

A fragment of this environment was observed last Sunday when a hen Pheasant and two Sharp-tailed Grouse appeared, foraging, on a lone roadside mound. Disturbed by the passing car, the Grouse fled to bluff cover while the Pheasant sped to concealing brush bordering the bluff.

Longer daytime and higher temperatures are making definite changes in the presence of Horned Larks, too. Whereas on March 11, twenty-six miles of driving produced an average of 4.53 Horned Larks observed per mile, within twenty-four hours of a count in the same general area was up to 10.14 Horned Larks observed per mile.

This is a time when interested persons may be getting nest boxes ready for spring migrants. Barn Swallow, House Wren, Chickadee, Bluebird, Robin, Oriole, Purple Martin, Western Kingbird, Yellow-shafted Flicker and many, many other species are known to use nest boxes. If you need information about nest box building, a very useful booklet, called Nest Boxes for Birds, may be obtained for \$6 cents (1965) from Black Bond Books in Brandon, or from the Queen's Printer, Winnipeg, Manitoba. I have some copies of Bluebird House Dimensions available free on request.

Tribute to Catherine Lothian

In the passing of Catherine Lothian in Victoria, B. C. on Feb. 17, 1972. There are a few of the old friends still living who will pause and think of the happy associations in the early pioneer days, and it is with a feeling of sadness when we realize that Kate, as she was most generally known, is the last of a family circle of six.

Her father the late Wm. Lothian came to Canada '81, her mother as a bride came in 1883. There were four children born to the couple, Norman 1884 who married the former Miss Margaret Lorimer, of Hamilton in 1912. He died in 1940 at his home in Vancouver at 65 years of age. His widow still resides in Vancouver. Catherine 1885-1972, age 86 years 5 months. Geoffrey 1887, married Miss Irene Crawford, Pipestone in 1915, died in 1958, age 71. Robert, the youngest son born in 1889, gave his life in the First Great War. He died at Ypres, France on April 3rd, 1916, aged 27 years.

They were all born on the homestead north of Pipestone now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Russell Elliott.

Kate grew up in a good farm home environment and as years went by got her public school education in Pipestone and was associated with Church, Sunday School and all activities with the community young folks. When finished school she attended a ladies college in Winnipeg studying arts and specializing in China painting. She also took piano and vocal training being a fine singer.

Returning to her home she remained with her parents until 1913 when they decided to retire to Victoria, B. C. to enjoy the remainder of their declining years on that beautiful island. Kate went with them helping and caring for them until their passing, first her mother in 1934 at 84 years and her father a few years later at 88.

When they became settled in their new home and away from the many farm duties Kate decided to make her China painting a life work and more than just a hobby. She procured a kiln, a potter's wheel and all necessary equipment for her work, fashioning her own vessels and finishing them entirely. She had a ready sale for all her work.

The clay necessary for the project was procured from B. C. Alberta and Saskatchewan and she said Manitoba clay could be used if it were not for the distance away. Her home was adorned with her work from the kiln and lovely pictures that she painted. For years she had a class of pupils in her work and continued almost to the last when she gradually lessened owing to declining strength and ability.

She made many trips back to her beloved farm home where for years brother Geoffrey had carried on. She was always so happy to meet again the friends she had left. She made four trips to Scotland during her life, two with the family and two visits after she was left alone.

Kate never married, but although she was not to know the joy and the cares of marital

life yet she loved the family home and children of those around her and made up for what she did not have by almost adopting her brother Geoffrey's six children and was so interested in them. There were one boy and five girls, all are married.

Bob and wife Jean, with two daughters and one son, Winnipeg, Beth (Mrs. D. Martin), of London, England, one son; Kay (Mrs. M. McGuire) Montreal, one daughter; Norma (Mrs. L. Tock) Winnipeg, one son and one daughter; Wilma (Mrs. W. Henderson) Winnipeg, one daughter; Margaret (Mrs. W. Tod), Saskatoon, two daughters and one son.

They are all the survivors of the Lothian family. To them all we express our sympathy in the passing of a dear and devoted Aunt Kate. And so another chapter of the past has ended and we pay tribute to life well spent and to one who was always thinking of others and loved by all who knew her.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Pipestone, March 2nd, 1972

Editor, Reston Recorder

Sir:

This is an unrecorded incident in the winter of 1969-70.

There was very little snow that winter—there is a large poplar bluff on the northwest corner of our half section—it was inhabited by Jack Rabbits in large numbers. You could see a bunch of Jack Rabbits running across the snow—they were being chased by coyotes. From the farm yard they looked like a small flock of white sheep. It is still a mystery what made the Jack Rabbits so thick that winter.

We had loose hay on the feed yard about one hundred feet from the barn. We had a small stack of hay in the feed yard and rabbits started to eat the dry hay so I put the hay in the barn loft.

There was a market in Winnipeg for frozen Jack Rabbits, 13¢ a rabbit I believe. Frank Patmore came one afternoon to shoot rabbits. He had a 22 calibre Winchester repeater. The magazine held eight cartridges, he emptied it and shot six rabbits.

Further I got two loads of green oat hay from George Fairlie. I had to cover the hay with rotten frozen straw out of an old stack bottom.

It is worth recording that where there was a patch of volunteer sweet clover the rabbits did not eat it. They did not eat any of the patches of Russian thistle. In the spring of 1933 you could have picked up a wagon load of dead rabbits killed by some disease.

Mother never would cook Jack Rabbits or allow them to be cooked to feed the hens. Before our folks left the East she would not cook any of the Eastern Bush Rabbits.

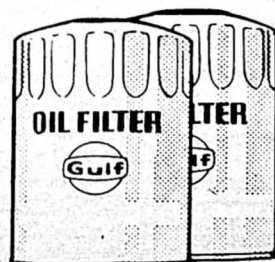

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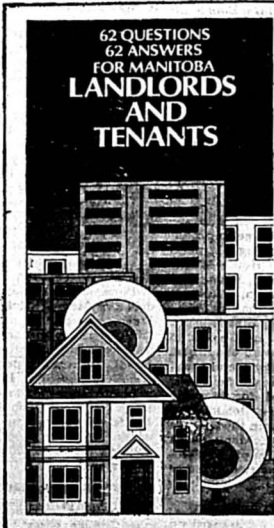
