## RECORDER IN 67th YEAR

Another year has gone by and in July of this year the Recorder will celebrate its 67th year. We cannot say that we start the year with great optimism, for the weeklies have suffered greatly in recent years. The prophesy of an eastern publisher, made some years ago, to the effect that the only weekly editor to be seen in the future will be stuffed and on display in a museum may yet, unfortunately, come true.

Somehow we feel more optimistic than that, but there certainly has been tremendous changes in the publishing business and the letterpress system of printing is being phased out to be replaced by a system called offset printing. This may be in the long run the salvation of the weekly newspapers.

## POSTAL SYSTEM MODERNIZED?

One sometimes just what has happened to our postal system, which was "revolutionized" during the brief sojourn in the exalted office of Postmaster - General by the Hon. Eric Kierans.

During this period, many of the small post offices were closed as an economy measure, to be replaced, in most cases, by a rural delivery system which costs more than it did to keep the small offices open. Fortunately the practise of forcibly closing of the small offices has been halted.

Another step introduced during the modernization period was the "terrific" accomplishment, of a three day mail service between nearby Sask-

atchewan and Manitoba towns (and we assume this also applies to other provincial borders). You could in the unlighted days mail a letter in Reston and have it in the hands of the addressee in Antler in a little more than an hour.

And the powers that be decided that the mail service should be suspended for five days during the Christmas holidays and to add insult to injury, when the postal service resumed after the three day New Year's week-end the postal rates jumped to 8c for first class mail from 7c.

## Outdoors Only . . .

The holiday week between Christmas and New Year's Day was a suitable time for many things to be done, but which probably weren't, eh? In Ramblers' case, the thing done most often was driving. The final drive of the busy week was likely the most interesting one of the lot, for events along the way—that of the Annual Bird Count.

Circumstances dictated that the event had to happen on New Year's Day. With a clear sky, light west wind, temperature ranging between 16 and 24 degrees above, and a snow covering averaging around two inches on open areas, January 1 proved to be an excellent day for the bird count. Excluding a break for lunch, 6 hours and 35 minutes were spent covering 98 miles by car and under a quarter mile on foot. The route was 15 miles across with its centre at the junction of Highways No. 2 and 252 North. Three eager observers checked open prairie stretches, bluffs, farmsteads and woods along the Pipestone.

The reader may well wonder what this mad chase produced. Actually it produced the best Christmas Bird Count in 10 years of counts. Common Redpolls (440), House Sparrows (347), Black-billed Magpies (45), Black-capped Chickadees (31), Pine Grosbeaks (21), Snow Buntings (17), Rock Doves (1), produced major counts of the day. Members of usual winter species added to the count. Of special interest, however, were two sightings of Rusty Blackbird (3) at Art Wilkin's farm, Ring-necked Pheasant (3), White-winged Crossbill (1), Hoary Redpoll (5), Blue breasted Nuthatch (2), White Jay (1) at Bill Matthews's, Horned Lark (6) on the highway near Bill Bullock's and the Ruffed Grouse (1) in the willows south of the Reston cemetery. These counts added up to a grand total of 956 birds, representing 22 different species.

A rather notable sight was that of about 240 Common Redpolls in swirling congregations on the sunflower field of the Tom Forsyth farm. Similarly notable were the Horned Larks, but the waning afternoon sun and the movement of the birds made it difficult to find out whether they were Northern Horned Larks or wintering Prairie Horned Larks. Observers are urged to report all sightings of Blue Jays and Horned Larks to Ramblers; these species are too uncommon to be left unobserved or uncounted. This applies to Snowy Owls, too, please.

North of Cromer recently, two coyotes were observed about 25 yards from the road, casually sitting on their haunches and observing the passing observers. These two beautifully furred specimens moved off just as casually and in no hurry when we backed up to take a closer look.

The caroler's blit about the participation in a pear tree is dull by comparison with the recent close sight of a Ruffed Grouse in a willow tree, unharmedly nipping off dormant buds. What a tasty dish to behold! The same occasion, a snowy Owl truly living up to its name appeared near Barre's corner, perched facing the sun in its alert watch for

restless prey. Sky observers can enjoy the sight of three easily seen planets these evenings. At 6 p.m. Venus is brilliant in the southwest Mars is directly south about half way up the sky, and Saturn, the ringed planet, appears a little south of east at a similar level to that of Saturn. Two eclipses of the moon and the sun will take place this month. However, only one of them—a total eclipse of the moon on January 30—will be seen in North America, the other visible only in Antarctica. More details will be given in a later column.

Just heard on the National News: 60,000 snowmobiles are in operation in Alberta; wild game may suffer as a result of snowmobile harassment; and 6 more people died as the result of snowmobile accidents over last week end.

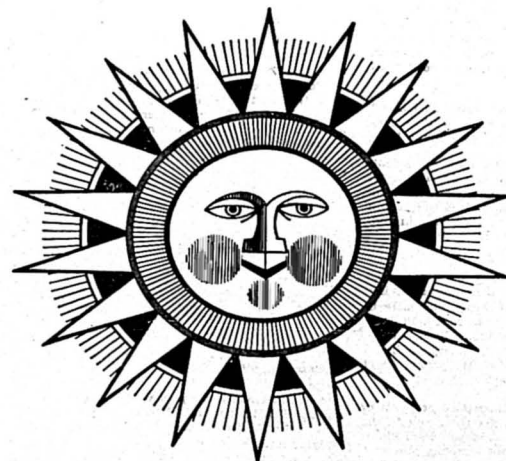
