# Experiences at Music Camp

We will never know just what the Wolseley Constituency lost when they landslided Izzy Asper into the Legislature, but it is becoming fairly obvious now w hat they gained. If nothing else Manitoba politics has gained some color, and more specifically the opposition has gained a personality to coanter-balance the outspokeness of the Joe Borowski's and Howard Paulley's on the other side. As has been observed already Izzy Asper comes to the Legislature with a little of the idealism that characterizes modern young politicians. And what is more important he enters the legislature totally dedicated to the

the legislature totally dedicated to the growth of the Manitoba sector of private investment.

As he frankly stated during a pre-election speech, Manitoba's economy is in trouble, but not as yet insoluble trouble.

With the exception of Boeing and the Federal Mint, he continued, no major industries have located in Winnipeg during the last three years. And how we must use every known technique to stimulate our growth, and get us back on an equal parity basis.

basis.

"The poor keep getting poorer, and the rich keep getting poorer", he

chuckled re-phrasing an old cliche. Be-coming serious again he explained how the Legislature had to take a non-party approach to the problem. It is not important now who is to blame, he said, only that we begin to face the problem.

Probably after Asper endures a lengthy session with his fellow MLA's his enthusiasm may dwindle and his passion for ethics disappear. But until then governing could be a very refreshing game, for everyone involved.

At any rate he is already gearing his troops for the coming election, with confidence bolstered by their success in Wolseley.

Some critics felt that Asper won only because he was the party leader displaced from the Legislature. While still others found his Liberaliers distributed by the control of the co ism a distinctive alternative to social-

ism. Anyway the vote of confidence for the Liberals was just the incentive the members of an on-the-way-out party needed. Previously to the lection the Liberals were slowly being phased out of the provincial political scene. But whether or not this phasing activity has just been momentarily stalled remains to be seen.

A slightly flexible cane moved with little effort down into two of the holes to its full length, held below ground level. This showed that two holes or tubes extended at last three and a half feet into the ground. A branching tube marked ont of the minones.

Moisture of the ground, due to rain prior to the lightning flash, may have accounted for the great puff of steam and/or smoke that Mr. Van Buuren had seen from a long distance to rise suddenly from the point of contact. ### 30 Years Ago Aug. 13, 1942

The first cutting and threshing of the 1942 crop was noted on Thursday about three miles due east of Pipestone where a machine was busy in barley field. A 17-day chicken shooting season was okayed by the game branch and approvide by order-of-council last week. Morning fogs and heavy dews are the order of these days. Farmers are of the opinion that these are conducive to hasten damage by rust. Quite a number of milking machines have been sold and installed by farmers in this district. The government has received resolutions from boards of trade school boards, and annual meetings of rate-payers recommending that consideration be given to releasing older students from the schools for the purpose of assisting in the harvest.

### 40 Years Ago Aug. 11, 1932

Further reduction in the prospective yields of crops over large areas in the south and central portions of the prairies has been caused by continuence of hot, dry weather...A public loan of from 150 to 200 million dollars will be floated by the Bennett government this fall to meet the costs of unemployment and the 1932 Canadian National Railway deficit. # West - Man Regional Developement Corporation emphasize on Agriculture

RESTON—A report formulat-ed by the West-Man Develop-ment Corporation has placed an emphasis on agriculture in the development of the Reston dist-

riet.

In a ten-page brief submitted to the Manitoba provincial government development agency lists the districts sailest in areas proviously surveyed. Also contained in the district development paper are number of proposals set forth for government consideration.

The briefs refers to egriculture as "one of the most important industries in Western Manitoba" and suggests that the inclusions in the surveyed of t

a" and suggests that the in-ry "should have a large ustry "should have a large ortion of the government con-ideration in any change taking lace in Western Manitoba".

The study propose that:

1. More selling effort be made
in purchasing countries for all
agriculture products especially
wheat.

2. From the result of more selling effort we believe that better facilities for handling these products must receive a greater portion of available study and finances.

greater portion of available study and finances.

The proposal calls for more use of present branch these and an effort to develop Chuicefull. The possibility of overseas atorace areas for Canadian graha should be explored and there should be explored and there should be consequently as the consequently as

be explored and there should be more producer participation on the Wheat Board.

3. We would like to see more detailed understandable information of the Broomhill aquifer and would like the government to explore as near as possible the extent of its area with a view to irrigation for special crops.

4. The government investigate the high cost of farm repairs and

Community Services — West-Man proposes that support for the outlying hospitals and medical services be continued and asked that a thorough investigation into the costs of health services and drugs be conducted. They also asked the government for information concerning the establishment and maintaining of a community library.

Transportation—The development corporation proposes that every effort be made to maintain the present rail services for heavy freight and gain shipments. They also asked the government to lay deep heavy pave-

heavy traffic use.

Education—The corporation encourages the use of the present school plants, heated for 3800 hours per year and used for only 1890. They ask for greater publicity for present courses available under the adult education program and ask the government to cease the sinction of consolidation of rural achicols unless no other course is available.

Proposals for industrial development, medical and elderly people and soil use and conser-vation were contained under the previous eight headings.
