F. R. Manning named chairman of Fort La Bosse Board for third year

VRIDEN—F. R. Manning was elected chairman of the Fort La Bosse School Division at the inaugural meeting held on January 7th. Mr. Manning thus becomes the first chairman of the division as a unitary system. The division became unitary on January 1, 1972 and is now responsible for all education from Kindergarten to Grade XII in the division. Mr. Manning was the chairman of the board for two years prior to the division becoming unitary.

D. S. McDonald was elected vice-chairman, a position he held for two years with the non-unitary system.

Oaths of office were taken by Peter A. Klassen, Kola, who was elected in October to represent Ward 1; D. C. M. Elliott, Virden, who was appointed to fill a vacancy in Ward 2; and C. O. Mothral, Oak Lake who was re-elected in Ward 3. Other members on the board include H. T. Hayhurst of Cromer, Ward 3 and Adam Turbeck of Kirkella, Ward 1.

The Board of Trustees and the secretary-treasurer, K. G. Runions, were unable to reach an agreement on the annual salary and, as a result, the Board decided to advertise for a secretary. Mr. Runions is acting in the interim.

Other appointments for the year 1972 include the firm of Morrow-Leckie & Co. as auditors and the law firm of Buckingham, Toews and Smeltz as solicitors.

The Board approved By-Law No. 1/72 re school borrowing and By-Law No. 2/72 re trustees' indemnities. The latter was set at \$1,000 for the chairman and \$750 for the trustees, plus mileage at 10c a mile.

Regular meeting nights have been set for the second and fourth Mondays of the month. Other meetings at the call of the chair.

At a special meeting held on December 29, Ken Seaford, of Virden was appointed to the position of Supervisor of Transportation and Maintenance of Buildings with duties commencing January 3, 1972.

At the first regular meeting of the new year the Board approved the recommendation that the Kinsmen School for the mentally handicapped become part of the Goulter School for administration purposes.

In other business, the Board decided to advertise for a custodian at the Oak Lake Assiniboine School.

Decided to award a bus route contract to Hartley Opper in the Lenore area.

Decided to employ native paraprofessionals in those division schools where the Indian pupil enrollment is sufficient and where the Indian parents have requested such help. The Federal and Provincial governments share in the approved salary costs of such paraprofessionals.

Approved payment of accounts in the amount of \$8,400.02.

Requested the chairman and vice-chairman to bring in a recommended roster for committees at the next regular meeting.

Transformer station opened at Pierson

WINNIPEG—Manitoba Hydro has completed construction of a new transformer station about three miles east of Pierson. The new station has a capacity of 3,000 kilowatts and will improve voltage regulation and service reliability in the Pierson and Lytton areas. Customers in these districts are presently supplied from a substation at Melita.

The new wood pole station reduces the 66,000 volt transmission line voltage to 12,000 volts for distribution to villages and farm customers in the southwest corner of Manitoba. It will relieve the electrical load on the Melita station which is presently near capacity. Estimated cost of the new facility is about \$70,000.

SO, THEN WHAT?

A highly respected columnist in a Winnipeg daily paper who writes entertainingly on current happenings round and about, usually tackling vexed problems and coming up with provocative solutions on this and that — (often, it is suspected with tongue in cheek) — discourses on the galloping trend toward government's confiscatory taxation, and winds up some noteworthy paragraphs like so:

"If it becomes impossible" (to save money and invest in something to give a living and get off a payroll)

"we might as well give up the ghost and all go live on welfare. Then what would the politicians do?"

It's a tempting solution. But like many armchair solutions to pressing problems of the day, it's about as useful as tossing both ends of a rope to a drowning man.

For one thing, if everybody downed tools, politicians in power wouldn't be able to collect any taxes — there'd be no money for "welfare" — and then what would we all do?

NEED CO-OPERATION

In view of the lamentations inside and outside government over the War Measures Act as a vehicle for controlling public disorder in peacetime, it is surprising that very little of a constructive nature has been proposed since Montreal's trouble of a year ago.

Criminologist Brian Grossman of the University of Saskatchewan has done some positive thinking on the issue. His ideas should provide at the very least a starting point in getting something done.

Grossman believes the Criminal Code is more than adequate to handle politically-motivated crimes and disorder — although conventional criminal procedures covering bail and habeas corpus may be inadequate to cope with imminent collective violence.

He proposed an amendment to the code to make emergency procedures available in a jurisdiction when a provincial premier declares a state of emergency and requests the aid of federal authorities, as in Quebec in October 1970.

The procedures would grant police powers of search, seizure, and arrest without warrant. But those detained would have to be charged within 24 hours or released and those charged would be brought before a judge within 60 hours. Bail could be denied in cases involving murder, kidnapping and arson. The measures would stay in force no more than 60 days.

Professor Grossman notes that under the War Measures Act, Quebec police and courts in October 1970 were given powers far more extensive than required. Of 947 persons detained, only 62 were charged, yet everyone taken into custody was denied counsel and access to a court of law.

He puts the essential point this way: "Careful legislation is required to protect government from panic and the population from the abuse of power. By carefully amending criminal procedures to include more flexibility in times of emergency, these procedures will remain specific and directed to acts already designated as offenses by criminal law."

His ideas merit serious examination in government and among the groups concerned about civil liberties.

So the winter worry-warts have something to get worried over: a juicy though no choking mess of snow. Must be about two and a half to three inches of the beautiful white stuff that landed within the past week. Powdery light, glistening patches and quilts add to the brightness of lengthening days; produce beautiful blue shadows when eclipsed by banks or crests in brilliant sun; and print the press of paws and tires. Such snow seems more a source of enjoyment than worry or weariness.

Referring briefly to those Redpolls swirling over the sunflower on the Tom Forsyth farm in last week's column, it should be cleared up that the prime feeding area for the birds was the considerable patches of dock and other seed-bearing weeds amongst or next to the sunflower plants. Nevertheless, Redpolls do manage to crack small sunflower seeds.

January 4, very, very early, an odd sight was noted low in the western sky by Mrs. George Schuetz and Debbie, what appeared like a comet by its head and tail, like a meteor by the long and tapering tail, but like neither by its slow motion. A meteor's motion is extremely fast; a comet motion is too slow to be apparent. Was it maybe a burning-out artificial satellite?

More birds apparently don't know when to move south. The Chuck Heath farm has been the haven for weeks for a Western Meadowlark and a few Black-birds. Handy barn, cattle knoll and bale stacks probably provide what shelter, food and convenience that these feathered oddballs need.

Last Saturday produced an intensely colorful re-appearance of nacreous clouds those many-tinted cloud-patches of very high levels of the atmosphere. As the sun's rays strike ice-crystals in different levels of the varying and moving cloud masses, the colors change in hue, brightness and position, thereby producing a striking beautiful effect. These clouds were seen between 12.15

and 12.45 p.m. and of course not far from the sun.

Anyone travelling through southern Alberta may be startled by seeing what may cause him to check his drinking habits, throw away the bottle for good, or doubt his sanity. The shocking vision would be pronghorn antelope wearing ear-rings and a multi-colored collar. A study of antelope migration habits and survival rates is being helped by means of markings that consist of a bright orange numbering tag on the right ear, a metal clip on the left ear, and a multi-colored leatherette coded collar. Knowledge of time, date and location; field observation; charting of the animals travels are all speeded up this way. Blood and age of the animals are also obtained from carefully managed field round-ups of the antelope. So be careful what collar and ear-rings you wear next time you take the southern route to Vancouver!

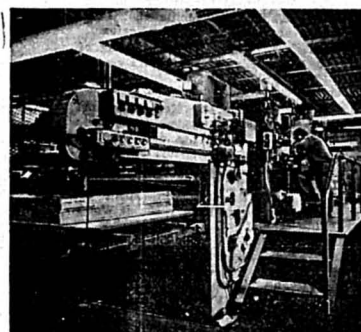

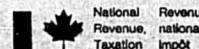
