WINNIPEG-Manitoha Hydro has completed construction of a new transformer station about three miles east of Pierson. The new station has a capacity of 3,000 kilowatts and will improve

3,000 kilowatts and will improve voltage regulation and service reliability in the Pierson and Lyleton are as. Customers in these districts a re presently supplied from a substation at Melita. The new wood pole station re-duces the 66,000 volt transmis-sion line voltage to 12,000 volts for distribution to villages and farm customers in the southwest corner of Manitoba. It will re-lieve the electrical Load on the lieve the electrical load on the Melita station which is present-ly near capacity. Estimated cost of the new facility is a bout \$70,000.

Criminologist Brian Grosman of the University of Saskatchewan has, done some positive thinking on the issue. His ideas should provide at the very least a starting point in getting something done.

Grosman believes the Criminal Code is more than adequate to handle polit-ically-motivated crimes and disorder —although conventional criminal pro-cedures covering bail and habaes cor-pus may be inadequate to cope with imminent collective violence. I.e proposed an amendment to the code to make emergency proced-ures available in a juridiction when a provincial premier declares a state of emergency and requests the aid of fed-eral anthorities, as in Quebee in Octo-be 1970. Grosman believes the Criminal Code

These clouds were seen between 12.15

and 12:45 p.m. and of course not far from the sun. Anyone travelling through southern Alberta may be start-led by seeing what may cause him to check his drinking habits, throw away the bottle for good, or doubt his sanity. The shock-ing vision would be pronghorn antelope wearing ear-rings and a multi-colored collar. A study of antelope migration habits and survival rates is being helped by means of markings that con-sist of a bright orange number-ing tag on the right ear, a metal clip on the loft ear, and a multi-colored leathereite coded collar. Knowledge of time, date and Knowledge of time, date and location; field observation; char-ting of the animals travels are all speeded up this way.
