tree-surrounded pool, tiny but teaming. A boyish shout and with a skyward rush, fifty to sixty male mallards flashed. Here was Nature beaming with communion and vigor! If only there were more such moments of beauty, timeless though framed by memory.

Beauty and memory played their parts in the report of Mr. Harrison of Sinclair on Sunday. He had heard the calling of Sandhill Cranes winging southward, had observed a cluster of nine Robins, and had enjoyed the sight of blue violets bravely that day.

A fine sight, too, must have been the ten Whistling Swans grazing in the pasture, seen by Mr. Frank Bartel and Eileen, September 23.

Swans, Geese and Ducks were the objective of the Brandon Natural History Society's October outing last Sunday afternoon. The weather was ideal for this venture to Whitewater Lake. A cavalcade of about six cars of almost as many shapes and colours gathered for the first stop at Bethel Church by the Hartney Junction on No. 2 Highway. Here the group was briefly addressed by Mr. Leo Robson on the history of this fine, colorful old building. Built in 1895, it was expanded in 1914, closed down in 1965, and became the sleeping property of the United Church of Canada, potential prey of vandals as local wardens helplessly wait for protective enterprise.

Under the leadership of Dr. John Lane of Brandon (who is one of six Manitobans to receive Good Citizenship Awards presented by the Tourist and Convention Association of Manitoba this year), the cavalcade moved south to the Deloraine area, then swung east. Two stops by stubble fields raised excitement and enthusiasm, the objective having come well in sight. Snow Geese and Blue Geese in rising, drifting and landing skeins, and in massed gaggle standing alert or feeding, 1500 to 2000 strong. The second field observed showed maybe twice as many geese again as the previous one! containing also Canada Geese and White-fronted Geese (Speckle Bellies) that complemented snow-drift masses of resting Snow Geese.

During a picnic supper on a low ridge on the south side of

Whitewater lake, members of the Natural History Society enjoyed the sight of dozens of Whistling Swans dotting a western bay. Later, clouds of thousands of Snow and Blue Geese sped on to the lake like a swift blizzard.

The supper group was entertained, however, by life other than waterfowl. On three sides close by were knots and stragglers of cattle, including three bulls, with a moo-moo here and a moo-moo there of annoyance and/or indignation! But tempers were kept by man and beast and peaceful communion prevailed. Adding to this restful setting, a Slate-colored

Junco, a Song Sparrow and a Hermit Thrush foraged as near neighbors about thirty yards away.

Farther east along the lake the naturalists hiked to the edge of the marshy band that borders this body of water, and from this vantage point saw ducks in flight, a jittery Common Snipe, and a family of five Black-crowned Night Herons dipping in for a supper of frogs legs a la carte. This was in the vicinity of the little station of White Water, where the group disbanded and friends once more became families speeding home.

A by-law authorizing the borrowing of \$145,000.00 for the Reston water and sewer project was passed at the meeting of the R.M. of Pipestone held on Friday. . . . It was reported at the Tuesday afternoon meeting of the Reston Hospital Aid that the net proceeds from the Fun Fair were \$1207.25. . . . An election will be held in ward 2 of the R.M. of Pipestone with C. J. Brownlee and Wilson Skelton being the nominees. J. P. Duncan, the sitting councillor, declined nomination for another term.

20 YEARS AGO (Oct. 9, 1902):

Neil Watt enjoyed a 2½ lb. pike for dinner the other day and didn't even have to catch it. Spying a mink coming up from the creek dragging the fish he took the fish away from it. The mink objected, but Neil succeeded in taking the pike which was still alive. . . . Harvest is complete except for a small acreage of flax. Both elevators are full and there are few cars available, the only one shipped this week being a car of matting barley. A new cleaner is being installed at the U.G.G. elevator by the Harper Construction Co. . . . The mercury dropped to 17 above early Saturday morning and the high for the day was 38. . . . Joe Serfein of Pipestone, Provincial Game Guardian, informed the Recorder that 100 pheasants will be released shortly in the Reston and Melita districts. These are pen raised birds which will require feeding for a while and Joe is anxious to get in touch with farmers willing to take the birds. He would prefer a location along the Pipestone Creek.

30 YEARS AGO (Oct. 8, 1902):

Pte. Wesley Martin is home from B.C. on harvest leave for a month with his father, Mr. Albert Martin, who lives 4½ miles north of Antler. Wes says he

often ran that distance during training. . . . Luckily the threatening storms of last weekend passed away without causing any loss of time in threshing or combining. Most wheat cutting is complete but quite an acreage of flax remains standing. . . . Lieut. and Mrs. Ronald Descon of Brandon—were weekend guests of the latter's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Armstrong. . . . The pupils of Misses Bertha Davis and Frances McLeod of the intermediate and primary rooms of the Pipestone School presented a "Copper Carnival" in the Pipestone Memorial Theatre as part of the entertainment that evening in aid of the war effort. . . . The Dept. of Agriculture at Ottawa has just consummated a new deal with Great Britain for the sale of bacon, at an increased price. Farmers are urged to raise more hogs and thus consume more of their grain, barley, millet and oats on the home premises.

40 YEARS AGO (Oct. 6, 1902):

Yuen Bow, operating the cafe at Pipestone, has made an assignment in favor of his creditors. The cafe will open again soon under a new proprietor. . . . The final pig judging demonstration was held at C. Campbell's. There were twelve contestants qualifying for the team that will compete in Brandon. The team winners were Charlie Campbell and Billy Matthews. . . . A Cauberry Beef Ring is in tears. The butcher one evening killed a fine animal and left it until next morning for cutting up. With the dawn it was discovered the carcass had vanished and with it the butcher's utensils. All that was left was the beef ring. . . . Some very fine social dances were held in the Lambton School during last winter and they will again be held this fall and winter with the first one coming very soon. . . . Reston fans followed the World Series between the New York Yankees and the Chicago Cubs on radio. The former won in four straight games.

50 YEARS AGO (Oct. 8, 1902):

The report of the Reston district is: wheat 65% threshed, oats 20%, barley 30%. Estimated yields: wheat 25 bushels to the acre, oats 50, barley 35 and rye 25. . . . At Reston, 194,600 bushels of grain were shipped in September and there is 70,000 bushels now in storage here. . . . The Rev. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) of St. Stephens Church, Winnipeg, will preach at both Reston Union Church and Hill-

view for their anniversary service on Oct. 22nd and on Monday Oct. 23 will deliver an address "The World Situation." . . . The Sinclair Boys & Girls Club held their annual fair on Sept. 26th. Among those with prize-winning exhibits were: Frank Tindall, Ada McMunn, Anna Brownlee, Lawrence Smith, Lillian Smith, Ralph Bramble and Lizzie McMunn. . . . The Lethbridge Herald takes the occasion to state that the unsatisfactory low price of wheat this year is due to the disorganization in Europe and exchange difficulties in all European countries, including Britain.

60 YEARS AGO (Oct. 4, 1912):

The Fall Millinery opening at the G. S. Munro Co. Store on Friday and Saturday was a complete success. The weather was fine and the ladies turned out in large numbers to admire the beautiful headgear and millinery novelties turned out by Misses Abercrombie and Cuttings. . . . On Monday, the hum of the threshing machine could be heard in every direction. The grain was good and dry and the work was rushed along as fast as possible. The yield is better than in many years past, but not such as to be called a bumper crop. The quality of the grain has been injured somewhat by the continuous rainfall. . . . W. & J. Kilkenny of Broomhill, are agents for the Rumely Oil Pull Tractors. 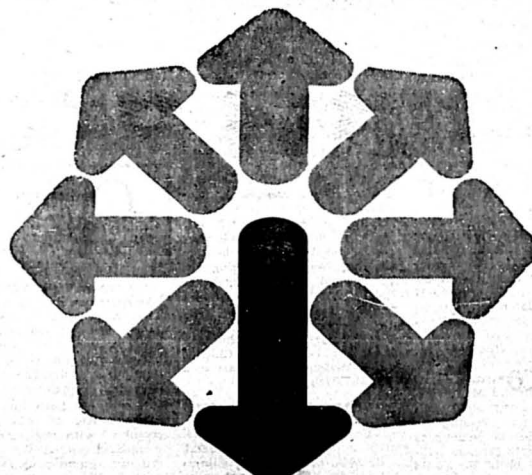
