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Reston Fair is a big success

RESTON—Over 3,000 enthusiastic spectators witnessed the 58th annual Reston Fair, Thursday, July 27th, a day which had near perfect weather and keen competition.

The Gymkhana, a new event this year proved very popular with the large crowd. The grandstand was filled to capacity for the two and one half hour event and standing room was a premium. It is expected that this unique event will be featured again next year.

Competitions included western pleasure, rider and best horse, men's calf roping, stake racing, barrel racing and goat tying for women.

Fair day began with the hot cake breakfast held in the park and sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. The proceeds from the 250 breakfasts served went to the Fair Board.

During the course of the day the Curling Club refreshment booth sold over 1100 hamburgers while the U. C. W. supplied

800 suppers in the evening and the A. C. W. also sold lunches throughout the day.

One of the outstanding events during the day was the 4-H Achievement held in conjunction with the fair as it has been in the past.

In all of the cattle classes the Angusville Association Queen,

Roberta Wood, of Lenore presented the ribbons.

The display building on the grounds was filled to the brim with entries of baking, fancy work, vegetables, etc. The displays of flowers and grains were most impressive.

In baseball Tilton defeated Lytleton to take first with Coul-

ter and Goodlands finishing third and fourth. Seven teams took part.

Deleau won first in the men's football with Reston second and Storthoaks and Plyerson tied for first in Ladies football, and the Sinclair and Maryfield teams tied for second.

Stanger shows was on hand to

supply the midway attraction and the space walk and ferris wheel provided additional entertainment.

The Legion bingo and the Lions dunking pool were well patronized.

Many attend 50th anniversary for Father Lorenzo Paulhus

GRANDE CLAIRIERE — A crowd of close to 500 well wishers gathered at Grande Clairiere at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, July 23 on the occasion of the golden jubilee of Reverend Father Lorenzo Paulhus, the former parish priest of the area. The festivities started off with the solemn celebration of a Thanksgiving Mass in open air having as chief concelebrants Father Paulhus himself and His Eminence George Bernard Cardinal Flahiff, Archbishop of Winnipeg.

The procession of the clergy formed in the parish church and from there went to an altar bedecked with gorgeous flowers set outside with the evergreens surrounding the rectory as a background. The members of the newly formed Altar Boys club opened the procession followed by eleven priests from different points of the province. Then came His Eminence Cardinal Flahiff in his episcopal robes, wearing the golden mitre and carrying the crozier. He was accompanied by Father Paulhus, Five Knights of Columbus of the 4th degree formed an escort of honor for His Eminence the

Cardinal. All this contributed towards a most imposing and colorful ceremony.

The members of the choir of Grande Clairiere and Bellevue joined to sing the entrance hymn "This is the day the Lord has made." The reverend sisters of the Presentation of Mary who had spent two weeks recently in the parish had helped a great deal to get the choir ready for the occasion. Miss Yvette Boulanger of Grande Clairiere and Miss Claris Barre of Bellevue played the accompanying music while Mrs. Wilfrid Barre, of Bellevue directed the choir.

At Mass, Barry Davis from Bellevue read the first lesson and Reverend Sister He'enn St. Joseph of La Salle, Man., a sister of Father Paulhus read the Epistle. Father Gerard Regnier, the present pastor read the gospel. He then extended a warm welcome to all the visitors on behalf of the parish. His eminence Cardinal Flahiff was greeted in a very special way. Then he introduced Father Paulhus who preached in French on the necessity of unity in prayer between the pastor and the faithful of a parish. He was followed by His Eminence who spoke in English and made some very meaningful comments in the same line.

A great many of the assistants took part in Holy Communion distributed by His Eminence and Father Regnier after the sign of peace had been exchanged by the members of the clergy and which Father Paulhus brought to the close members of his family.

When Mass was over the Procession returned to the church in the same order while the choir sang the recessional hymn.

Father Paulhus, visibly touched by all the homage rendered to him on this occasion and by the presence of so many people gathered from so many places in his honor, was still able to get up and say a few choice words of thanks to all those who prepared these celebrations and those who came from far and near to take part in them.

A special mention was made of Mr. George Guertin of Winnipeg, a long time hunting companion of Father and the Sir Knights of Columbus: Armand Guenther, Andre Huberdeau, Denis Simard of St. Lazare and Emmanuel Emond of Shilo all with their wives and Larry Wisgerber of Shilo with his escort Diane Hazard.

Monday, July 24th being the 77th birthday of Father Paulhus, was marked by the offering of a birthday cake blazing with 77 candles. Antoine Isabey the first baby Father had baptized in Grande Clairiere 27 years ago made the offering. Mr. and Mrs. Armand Gofflot, of Grande Clairiere who were the first couple to have their marriage blessed in this parish passed the pieces of the jubilee cake among the guests. After the meal most took the opportunity to express their best wishes personally to Father Paulhus.

All the guests were sorry to learn that Father Paulhus had been a patient at the Souris Hospital for the previous three weeks and that he would have to go back again for a few more days. Among the many visitors at the hospital he was delighted to receive the visit of His Grace Most Reverend Philip F. Pocock, Archbishop of Toronto, and His Grace Most Reverend Michael G. O'Neill, Archbishop of Regina. They made a special detour to visit Father Paulhus on the occasion of his approaching jubilee.

Harvest is underway

RESTON — Harvest has begun in the area with the combining of fall rye underway.

Alex Wilson on Saturday combined rye which was in a fit condition on a field on light land. He told the Recorder that the field will yield about 25 bushels to the acre. Dry weather during the fallling period cut the yield, he said.

Swathing of early sown rape and oats is also underway, with Jack Guthrie and Roy Campbell swathing the former and Harold Forder at Pipestone the latter.

Reports are that disease "Staghead" is affecting the rape fields. Roy Campbell expects that the yield in the field which he is swathing will be reduced by as much as 50%.

WAGES AREN'T FOR BOREDOM

At long last, industry, especially the auto sector, is realizing what housewives figured out long ago—that repetitive boring jobs must be given some variation and meaning.

People laughed patronizingly when housewives headed out from the homestead in droves to take night courses; paint, sculpt, volunteer, drink coffee, garden — anything but dishes and dusting.

Now industry even has a fancy name for the boredom disease—"Lordstown syndrome." The Lordstown (Ohio) General Motors plant went on strike recently out of sheer boredom—spotlighting the combination of fatigue, stress and depression that shows up in workers exposed to unbroken monotony and strain on the assembly line.

ALL CHIEFS, NO INDIANS

Shades of Northcott Parkinson! What has David Orlikow found now?

Let's see what he's found. In the top salary brackets of the defence department (\$15,000 a year in 1968; \$18,000 a year in 1971) he has found that the number of employees has increased by 209 per cent. In the offices of the privy council and the prime minister, the number of people hauling down the big \$18,000 and up increased by 93.3 per cent. In Statistics Canada, the increase was 153.6 per cent and in the secretary of state's department, 86 per cent.

Clearly the NDP member for Winnipeg North has stumbled on a neat pile of ammunition, all of which was supplied by the government. And the reasons the government gives for the increases may prove interesting not to say imaginative. But since it will be some months now before Mr. Orlikow gets a chance to pose his ticklish questions in Parliament, let's speculate.

The privy council's office and the prime minister's office expansion can be tossed off to re-organization. Given enough time, it is possible that the new money boys who line the walls

Various experiments are being tried, more time off, four-day work week, and a talked-of six-month year. Some companies are studying "job enrichment" schemes which motivate workers with phases of recognition and job rewards.

In Germany, Luftansa, let's many employees work as much or as little as they please. Sweden's Saab-Scania has robots to do the monotonous assembly line operation, leaving workers free to produce an entire engine, instead of just one part. It shows that these days wages aren't for boredom.

of the PM's East Block suite will pay dividends in the form of good government. If you're generously broad-minded — and frankly, it isn't easy to be that broad-minded — you might find such an answer acceptable.

The same goes for Statistics Canada and even for the secretary of state's department. There may be work to do there.

But the same, unfortunately, cannot be said for the defence department. That's where the biggest increase in sinecures came. True to Parkinson's now-famous principle, there seems to be no relationship at all between the size of the executive corps and the work to be done. For at a time when our military forces have had fewer commitments than ever, and the defence department work-force has actually decreased by 5.4 per cent over the three years, life has been sweetened at the top.

All of which may add up to delightfully fulfilling work for the guys who are filling their pocket-books. But our question is this: Are there enough privates left so that each general gets at least one of his own to order around?

Ed Foote, agent at the Pipestone Pool, told the Recorder the sample was good and the rice would grade No. 2 C.W. . . . Miss Anne Bartel of New Holstead, Wis., spent five days at the home of W. J. Champion on a 4-H Exchange trip. Anne has been a member of the 4-H in the U.S.A. for eight years. . . . Reports are that grasshoppers are being attacked by a red mite, which might mean the end of the threat. . . . The sports at Sinclair on Sunday was very successful despite the threatening and cold weather which prevailed. Winners of the six invited team baseball event was Grande Clairiere who defeated the Cromer club in the final.

20 YEARS AGO (Aug. 7, 1952)

Production tests of the Cal-Standard Tiltson Province 5-32 well, four miles north-west of here, was scheduled to get underway yesterday. Storage tanks have been erected and a filtering plant to remove the 15% water contents of the crude, was transported to the well-site over the weekend. . . . Reston streets were sprayed on Friday and Saturday of last week. Four thousand gallons of crude oil from the Virden wells were sprayed on at a cost of \$360. . . . A former Huston resident, Fred Toddy passed away recently at Saskatoon hospital. Death was due to injuries he sustained when his car was involved in a head-on collision with a truck. . . . Both local elevators are under repair this week. A major repair job is nearing completion at the U.G.G. elevator, where the gas engine has been replaced by a 10 H.P. electric motor. At the Pool, the doors are being rehung, and wind damage to the driveway repaired. A new scale was scheduled to be installed, but this has been postponed, due to the impending harvest. Combines are a common sight in town these days, as preparations for the harvest are underway. Every implement dealer has a yard full of them, new machines, second hand ones, and farmers' machines in for repair. The only report of combining so far is on the farm of Cecil Paddock. A small acreage of oats was combined there today.

30 YEARS AGO (Aug. 6, 1942)

Farmers have cut a lot of hay along the roadsides this year,

and the gymkhana, another first was also a big success. Entries in all classes were up over last year and the attendance was over 3,000. . . . Returning from Winnipeg on Sunday, noticed a sign on the north side of a road at the corner of a field and beside a road which read "Barley." Never had heard of a place in Manitoba by that name. Harvest wages being paid in the district are the lowest in the memory of the oldest residents. One dollar a day is the going wage. Farmers say that prospects will not permit them to offer more. Many are complaining that they do not know how they are to cut their grain as they are unable to purchase the necessary twine. . . . Elevators have been cleaned out of stored grain and are now ready for the crop of 1932. Cutting is going along briskly and some of the early grain may be threshed next week.

On July 25th a very pleasant evening was spent at the Reston Baptist Church on the occasion of the ordination of the pastor, T. H. Harris. . . .

Outdoors Only . . .

This re-appearance of the Column is to show that it is willing to turn up at the party even though it may not stay long!

It may be, however, that the party will have the drawing power to hold the columnist on a steady track that doesn't veer or stray.

The recent weeks permitted various straying including the southward ramble of July 31. That day, my wife and I joined a group of six persons from Brandon on a wild goose chase in the Broomhill Wildlife Management Area. (By the way, did you know that Broomhill as a name may have had its origin in Broomhill Tor in RossShire, northwestern Scotland?) Dr. John Lane, Larry Bidlake (Field Biologist), Mr. and Mrs. Dick Patmore, Miss Barbara Robinson (of the Hales Museum, Brandon) and Mr. Harry Watson searched the five section of lands for a Pinnated Grouse recently sighted by three naturalists from Winnipeg. The search proved fruitless, or, rather, grouseless. A few Sharp-shinned Grouse were observed, but of the true Prairie Chicken not a feather was found. This species, also known as the Square-Tail, remains officially a virtual ghost unproved in this area now. However, the trip had its merits other animals and plant life observed and collected.

Mr. Patmore (of Patmore Estates in Brandon) commented in Reston the same day bright light that effects the trees. This blight, he said, is a bacterial invasion brought when there is a wet spring. Ibiotic treatment has been attempted, but the best cure is to remove blight affected portions of the tree with a

clean cut of a sharp knife sterilized each time. Cuttings should not touch the ground but must be burnt.

The Almay crabapple is most resistant to the blight, the Dolga less so, the older common crabapples being the ones to suffer most from the bacterial infection that is carried amongst the trees by bees and other insects. Spraying the trees when the bud is just forming, when the bloom first opens, and when the flower has just dropped can help reduce infection.

Please don't shoot the cat! That means Manx cat. One has been missing from a home in Reston for a year now. It has the cry of a bobcat, has high hindquarters like a bobcat, or a lynx, and has the very lynx-like feature of lacking a tail—the typical appearance of both wild species, for they have but a stub of a tail that normally doesn't show. Furthermore, the Manx in question is certainly larger than most cats, weighing around 27 lbs.; has somewhat pointed ears, and may respond to the welcoming cry: "Here, kitty-kitty-kitty". If it appears to move like a rabbit, with a hopping gait, this is normal as all Manx cats have especially long back legs.

This appeal and description are given to account of the presence of lynxes in Reston, May 24 and July 24. This doesn't mean that the presence of the species in Reston is denied, but that it is rather unlikely. The lynx, as a rule, is a secretive, night-loving, forest-inhabiting animal, and accordingly is a quite improbable visitor to a metropolis like Reston.

Have you visited the Parkland Wildlife Game Farm? If not, why not? It's in Manitoba, in the southwestern part of the Province, 11 miles north of Russell, or 22 miles south of Roblin, on Highway 85, and 5 miles west of No. 83 on P.T.H. No. 482, or 4 miles south of the Shellmouth

Dam. This wild animal farm is open all day Sundays and from 6 p.m. to sunset on week days. Admission is \$1.00 for adults, 50c for children 12 and under, free to pre-schoolers.

The wild animal enclosures involve about 200 acres of muskeg, bush and prairies. The enclosures contain bison, different kinds of deer, guanaco, llamas and various sheep, goats and birds. A pair of ponies provide rides for smaller children, but parents must accompany them. It is expected that more varieties of animals will be ready for public viewing next year.

Would you like to see a fulgurite? It's neither weed nor bird, nor disease, nor an antique. There is one on the D. Van Buren farm southwest of Pipestone. It is the zigzaggy pipe of glassy material, somewhat like a very crooked walking stick, formed as the result of lightning striking sand or sandy soil and producing "instant-melt", followed by "quick-freeze" of the ground into a glassy form as described. Hope to have more on this item next week.

Sky watchers should appeal to their gods for clear skies on the nights of August 10-13 when the annual display of the Perseid meteor shower may be expected. Bright forerunners of the Perseids already have appeared, which may suggest a better-than-average presentation for this month.
