WHY WORK?

As unemployment continues to be one of our national problems, per-iodically a head of the government will say philosophically — in reference to those who refuse a job paying only \$1.65 an hour, "well, if they don't want to work, why should they?" Other intellectual types will echo some dream for the future when, according to them we'll all be on a 3- or 4-day work week and ours will be a great society of leisure. Is this what we really want?

society of leisure. Is this what we really want? Any society, all the way from primitive cultures up to the sophisti-cated and complex North American variety, consists of individuals who are mutually dependent upon each other. We found this out in recent gar-bage strikes and remember it well from some postal strikes of the past. It is a fact of life that we are interde-pendent.

It is a fact of fite that we are increase pendent. The work ethic is not a hang-over from the Puritans. It is funda-mentally good for man to work, to have challenges and to meet them, to pit his skills against problems. To pro-

vide a service to society through work, even if it isn't always the kind of job we would choose if we had a large choice, does give one self-respect and a sense of value. Man needs to contri-bute something to the general pot, as it were. The insidious effect of contin-ued unemployment is to create first anxiety, then hopelessness, and finally apathy which in turn leads to degener-ation of the human being. Instead of treating unemploy-

ation of the human being. Instead of treating unemploy-ment facetionsly, heads of state and governments could be seriously in-volved in developing more beautiful cities with greater public services, thus creating employment. Preventive medicine in the form of gymnasiums, more tennis courts, golf clubs, bicycle readways, gardens, y ou name it — where some people can be employed and others find recreation—is another area governments might consider.
