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Thirty-five rinks in bonspiel

RESTON—An entry of 85 rinks—the smallest number for many years, are taking part in this year's renewal of that annual classic, the Reston Bonspiel. Last year thirty-eight rinks took part.

Local rinks outnumber the visitors, with 81 being from the district and fourteen are visit-

ing with three from Virden and Snelair leading the parade. Melits has two and single entries are from Antler, Broomhill, Grande Clairiere, Napinka, Pipestone and one from the Hydro crew working on the South Reston station.

Drawnmaster Max Caldwell and assistant Delwyn Bulloch

got the event underway at 1:00 p.m. on Monday.

A single string system is again in vogue and there are six events including the Championship.

Claim that wolves are killing cattle in Cromer-Ebor area

RESTON—A petition from farmers in the Cromer-Ebor area requesting the killing of wolves in that district, was presented at the meeting of the R.M. of Pipestone council held Wednesday, Jan. 12th. The petition stated that wolves were destroying cattle in that area. Council decided to forward same to the Games Branch of the provincial government for action.

Deputy Reeve Harold Forder occupied the chair for the meeting, in the absence of Reeve Carl Wedow, confined to his bed with the flu. All other members were in attendance.

The council will ask the Water Resources Branch of the provincial government to look into a complaint that trees are blocking the flow of the Pipestone Creek east of Section 28-7-28.

Tax rebates were authorized for Conrad Karpinski and Norman Walker on N.W. 10-7-28 and N.E. 10-7-28 respectively. The rebates date back to 1969 due to the fact that the re-assessment which had been requested, was not carried out until 1971, and the assessment for each quarter was reduced.

Appointments were made as follows: Reeve Carl Wedow as proxy on the West-Man Regional Development Board with E. Shoemaker as alternate; Reeve Wedow and Councillor H. Forder and Cecil Brownlee as representatives on the Sherwood Home Board; Reeve Wedow as representative on the Souris Valley Water Commission; Councillor A. E. Shoemaker as representative on the West-Man Nursing Home; Councillor Wilson Skelton and F. S. Patmore as representatives on the Alstone Lodge Board.

The council agreed in principle with the entering into a Vet-

erinary Service District and appointed Councillor H. Forder as their representative.

Re-hired were: John Forsyth in charge of the water and sewer system; Wm. W. Busby, as secretary-treasurer and Mrs. Joyce Turner as assistant; C. H. Swayze as foreman for the public works department; and Ian Hutchison as caretaker of the Municipal Office.

Members of the volunteer fire brigade are to receive \$1.00 for every practice attended and \$2.00 per hour for every fire attended. The chief will receive \$25.00 per year extra plus 12c a mile for the use of his car.

Rate for snowplowing was set at \$10.00 per hour with a minimum of \$5.00 and no snowplowing will be done for anyone in

arrears for machine work unless arrangements are made with the councillor.

The supply of fuel oil for the various municipal buildings for the current year will be: Office building, Ross Benzie; Municipal shop, Gulf Oil Canada; Rest Room, Square Deal Co-op; Fire Hall, A. M. Watt.

Estimated expenditures for the municipality from Jan. 1st until a budget has been approved were set at \$53,000.00 for municipal and \$10,000.00 for water and sewer operation.

A by-law setting the indemnity for the reeve and councillors was approved.

Dave Magrol of Westcoast-Resco interviewed the council and discussed culverts and prices for same.

Occupational entrance course gives students work experience

VIRIDEN—The work program is an integral part of the Occupational Entrance Course at the Grade X and XI levels. This program is now in its second year of operation in the Fort La Bosse School Division. There are presently 43 students enrolled in the work program. These students spend approximately 50% of their school time working at various work stations in Virden, Reston, Elkhorn, Oak Lake, Sioux Valley, and Kola. In this area there are 85 work stations. A student spends two weeks in school and then goes on to a work station for a two week period. The hours spent at this station are the same as school hours. This process of two weeks in school and two weeks at a work station continues throughout the school year.

At the Grade X level, the program is known as "work experience." At this level each

student will visit 8 of 9 different work stations throughout the school year. The purpose of work experience is not to train for a specific job, but rather to train the individual to become a worker and allow him to gain some knowledge about different jobs and the demands they make.

At the Grade XI level, we call the work aspect "on-the-job training." It differs from work experience in that it concentrates on one main area of work. During the Grade X year, the student visits various different work stations. When he comes back for Grade XI, he chooses one of these stations and spends all his working time at that one station.

The idea behind the O.E.C. program is to give the student a chance to look at the various occupations within a commun-

ity. It is then hoped that through this program, a student will be able to choose a suitable vocation, and after finishing Grade XI, will either take a permanent job or enter one of the Vocational Institutes for further training in his or her chosen field.

So far, the work program has been very successful, both for the students and the employers. It serves a dual purpose in that it enables the student to see what it is like to be out among the working people and at the same time, the employer can size up a potential addition to his staff. Local employers are to be heartily commended for their co-operation in providing the work stations throughout the school year.

Research Station named after Stewart Perdue, geology professor

After its first summer in operation, Brandon University's wildlife research station, 30 miles west of Brandon, has been named the H. Stewart Perdue Wildlife Research Station, Plum Lake, honoring the geology professor who started the project five years ago.

Dr. Perdue, who has taught at Brandon University for 44 years and spent four years here as a student, is chairman of the university ad hoc committee established to set up the station. He began negotiations around 1966 to lease the quarter-section of marshland between Oak Lake and Plum Lake from the provincial government, for a research station.

The Oak Lake area offers two lakes, marshland, upland areas, and sand dunes for research. The water in Oak Lake is controlled by a dam between Oak and Plum Lakes, and there is a dam built by Ducks Unlimited in the Plum Lake marsh.

Walter Redlick, chief conservation officer in Brandon with the provincial department of lands, resources and environmental management, said the Ducks Unlimited dam was used only once, for a period of a few weeks. It has not been used since because of the threat of flooding to hayfields surrounding the marsh.

Mr. Redlick said land and resources has recently taken a biologist on staff and he will use the station for studies such as the life cycle of birds found in the marsh.

Dr. Perdue said he hopes to include representatives from Ducks Unlimited, the provincial department of lands and resources, and the university on a permanent committee to govern the station.

The lands and resources department financed a road from the highway to the station buildings this summer and put \$400 into renovation of the university's buildings at Oak Lake rather than renew their own facilities in the area.

The roofs of the two semi-detached duplex buildings were painted this summer, and a sewage system and well were completed. The buildings were brought to the marsh site from the now-defunct Macdonald Air Base near Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. They were re-painted inside by two Brandon students who worked at the station this summer renovating the buildings and grounds and taking samples from the marsh.

James McLeod, professor of zoology at Brandon, said week-to-week sampling of the aquatic organisms in the marsh was carried out this summer. Dr. McLeod was involved in studies to isolate and define a disease in muskrats. Muskrat houses resembling little stacks of straw are scattered throughout the marsh.

During the summer, David Stewart, a professor in the zoology department, took blood samples from birds to study viruses in ducks which are transmissible to humans. Dr. McLeod is using the samples Dr. Stewart collected, to study two organisms that cause a malaria-like disease in ducks.

In addition to the research carried on at the station, Dr. McLeod said he hopes to hold summer school classes in zoology at the station next year. A three-day seminar was held at Oak Lake this fall for five students in career training programs with the provincial department of lands and resources and Brandon's botany department. The seminar included field trips in the marsh and discussions of the ecology of the area.

Outdoors Only...

Antelope with ear-rings last week, and deer with string-ties this week!

Last week's report in this column of Project Antelope in Alberta brought a report from Dave Dickson about a similar project concerning deer being conducted this winter in Southwestern Manitoba.

With centers at Deleau, Deloraine, Lyleton and Reston, the Provincial Government is trapping deer, tagging and marking them, and collecting facts about their number, distribution and movements within and between districts. Of twenty-five traps located in Southwestern Manitoba, five are located in this district. Each trap is a single-animal, double-drop-door type of box that is set off by a deer entering and touching a trigger it can't help disturbing.

Before last Monday (Jan. 17), the traps had been located in typical feeding areas and baited so as to draw deer and let them become accustomed to the traps and the bribes. Last Monday the traps were triggered, ready for the actual trapping.

Naturally, the traps will be regularly checked. Each animal caught will be identified with a metal tag fastened to each ear and a brightly colored cord fastened around the neck, then released. Each district will use a different color. Thus, individual or collective migration of deer from one district to another will be observable. Skilled observers will be able to check the numbers of animals, their distribution, numbers by sex, condition and other facts useful to a better understanding of deer management and control. More about this project will be reported in following columns.

Have you ever seen pillars of frozen froth? No kidding; this is not a beer parlor joke, but a phenomenon of nature. Three of these trembling delicate forms were observed at Souris last Sunday just below the dam, two near it and one farther off and smaller than the others.

Water welling up on the lower side of the dam keeps the ice thin. In places of more concentrated and forceful gushing of water, no ice forms, but froth and spray freeze around the opening and gradually grow like furry chimneys, producing what looks from afar like crooked, dirty, yellowish columns whose tips quiver in the wind as fresh froth is whipped away.

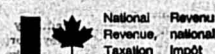
