The Reston Fire Brigade were called to the scene about 5:00 p.m. on Sunday and were able to control the fire with damage being confined mainly to the basement and smoke damage to the balance of the house.

Funeral service for the deceased was held in the United Church on Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 15th. Rev. A. Henderson, of Redvers officiated.

The deceased was born in Sinclair on March 13, 1913, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Smith, pioneers of the Sinclair district. He spent most of his life in the Sinclair district.

He was predeceased by his wife, the former Jessie Doreen Adams on Oct. 11th, 1968. The couple were married in 1938.

Left to mourn are three sons: Barrie, of Sinclair, Bob, of Minnedosa and Randy of Brandon and four daughters, Tammy, of Brandon, Joan (Mrs. R. Senheim) of Manson, Donna (Mrs. M. Klusendorf) of Brandon and Pat (Mrs. R. Taylor) of Reston. He is also survived by a brother, Willie, of Winnipeg and four sisters, Minnie, Lottie, Mary (Mrs. R. Chambers) all of Winnipeg and Lillian (Mrs. D. Rankin) of Brandon.

MELITA—A total of 1125 animals were sold at the Melita Auction Mart last week. At the bred cow sale 458 head sold, 463 at the cattle sale and 204 hogs also sold.

Prices for fat steers ranged from \$33 to \$35.75, for fat heifers \$31 to \$33.75, butchers cows \$18 to \$23 and canner cows \$10 to \$18.

Feeder steers, 800-1000 lbs. \$35 to \$38, 700-800 lbs. \$36 to \$40, 600-700 lbs. \$38 to \$42.

Feeder heifers sold from \$31 to \$34.50, stock steer calves from \$48 to \$52 and stock heifer calves from \$37 to \$41, with one lot of Charolais heifers averaging 366 lbs. selling at \$49.

Stock sows sold from \$250 to \$350 and bred heifers from \$275 to \$325.

Weanling pigs sold from \$18 to \$23, feeder pigs from \$23 to \$45, bred sows from \$65 to \$90, dry sows \$18 to \$22 and boars from \$16 to \$17.

Market hogs sold from \$50 to \$60.

One chore horse sold at 8c a pound.

VIOLENCE

The argument over whether violence in movies and the media promotes violence—or merely reflects it—is futile.

Violence is a human condition as predictable as life, death, and taxes. The trick is not to cultivate ground where violence flourishes.

A society which teaches its young to aggressively "kill" the competition shouldn't squawk too loudly about where it finds violence. People who think this is a 'dog eat dog' world where people must be pitted against each other instead of being valued for their own worth—promote violence.

Violence is taught, not only by movies or TV, but by parents too wrapped up in business or personal worries to find time for concern, tenderness and caring. It is taught by those

who can't show love; it is taught by people who can't even discipline themselves, let alone guide others.

And all these people are helplessly entangled in a system of violence to their own personalities which tells them to deliver or die. They stand to lose their income, house, car, prestige, their very reason for living.

Violence flows from a way of living which no longer finds dignity in people, but through acquisition and possessions — making slaves of us all.

There are no Pollyanna solutions. It would be nice to begin by repairing relations between English and French Canadians on a large scale—or between labor and management.

But people must begin in their own families—giving them the gift of time, care and love.

The Days Gone By

10 YEARS AGO (Nov. 22, 1962)

Brian Wood, of Winnipeg, hunted unsuccessfully all last week for a deer until Saturday morning when he bagged a buck in the pasture half mile north of Reston. The animal weighed 250 lbs. had eight spikes on one antler and nine on the other and the antlers were tremendously thick. Had they been symmetrical the head could have been a record.

Residents of the Pipestone district gathered in the Memorial Hall on Friday evening, Nov. 17 to honor Mr. Ernest Ferguson who is leaving the district to reside in Ireland. Mr. W. Harvey made the presentation address and a wrist watch and purse of money were presented by Lloyd Hutchison. At the November meeting of the Pipestone 4H Beef Club, Mr. Louis Henuet was appointed as leader for 1963 with A. Davis and J. Forsyth as assistants.

Mr. Jim Forsyth was re-elected as president of the Pipestone-Albert Agricultural Society at the annual meeting held in the Trill Inn on Monday night. Mr. and Mrs. C. Cornwall, of Pipestone, celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary on Saturday November 17 at the Memorial Hall when the family and friends joined them for a turkey dinner.

29 YEARS AGO (Nov. 13, 1922)

The 40th anniversary of the Hillview United Church was observed with a special service on Sunday. Rev. J. L. Fargey, of Elkhorn, was guest speaker and Rev. G. A. Colpitts in charge of the service. A historical sketch was read by Mrs. Wm. Watt.

Little overall change resulted from the re-assessment of the R. M. of Pipestone just completed, the new figure totals \$3,004,860 compared with the old figure of \$3,707,050. In the L. I. D.'s of Pipestone and Reston, however, the increase is considerable. In Pipestone there was a 37% increase from \$86,260 to \$118,210 and in Reston a 32% increase from \$209,220 to \$316,680. For the past two weeks the Sinclair Hall has been a scene of activity. The hall has been moved east a short distance to a partial new foundation and an addition is being added to the west end which

will house a heating system and a kitchen. "The Greatest Show on Earth" established an attendance record at the Reston Theatre last week. A total of 1608 persons saw the show in the four day run and the gross income was \$1018.00.

30 YEARS AGO (Nov. 12, 1942)

No paper available.

40 YEARS AGO (Nov. 17, 1932)

Thursday, Nov. 24th will be shipping day for the Reston Poultry Pool and Brady's Hardware has been secured for the purpose. It is expected that about 20,000 lbs. of poultry will be shipped that day. A provincial scheme unemployed single men or women on relief may be placed on farms for the period ending March 31, 1933. The farmers will provide suitable living quarters and food and the government will pay each person thus employed \$5.00 per month. The first "Pleasant Saturday Evenings" for the season was held in the Pipestone Memorial Hall and they will be held every Saturday evening during the winter months. The Paramount Players provided the entertainment with two plays "A Kiss in the Dark" and "From Down East." J. McLean acted as chairman.

On Saturday night, Nov. 6th two carloads of Masons from Reston and one from Hartney attended the International Night at Minot, N. D. where they enjoyed excellent hospitality. The trip was an arduous one, however, and the last leg: 38 miles, because of heavy snow took 3 hours.

50 YEARS AGO (Nov. 16, 1922)

Despite the fact that large number of ducks and geese have gone south, some of the local nimmers succeeded in getting a nice bag last week. There are still plenty of birds left but the trick is to locate them. They are in prime condition. The moose hunters from Antler and Reston left for the north this week and editor expects to join them on Saturday. Mr. D. McIver, of Tilton, has sold his farm to Mr. George Moir and is retiring from farming. Mr. T. Smith will auction his horses and farm equipment on Nov. 22nd. The G. S. Munro Co. are offer-

ing barrels of Ontario apples at the following price: No. 1 Greenings \$6.50, this amount is less than \$1.90 per box. They also have Spys, Pippins and Baldwins. Donald McIver is having a credit auction sale on Nov. 22nd. Articles at \$10.00 or less are cash, over that amount credit will be given to Oct. 1, 1923 on furnishing a lien note bearing interest at 8% per annum.

60 YEARS AGO (Nov. 13, 1912)

Threshing machine continue to operate, many of them short handed as most harvesters have returned to the east. A number of farmers have yet to have a sheaf threshed and the grain is still standing in the stook. The C. P. R. have completed the work of fencing their demonstration farm in the Pipestone district. By-laws passed at the R. M. of Albert council meeting in the Hall at Broomhill on November 6th included two that made provision for public cemeteries at Broomhill and Tilton. Easter will fall on March 23rd next year, the earliest it will be for a hundred years. W. Mann at Pipestone has received his 1913 Overland demonstrator and it has a handsome lines, finished appearance and easy riding qualities and has been most favorably commented on. A field of flax in the Sinclair district belonging to A. Cochran yielded 20 bushels to the acre.

It was discovered when the Lions were picking over their potatoes to remove the frozen ones. The new edition of the Provincial Telephone Directory has a striking cover. It is of three combines working in a field of grain.

Outdoors Only

A stretch of gray November days has slid by. No sun, no snow to speak of; moderate cold, moderate wind hardly worth mentioning; there must be bright skies waiting somewhere.

In spite of gray days, news of bird life has been rich. Mr. Herman Battersby, of Oak Lake reported seeing fifteen eagles, mostly Bald Eagles, in trees by the dam at the south end of the lake, November 4. One fine specimen remained calm at its ground perch even when Mr. Battersby approached to twelve yards from it. Oddly enough, the eagles were gathered where the lake was frozen, both above and below the dam. At the other end of the lake, where it was open, wild geese and ducks still abounded, and Whistling Swans rested by the hundreds.

Just two days before that, Mr. Bob O'Rourke observed a Bald Eagle on guard near some animal remains just south of Chuck Heath's place. Mr. O'Rourke was really impressed with the great size of the bird as it rose from its perch and revealed the distinctive white head.

November 8, I appreciated hearing from Mrs. Emma Hopkin, of Pipestone. Her news

was about 6 Common Ravens beside the highway about 15 miles east of Pipestone. A few hours after having been first seen, the ravens were observed again, still feeding on the remains of a deer carcass.

But this was not all. In the Souris Hospital yard, a new sight for Mr. Hopkins was a bright and noisy Blue Jay. Also, on three occasions along the Belles road, a Snowy Owl had been seen. Blue Jays are common in the Souris River valley. One may well wonder, however, how to account for the presence of ravens, birds seldom seen this far south unless severe winter climate or storms had sent them southward. The three sightings of the Snowy could all have been of the same owl, but it may be another specimen of the northern visitors that have been previously reported. In addition to these sightings, Mrs. Hopkins had observed a very dark eagle, possibly an Immature Bald Eagle, within the past couple of weeks at the home farm. Thank you, Mrs. Hopkins.

November 8, too, Mrs. E. A. Wilkins described the presence of a pair of Red Crossbills (a male and a female), three Pine Grosbeaks (all females — you can tell by the color), one Brown-headed (Boreal) Chickadee, and, very unexpectedly, a Brown Thrasher—all that had visited her bird-feeding station.

Really fascinating was the re-lessness of the Crossbills, coming right up to the kitchen window or not moving away when Mrs. Wilkins moved by the feeder.

Only the day before Mrs. Wilkins' sightings, Mrs. Dick Thompson noted a Robin still feeding with the chickens, it having enjoyed their company already for a number of days. Maybe by now this tardy thrush has heard the siren call of the South, and has skipped over the border.

More feathered information — came from Roy Campbell. He had been impressed by the sight of about fifty Bohemian Waxwings in trees and in flight by Mrs. F. McMurchy's house, November 11. A swirl of white-patched wings and trilling throats, these winter songbirds form a fascinating sight.

Last Sunday I had the pleasure of checking the Wilkins bird-feeding station which two male Red Crossbills and a female were visiting. The males almost dazling in their dark surroundings, the birds arrayed in dusted-scarlet and black, and yellow-brownish crossed bills. Near the Red Crossbills, Boreal (Brown-capped) Chickadee busily searched the spruce branches for food. Only the night before, fifteen Evening Grosbeaks paid the lot a visit and brightened the sight with their

sulphurous yellow and brown forms, as they foraged in the fruit trees around the feeder.

So farmers have been warned, at official levels, to refrain from increasing wheat acreage in 1973. Increases could actually mean financial losses, crazy as it may sound. By the time farmers make up their minds as to whether or not to increase, they may have realized the wisdom of saving more bluffs, sloughs and border-line acreage; this way they will be preventing pollution and saving land, water, air and life. In parts of California, farming has been so intensive and extensive as to cause the water table to drop as much as 100 feet. Doesn't Man make a marvelous destroyer?
