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R. M. of Storthooks council meeting

STORTHOOKS—At the meeting of the council of the Rural Municipality of Storthooks, No. 31, held on Wednesday, May 3rd with all members present, a resolution was passed "that we guarantee payment of fire brigade from Reston or Carnduff in case of emergency. The individual or his fire insurance company will be liable for the cost of the Fire Brigade.

Correspondence included a letter from the Municipal Road Assistance Authority re. grid road allocation for the 1972-73 year. A letter from the Dept. of Highway informing that grid road south of Storthooks adjoining No. 8 highway will not be considered as a secondary highway therefore will not consider oiling it in the near future.

Letters from our solicitor were received. Letter from the S.A.R.M. advising that they will make signs with the name of farmers and location of farmstead for those who wish to have them at a very low cost. Instructions on grasshopper control were read.

Operators training course will be offered at the beginning of June at Stoughton but this municipality will not participate.

Letter from the R.M. of Pipestone in regards to Fire brigade was also considered.

In other business, the minutes of the last regular meeting, as amended were adopted as read. The financial statement for April was approved for payment. Bills amounting to \$2,246.90 were also approved.

A meeting will be held at the Municipal Office on Friday, May 12th at 8:30 p.m. for the purpose of opening tenders.

The secretary will be given leave of absence to attend the Secretary's convention from May 12th to May 18th.

RESTON—A fund in memory of Terry Dale Bloomer has been organized by a group of Reston citizens. Anyone wishing to contribute can do so at the Bank of Montreal, Reston, the Reston post office or to Rev. E. Schurman.

Expenditures of over \$26,000.00 for Reston U. V. D.

RESTON—Expenditures of \$26,505.00 for the current year is the budget of the Reston Unincorporated Village District in its first year of operation, it was reported at a public meeting on Monday night in the Memorial Theatre with an attendance of ten.

Wm. W. Busby reported on the budget and stated that expenditures were budgeted as follows: Administration \$855.00; Transportation (roads, sidewalks etc.) \$6000.00; Snow removal \$400.00; Street lighting \$4200.00; Policing \$10,315.00; Hydrant rental \$225.00; Garbage collection \$1600.00; Memorial Park \$2200.00; Rest room \$325.00 for a total of \$26,595.00.

Of this amount \$16,596.00 will be raised by property taxation and other revenues will amount to \$10,000.00.

Mr. Busby gave the totals for last year when Reston was operated as an L.I.D. Expenditures were as follows: Garbage collection \$1320.00; Hydrant rental \$225.00; Streets and sidewalks \$750.00; snow spent by \$250.00; Policing \$3,000.00; parks \$1010.00; Rest Room and expenditures on the 50/50 program for streets \$1800.00 for a total of \$15,215.00.

Discussion took place on the possibility of black-topping of more streets, but it was decided to wait for a year to see how the streets done last year stood up.

The possibility of an oil treatment for non-surfaced streets will be investigated.

Rev. E. Schurman chaired the meeting and Wm. W. Busby acted as secretary.

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Terry Dale Bloomer, 14, accident victim buried at Reston on Wednesday

RESTON—A sorrowing community on Wednesday afternoon at the United Church attended the funeral for Terry Dale Bloomer, age 14, whose accidental death came about 5:30 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, May 7th. Rev. E. Schurman officiated. The tragic accident occurred when he was buried in bulk fertilizer being unloaded from a hopper car at the Co-op fert-

ilizer shed. Despite every effort by his father Al Bloomer and others, the boy had suffocated by the time it was possible to extract him from the all-enclosed fertilizer.

Terry, a pleasant cheerful red-head, had a host of friends, both adult and children of all ages. He was a student at the Virden Collegiate making the trip by bus each day. One of

his classmates Jonny Eagle, of the Oak Lake Indian Reserve was visiting him for the weekend and was with him at the time of the accident.

He was a member of the Reston 14 and under hockey club and they attended the service in a group. He was also a member of the Reston Cubs.

Terry was born in the Wilson Memorial Hospital at Melita. For the past six years he has lived with his family in the Reston Community.

He leaves to mourn, his sorrowing parents Mr. and Mrs. Allan Bloomer, four brothers, Ricky, Kelly, Shane and Dean and a sister Kathy. Also grandparents Mr. and Mrs. George Rollins, of Pipestone, grandmother Mrs. C. Bloomer, of Vancouver, uncles and aunts Mr. and Mrs. J. Bloomer, Red Deer, Alta., Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bloomer, Melita; Mr. and Mrs. Duwood Rollins, of La C Du Bonnet, Man., Mr. and Mrs. Art Wilkins and Mr. and Mrs. Dale Rollins, of Reston.

fragments making up not much more than a quart were collected. Examination of the site revealed neither pottery nor stone artifacts. With Heaven knows what destructive effect to the site, digging operations resumed. In the meantime, Prof. Leigh Syms of the University of Manitoba had been informed of the affair. During a weekend of archaeological survey flights over parts of south-western Manitoba, Mr. Syms visited the Melita site, collected all evidence of it, and returned with it to the University of Manitoba whose anthropology department will conduct a scientific study of this evidence. So far the only conclusion to be drawn is that the bones indicated an Indian burial. Age, culture, customs, associations, etc. still remain to be determined as well as possible from the scant remains.

It is well for all persons concerned at any time with historical sites to know that all artifacts (man-made objects, tools, weapons, etc.) found in, on or under any land, belong to the owner of that land, and therefore permission must be obtained from the owner before artifacts may be removed from the property. Any action to the contrary is liable to legal prosecution under Manitoba statutory laws. Further, no excavation for artifacts—historical remains of any kind—may be done in this province; no artifacts of any kind may be removed from this province, without a currently effective permit obtained from the Minister of Historical Sites, who is a member of the Manitoba Executive Council. In addition, any person involved in authorized excavating, removing, or collecting of artifacts is required by law to keep records, take or make pictures of the artifacts, and be prepared to allow professional inspection of the artifacts.

Correspondence with Mr. Don Thompson, Superintendent of the Pipestone National Monument, Pipestone, Minnesota, resulted in our receiving a batch of booklets about the Monument, Indian made handicrafts, and the City of Pipestone. In regard to the city, although it was founded about one hundred years ago, it has a population of approximately 5000, four hotels, an area vocational school, an airport, some excellent parks, a 56-acre Country Club, two bowling alleys, a roller rink, two theatres, the Pipestone County Historical Museum, and a new hospital.

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


