Now is the time, too, for con-aldering how much we have ne-glected riches of our district's early history, and think about recording memories of the few pioneers left amoungst us; about preserving more of the artifact that stand for a way of life simple, rugged, and inspiration simple, rugged, and inspiration-al but forever gone; and about the stories of the old homesteads especially the ones whose great stone houses are beginning to eramble from their once unique strength and slendor. Let's do more than just think; let's act before our heritage is destroyed or stolen. Reston man receives \$170 in compensation

WINNIPEG — An 18 year old Reston man who sustained dam-aged teeth after being assaulted by a juvenile last summer re-ceived \$170.00 in compensation, it was announced recently by Attorney General Al Macking. The award is part of \$3500.00 awarded by the Criminal In-juries Compensation Board over the past month.

The Reston man's assailant, a juvenile, was found guilty of a charge of assault causing bod-ily harm and was fined \$5.00.

Other awards were: An award totalling \$2,332 was made to a 27 year old man who was shot as he approached the door of the home of his former common law wife in Winniper. The man sustained a gunshot wound to the left side of his abdomen and was out of work from October 18, 1971 to October 6, 1972 (with the exception of a live week period last summer). His assall-ant was found guilty of causing bodily harm with intent and sentenced to three years in the Stony Moutsin Correctional Institute. The failer of an 18 year old

Institute. The father of an 18 year old man fatally shot last summer was awarded \$996 compensation. The incident occurred during a party. The assaliant was found guilty of manslaughter and re-ceived a three year suspended sentence due to mitigating cir-cumstances. cumstances

cumstances. Three of the four continuing awards provided for an increase in the weekly award from \$49.50 to \$52.50 retroactive to Oct-ober 1, 1072. This increase app-lied to:

A 17 year old woman who was struck on the head several was struck on the head several times by a juvenile wielding an axe and was also choked. The woman suffered severe head in-juries, remained unconclous or semi - conclous for about ten days after the injury and was initially rendered a quadripleg-ic but has since regained some movement. A juvenile was char-ged with attempted murder and has been undergoing psychiatrie examination. examination A 70 year old widow who sus-

A 70 year old widow who sus-tained injuries when knocked to the sidewalk by a youth attempting to steal her purse on December 18, 1971. Her assail-ant has not been apprehended. A 49 year old widow who suffered a broken left leg, dam-aged left knee, badly bruised hips and lower body when burl-ed to the ground by a young man who snatched her handbag from her. Her assailant was not apprehended.
