Guthrie brought greetings from the residents of the Alstone Lodge and mentioned that their were eight still living who were residents of the district 80 years ago, being: Aggie McMurphy, Anna Watt, Jean S. Letter from Scotland

Reston Post Office
Eyemouth,
Berwickshire,
Nov. 28th, 1972

Dear Sir,
As we have no Lord Mayor of Reston your letter was delivered to my office. I, as Postmistress, decided to reply as best I could.

I am afraid I cannot give you any historical information.

We are a small community. The village of Reston has a population of about 300 residents and situated five miles from the South East Coast of Scotland. Our Border Country is very beautiful. The main industry is agriculture and the land here is very rich and fertile. The village stands on the River Ewe. We have a Church, one food store, one hardware store, & the Post Office, also a public school where the children attend until they are 12 years of age and then they go to High School at Eyemouth which is a rich little fishing town at the mouth of the River Ewe, hence the name of Eyemouth. Many young people have to leave the village to find work in the city, this being Edinburgh, 50 miles away, our nearest University is also Edinburgh. We used to have a

very busy railway station which was closed eight years ago. The nearest now is at Bowlick-on-Tweed.

I am enclosing three pictures which were taken three years ago, not having any more of

them I would be grateful if you could return them when you have finished with them.
Hope everyone has an enjoyable evening.

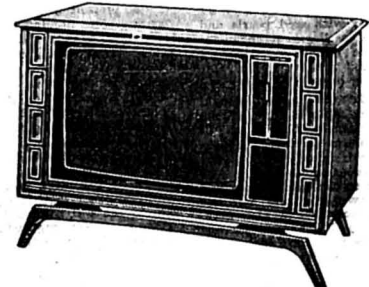
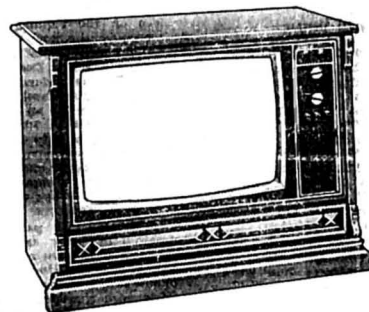

The Days Gone By

10 YEARS AGO (Dec. 20, 1962)

Doug Watt was the winner of the Arthur Scott for Duff Robin Progressive Conservative Party in the election on Monday. Unofficial returns show 2604 votes for Watt with Harry Patmore, Liberal standard-bearer receiving 1855. Across the province 33 Conservatives were elected, 17 Liberals, 7 N.D.P. and one Social Credit. The Reston Hospital had an occupancy rate of 104.29% of rated capacity during November it was reported at the board meeting on Monday night. During the month there were 469 adult patient days and 15 newborn days. The rated capacity is 15 adult beds although 18 are in use. There are four basins.

Dan Isaac of the Clover Hill Honey Farm is known as King Bee these days as a result of being elected the president of the Manitoba Co-operative Honey Producers Association. Dan and his wife and Mr. and Mrs. E. Penner are taking off shortly on an extensive motor trip that will take them through Ontario and as far south as Florida.

28 YEARS AGO (Dec. 11, 1952)

Fifty seven appeals have been made against the new assessment and were considered by the R. M. of Pipestone council sitting as a Court of Revision yesterday afternoon. The report on the decisions will be made next week. The Reston Hospital Aid will purchase a large deep freezer for the hospital (if it can be installed) it was decided at a meeting on Tuesday afternoon with Mrs. Doug Watt in the chair. Skips for the men's curling club were elected at a meeting on Monday night in the Reston Rink with president Reg Berry in the chair. Elected were: Clyde Caldwell, K. B. Mills, Edison Berry, John Berry, Jim McMunn, F. R. Manning, W. C. Bulloch, Alex Mennie, C. S. Campbell, Reg Berry, J. I. Bulloch and Chas. Caldwell. The water separation plant at the Tilton oil well was destroyed by fire on Monday morning. According to reports reaching the Recorder the plant had frozen up and was being thawed out when it took fire. The plant is a twisted wreck, eye witnesses say. It will take at least a month to replace it.

30 YEARS AGO (Dec. 17, 1942)

The annual meeting of the Amherst Hospital was held in the school on Thursday evening with A. M. Merrill, the president in the chair. He stated that the hospital was now at the peak of its service during the more hospital days than at any time before. The nearest hospital to the west is at Arcola, 50 miles distance and to the east at Souris, approximately the same distance. Mr. D. Dean, secretary, presented the financial statement which revealed that the cost per hospital day had risen from \$2.63 in 1940 to \$2.95 for the period ending June 30th, 1942. Since no government grants are received it is hoped adjacent municipalities might

share the cost as no patients are asked to pay more than \$2.50 per day. The residents of the R. M. of Pipestone over-subscribed the Third Victory Loan quota by 153.78%. The quota was \$85,353.25 and \$99,350.00 was obtained. In the unit which includes the R. M. of Wallace, Virden and Elkhorn, the quota was exceeded by 143.46%. The Pipestone lady curlers re-organized with Mrs. C. Hopkins as president and Miss Evelyn Low as secretary. The four skips appointed were: Mrs. A. Grant, Misses Polly McLennan, Marg and Molly Fairbairn.

40 YEARS AGO (Dec. 15, 1932)

The places of business in Reston will remain open at night until Christmas for the convenience of shoppers. The curling season opened last Thursday the games between the president and vice-president with the former winning by a small margin. The Young People of Hillview had a very interesting debate last week on the subject "Resolved that the motor car is of more value to humanity than the radio." Marjorie Naughton and Jack Watt supported the affirmative and Charles Campbell and Ida Campbell, the negative. The judges after due consideration declared a tie. A rink has been constructed by the young men of the Huston district at the windmill at the T. S. Huston's buildings. Curling is in full swing at Sinclair with R. Colquhoun in charge of producing good keen ice for the games. A large crowd gathered at the C. P. R. depot at Pipestone on Saturday last to bid farewell to Miss Georgina Forke who left via Winnipeg for The Pas where her marriage to W. Phillips will take place on Dec. 14. She was honored at a shower at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dodds prior to her departure.

50 YEARS AGO (Dec. 14, 1922)

The rink opened for the season on Friday night and the manager Roy Kendrick had the ice in good condition for skating. The first game of curling took place the previous evening and while the ice was not as keen as desirable some good curling was done. Work on the pits in the C. P. R. round-house at Reston, which has been in progress for some time, was completed on Saturday and the workmen left for Arcola to do similar work at that point. Fred Paul has sold his house to Mr. Stewart Bulloch, of Sinclair, who will move here in the morning. Mr. Paul will erect a home on his farm south of Reston as soon as weather conditions permit. (Editor's note: The house is now owned by George Pringle, having just been purchased by him from the late Fred Paul. The house is situated on the corner of Main and 1st St. near the above at the Pipestone curling rink waiting room on Saturday afternoon. He was the only occupant at the time. Quick action by citizens saved the building, with little damage done. Comment has been made to the Recorder that the children in Reston are ignoring the curfew and can be found on the streets long after it has been sounded.

60 YEARS AGO (Dec. 12, 1912)

Clyde J. Craig, who has been employed in the implement business at Elbor has sold his business to McKay Bros., of Rapid City, Man. Stock taking and transfer was completed last week. The question of Consolidation of Schools throughout the R. M. of Albert is being treated with indifference by the residents. A series of meetings has been planned for this week throughout the municipality to be addressed by speakers from the Department of Education. On Monday night a meeting had been scheduled for Kinloss. The trustees however had not even opened the school and after waiting until nine o'clock outside in inclement weather, the speakers returned to Reston having made their trip for nothing. It was certainly a cool reception to say the least. The Reston Citizens Band will play at frequent intervals at the skating rink this winter. Mr. Brasier, the present leader, hopes that any young people with the desire to play a brass instrument would advise him.

Mrs. H. P. Harrison phoned the Recorder to offer this piece of advice: "Nothing wrong with one for the road / If that is where you pour it". It gets cold in Bloomington, Illinois! But that did not deter the fans from attending the game between Bud Grant's Minnesota Vikings and the Green Bay Packers. Over 50,000 braved the 0 degree weather, which with the wind chill factor equalled 22 below. The Packers clinched the division title by easily defeating the Vikings in the Sunday afternoon televised game. It could be the end of a dynasty for the Vikings who have enjoyed great success under Grant, former Winnipeg Blue Bomber coach. You know Christmas has snuck-up on us. Next week is our Christmas edition and we haven't even done any work on it! But like they used to say about the Englishmen we will probably muddle through!

Outdoors Only

The charm of winter is partly in not thinking too much about it. If thought dwells on frost, thick snow, slick streets, dark days, heat bills, shortage of sunlight, one is apt to miss details of this season that has lately been delightful for morning and evening curl, such as last Monday morning's coral sunrise and the rich rosy sun-

set. Other pleasing details have been: gently sifting snow, the sparkle of new fallen snowflakes, warming sun rays in sheltered corners, brilliant star groups in night skies, coyotes yodelling their passions, and people who appreciate such beauties of nature. What is more fundamental than that we understand, appreciate and nurture our earth?

More winter delights have been noted by persons with well stocked bird feeders or with fruit trees. Two dozen Pine Grosbeaks and Evening Grosbeaks feeding in a yard, hopping and fluttering about in rich rose and gray, and black and white and yellow finery respectively, were the recently thrilling experience of Mrs. Gladys Balding. Mrs. Balding observed on another occasion what appeared to be nearly a hundred Bohemian Waxwings on and around an apple tree. This certainly is an impressive count at one time. With their prominent tufts, these Bohemians are more easily estimated by simply counting crests.

Astonishing is more the word for the Brown Thrasher that was observed recently, September 3 by Mrs. F. McMurchy and September 6 by Mrs. E. A. Wilkins. Mrs. Wilkins reported the Thrasher as appearing rather cold. Unless it has found itself a protective hot spot as a winter haven, this bird had better be hundreds of miles away, lest it should become a real, cool, solid chick, man! Another unusual spectacle Mrs. Wilkins has found interesting has been the five (or six, even) Boreal Chickadees coming fairly regularly to the feeder. This many chickadees of the Brown-headed species is surely an ornithological record for Reston.

Now is the time for making sure that suet logs are kept well loaded constantly, are kept reasonably stable, and kept out of reach of prowling pussies. Tack up a sunflower head with the face up and down, too, and you may be surprised at the feathered visitors you'll have. Eight or nine species are not to be wondered at, feeding at local sources.

Now is the time, too, for considering how much we have neglected riches of our district's early history, and think about recording memories of the few pioneers left amongst us; about preserving more of the artifacts that stand for a way of life, simple, rugged, and inspirational but forever gone; and about the stories of the old homesteads especially the ones whose great stone houses are beginning to crumble from their once unique strength and splendor. Let's do more than just think: let's set before our heritage is destroyed or stolen. At least, help the young people who are beginning to put some of the pieces together; they have a right to know and be inspired.

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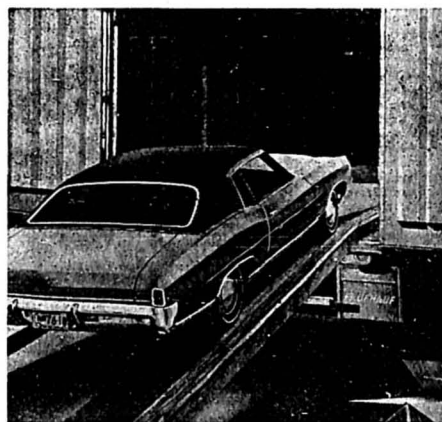

Chris was a long-time resident of the Reston district and had with his wife recently taken up residence in the West-Man Nursing Home at Virden.

More details will be available for next week.

History of Reston

It is fitting that the 70th anniversary of the founding of Reston should be celebrated on December 7th, for it was in December 1892 that the railway reached Reston. The first station was a box car at the south end of main street, later a station was built at the same site which was destroyed when a snow plow left the track and ran into it. The history "Pioneers of Pipestone" records "shortly afterwards the company (C.P.R.) decided they needed more room for yards and moved to where the present station stands." The present station? It has disappeared as the trend for demolishing stations on rural lines continues. And where are the trains? We are fortunate to have regular freight service and also in the fact that this line is not at present in danger of being abandoned.

Two elevators, both with large annexes, serve a large area — the United Grain Growers and the Manitoba Pool Elevator. One of the first elevators was the Lake of the Woods which burned down and was never replaced.

The first school is located on main street and is used as a rest room. The town and district is now served with two large schools, the Reston Collegiate and the Reston Elementary and pupils are bused in from long distances. Both schools are comparatively new and modern. A four room brick school constructed in 1905 was torn down in 1968 after the elementary school was built. The schools are in the Fort La Bosse School Division. The first teacher was a Miss Viva Giles. There are now eleven teachers in the Collegiate and ten in the elementary.

The first bank was the Bank of British North America and the late Jackson Dadds, who became one of the top officials in the Bank of Montreal, was one of the first managers. The Bank of British North America merged with the Bank of Montreal which still serves the district. An amusing story is told of the first Bank of North America building which was destroyed in a disastrous fire in those early years. It is said that during the excitement the pillars were carried out and the storm windows thrown down stairs! Only means of fire fighting was a bucket brigade and water was supplied by a well at the south end of the street, which has long since disappeared.

Reston now has a modern

fire engine and a well trained fire brigade under chief Ross Bezie. Many of the firemen have also received St. John Ambulance training and also serve as drivers for the Reston Ambulance service.

The first doctor to settle in the district was the late Dr. A. B. Chapman who came in 1900. A Dr. Baird had settled at neighboring Pipestone some years before that. The town now has a modern hospital, complete with laboratory and X-ray service. It has a full complement of nurses and full time lab technician and resident doctor. Rated as a 15 bed hospital, it can hold 20 beds and often does.

For years a local constable served as the police but now we have a 3 man detachment of the R.C.M.P. stationed here in a building constructed on 1st street a few years ago. Cpl. Peck is the present head of the detachment.

Water for the town was supplied from the town well on the west side and in 1902 town water and sewer service became available. The town water is now pumped from a well about two miles north to the pumping station in town.

The first Church in town was the Methodist and I. united with the Presbyterian Church built in 1902, long before Church union. The building was converted into a dwelling now owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Paul. The Presbyterian Church is now the United Church and 1972 marks the 70th anniversary of its building. The St. John's Anglican Church was built later and still serves the district.

1972 also marks the 70th anniversary of the G. S. Munro Co. Store. This store was built by the late Bill Pierce, and is built

of stone from the Kinloss district south of town. Some of the stone can still be found in that area on the farm formerly owned by Geo. Sutcliffe of Pentliten B. C. now owned by Lorne Watt. Mr. Munro was operator of the first store in town before building the present structure.

Recreation is an important part of rural life so it was natural that a rink would be constructed early — the first one being of wooden walls with canvas top. Now we have a fine modern structure with the curling section having four sheets of artificial ice. This is the 4th rink for the town. One of the early curlers was veteran Clyde Bulloch, now 85, who still curls with the men's senior club.

One of the first houses erected in Reston was the one owned by Mrs. Margaret Bulloch. The next year the house on railway avenue, now owned by Mrs. Harcourt Berry, was built by Mr. Jackson. The Jackson family lived there for some years and conducted a fuel implement business.

One of the first blacksmiths was Mr. H. Geen, father of Art Geen, a former resident here. Other blacksmiths we recall are A. Majury, Hugh Dunbar, Mr. Jones, J. Cronk and then Mr. I. B. Buan who recently retired due to ill health, and for the first time since those early years the town has no blacksmith.

The Reston Hotel was erected by Mr. Alex Robertson, of Antler. Other owners that we can recall are George Chapman, Andy Sutton, R. V. Cusack, John Bondar and Ed. Gulas. There may have been others as well.

Most of the facts concerning the town's early history were obtained from Mrs. T. A. Bulloch's book, "Pioneers of the Pipestone."

Reston man receives \$170 in compensation

WINNIPEG—An 18 year old Reston man who sustained damaged teeth after being assaulted by a juvenile last summer received \$170.00 in compensation. It was announced recently by Attorney General Al Mackling. The award is part of \$3500.00 awarded by the Criminal Injuries Compensation Board over the past month.

The Reston man's assailant, a juvenile, was found guilty of a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$5.00.

Other awards were: An award totalling \$2,332 was made to a 27 year old man who was shot as he approached the door of the home of his former common law wife in Winnipeg. The man sustained a gunshot wound to the left side of his abdomen and was out of work from October 18, 1971 to October 6, 1972 (with the exception of a five week period last summer). His assailant was found guilty of causing bodily harm with intent and sentenced to three years in the Stony Mountain Correctional Institute.

The father of an 18 year old man fatally shot last summer was awarded \$996 compensation. The incident occurred during a party. The assailant was found guilty of manslaughter and received a three year suspended sentence due to mitigating circumstances.

Three of the four continuing awards provided for an increase in the weekly award from \$49.50 to \$52.50 retroactive to October 1, 1972. This increase applied to:

A 17 year old woman who was struck on the head several times by a juvenile wielding an axe and was also choked. The woman suffered severe head injuries, remained unconscious or semi-conscious for about ten days after the injury and was initially rendered a quadriplegic but has since regained some movement. A juvenile was charged with attempted murder and has been undergoing psychiatric examination.

A 70 year old widow who sustained injuries when knocked to the sidewalk by a youth attempting to steal her purse on December 18, 1971. Her assailant has not been apprehended.

A 49 year old widow who suffered a broken left leg, damaged left knee, badly bruised hips and lower body when buried to the ground by a young man who snatched her handbag from her. Her assailant was not apprehended.
