### First grants made from Lottery funds

WINNIPEG—The first direct grants from lottery funds, totalling \$70,000, will go to three provincial agencies to assist in planning and development of recreational services and programs, Tourism, Recreation and Cultural Affairs Minister Laurent L. Desjardins has announced.

Agencies receiving the grants are:

• The Manitoba Sports Federation—\$25,000 to be used specifically for the administrative services for sports programs to the 46 provincial amateur sports governing bodies.

• The Manitoba Secondary School Athletic Association—\$25,000 to assist in the planning, organization, administration and co-ordination of sports activities of children in communities throughout the province.

• The Royal Canadian Legion Sports Foundation Incorporated—\$20,000 to be used specifically to provide sports equipment for the new pavilion and for programs conducted at the International Peace Gardens.

Mr. Desjardins said government approval of these grants is the first step toward implementation of major recreational programs announced in early May.

"These programs," the minister said, "have been designed to provide new and meaningful opportunities for recreation with particular emphasis on the areas where recreational opportunities have been limited or non-existent."

The programs include: capital cost assistance for new recreation facilities, a "games" development program, grants to recreation and sports agencies, and community recreational development projects.

Such programs are in line with the philosophy of the Lotteries Act which provides that revenue from government lotteries should be used for recreational and cultural purposes, Mr. Desjardins said.

### Mrs. Mary Lyons, long-time resident of the Cromer district is laid to rest

VIRDEN—The death of Mary Lyons occurred in Virden District Hospital on June 15, 1972 in her 87th year.

Mrs. Lyons was born in Moat, Ireland, on May 16, 1886. She came to Canada in 1904 and in 1908 was married to James H. Lyons. She resided with her husband and family on the farm near Cromer for 58 years. For the past six years she had been a resident of The Sherwood in Virden. She was an active worker in the U.C.W. One of her main interests was gardening and she was a devoted mother and neighbor.

Mrs. Lyons is survived by four sons, Dunning of Cromer, Harold of Virden, William of Dauphin and George of Calgary; three daughters, Mrs. R. Todd

(Kathleen) of Sudbury, Ont.; Mrs. C. Curll (Harriet) of Virden and Mrs. M. Curll (Marion) of Saskatoon; one brother Frank Mealliff of Philadelphia, P. A., and a sister, Mrs. P. Tobin (Christine) of Cape May, New Jersey. There are 13 grandchildren. She was predeceased by her husband in 1933 and a daughter Marie in 1911.

The funeral service was held in St. Paul's United Church on June 17 with Rev. H. W. Kemp officiating. Pallbearers were: G. Smeltz, H. Hayhurst, W. Mather, M. Senkiw, W. Kool and L. Coates, all of Cromer. Interment was in Virden Cemetery.

Over the years hundreds of children attended the school, including the late A. E. McKenzie, founder of the McKenzie Seed Co. of Brandon.

The present school, one of the finest one-room schools in Manitoba, was built in 1962. The grounds on three sides have fine shelter belt which was planted by Mr. C. Cruickshank in 1930.

In 1930 to cut the birthday cake were Mrs. Grose and Mrs. Grieve, who attended school at Sanderson some 70 years ago. Corsages were pinned on the two honored ladies and the present teacher, Mrs. Bev Leckie by Arvel Gray, Brenda Cruickshank and Bev Mathieson, all being the third generation to attend the school.

Mrs. Leckie presented the eight students attending the school with promotion certificates and also with a gift as a memento of the occasion. Mrs. Grose and Mrs. Grieve were presented with engraved silver spoons.

The Sanderson School became a part of the Fort La Basse School Division on Jan. 1st of this year. Because of the fact that enrolment would be only four children in the coming year, it was found necessary to close the school. F. R. Manning spoke on behalf of the Board.

Following a picnic supper, games were played and the last of the annual Sanderson picnics, one of the few events still held, came to a close.

## CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

Canada's five-year moratorium on the death penalty ends in December. Parliament must soon debate and draft new legislation. And MP's mail is reported running discouragingly high in favor of re-instatement of capital punishment.

The death penalty is the easy way out for an apathetic public. They can feel secure in the knowledge that one death has been avenged by another, that society has been purged of another threatening element.

Murder and violence is a condition of society itself. It is the pathetic story of poor mental and physical health, retardation, poverty, alcoholism, lack of educational or job opportunities mounting up in the pressure

cooker of daily existence -- until the final blowoff.

Will the death penalty stop the psychotic killer? Will it protect society from the premeditated killer who 'rubs out' for a price?

Invoking the death penalty for murder has just about as much logic as handing out the death sentence to the guilty party in a fatal auto accident. The punishment does nothing to get at the cause, it does nothing to deter murders or accidents in the future.

There must be alternatives. More research financed out of government grants -- more humane efforts and financing in the neglected areas of human misery -- poverty, education, housing and job opportunities.

## SOCIAL CRITIC, FRIEND OR FOE?

People are constantly urged to participate in community affairs and to work in support of groups protesting injustices and exploitations. But many fail to respond.

There are several reasons. Apathy, timidity, the let-Joe-do-it attitude are some. Protest is often regarded as slightly obscene if marching, carrying a sign demonstrating is involved.

Opposition to supporting protesting groups may be colored by personal attitudes toward criticism in general. In their everyday lives people abhor the critic. Criticism here is a sign of moral weakness and the com-

plaining critic of other people and situations is generally a mean, undesirable; someone to be avoided at all costs. But criticism of the problems and issues in society is a very different matter. In fact it is the very first step which sets in motion the process of change and the eradication of evils. The critic, the protester, thus performs a public service when he speaks out against injustice and exploitation and activates the nation's conscience against the festering sores of society.

Criticism and protest is thus a duty and obligation to all citizens with any sense of public responsibility.

Morrison, John Milliken, Bill Bulloch and Onufri Olenick of Camp Shilo spent the weekend at their respective homes in Reston.

40 YEARS AGO (July 7, 1932)

Reston tennis players were successful at Antler on Friday. Jean Hunter won the ladies singles, A. K. Cates, the men's singles and Dr. Hunter and A. K. Cates, the men's doubles. The heavy rain on Saturday and Sunday was warmly welcomed in the district as the late snow fields were beginning to show the effects of the prolonged drouth, while the wheat fields were pretty well dried out. . . . Haying operations are now in full swing and much of the wild oats on the summerfallow is being cut for winter feed. On the regular hay land, the crop is quite light owing to the dry weather. . . . Reston ball team split first and second money at the Oak Lake Sports on July 1st, when darkness prevented the final games from being played. Reston defeated Scarth, Cran-dall and Hartney to reach the final. Before the baseball contests, competition for the Beveridge Medal was run off. It

consisted of 100 yard dash, broad jump, high jump and shot put. Two Reston boys Kay Sib-bald and Ted Smith won first and second place respectively.

50 YEARS AGO (July 6, 1922)

The largest crowd to be seen in Reston in a long time attended the unveiling of the monument in the Reston Memorial Park on Friday. A European Tour

We boarded a plane at Kirk-wall airport for Aberdeen. The houses in the granite city were glistening even though it was raining. We toured Aberdeen; seeing the beautiful Mariahall College and a few people in their kilts. There were also numerous high rise buildings which can be seen along the skyline, as in Aberdeen, Glasgow, Limerick and London. We journeyed on to Edinburgh. Here we toured the Edinburgh Castle and the city itself and went out on a short bus trip to Linnlithgow to see the castle there, which was the residence of Mary, Queen of Scots. Leaving Edinburgh by bus bound for London, the scenery was magnificent. Crossing the Firth of Forth there were green hills and valleys with grazing cattle and sheep in the fields. At Dundee, we stopped for lunch and continued down through Newcastle-upon-Tyne to London. The following day we took a train to Dover and a boat across the English Channel to Ostende, Belgium. Looking back towards the English coast we could see the beautiful white cliffs of Dover. The channel was quiet and calm, so we enjoyed the crossing. On landing at Ostende we proceeded on to Brussels. Here we saw the very beautiful architecture of the Grand Place and the small statue of the famous Mannekin Pis. On then to Cologne, Germany where we walked across the Rhine river for a magnificent floodlit view of the outside of the famous cathedral with its spires looking as though they reached the sky. The inside of the cathedral is very old but well kept and beautiful. There were many pleasure boats as well as commercial boats and barges continuously sailing up and down the Rhine.

We then went out to see the gorgeous tulip fields and dotted by windmills in the Rotterdam, which has one of the largest harbours in the world. In to The Hague and The Hock where we embarked on a boat called Queen Juliana for a 6 hour trip back to Harwich, Eng. A journey of 6 hours and not too pleasant; rather rough and we were once again glad to leave the boat and entrain again for London.

Back in London we were really in for a busy time, but we knew we wanted to see much in such a short time before leaving for Canada. We did get to tour Westminster Abbey and the houses of Parliament where we sat in on a session of the House of Commons. Sorry to say there were not too many members present, but the topic in progress seemed to be about the Common Market. We watched the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace. This is a daily routine, but there are usually crowds of people viewing this magnificent sight. . . . After this we went to Regent Park to the zoo. Here we saw elephants, zebras, giraffes, monkeys, bears, ponies, flamingos, and all species of snakes. The famous panda bear Chi-Chi of whom so much publicity has been given recently on the finding of a mate for her. However she is very old and rarely appears to the public now and the idea of a mate has been given up. In Trafalgar Square amid the towering monument of Horatio Nelson we fed the millions of pigeons who perch on your arm, shoulder or head at will, and one seems to be afraid of stepping on them. They are really an attraction and need to say are well fed by the tourists. We took a cruise on the Thames river and the guide pointed out many points of interest such as Old Bailey, the famous courthouse, Cleopatras Needle, and places such as the home of Sir Christopher Wren while he was building St. Paul's Cathedral. There were also many at anchor which are used as floating museums, night clubs etc. We walked through Hyde Park, but unfortunately no one was speaking at the speakers' corner, so found it rather a quiet evening walk. The night life comes alive in Piccadilly and the Strand, Charing Cross and of course Carnaby Street is quite famous for its stylish shops.

One of the highlights of our tour came next day as we went out to Windsor Castle. Here we stood in a line up for 2 1/2 hours to view the lying in state of the late Duke of Windsor in St. Georges Chapel. This was truly a magnificent, though touching sight. Here resting on the catafalque was the coffin, draped with the Duke's royal standard and a single spray of beautiful

white lilies resting on the top, from his beloved wife, the Duchess. At the four corners of the bier were guardsmen in scarlet tunics, bearskin hats and the black armband of mourning, each with his head bowed and sword pointing into the rich carpeting. Along the pillars surrounding the inside of the chapel were many wreaths, bouquets, big and small all from dignitaries or just people who wished to leave a token in his memory. Many people bowed and wiped away a tear or two; but all was hushed, quiet and very orderly.

We then walked across the river to Eton College. Here the young students are all dressed in top hats, swallow-tail coats, striped trousers, white shirts and ties. One doesn't see that very often these days. Then we went off to Runnymede where there is a monument depicting the exact spot where King John signed the Magna Carta in 1215. Here also on a hillside is a beautiful monument placed in the memory of John F. Kennedy by the people of Britain.

Back in London we awakened early to view the parade marking the official birthday of the Queen. We stood in full view of the trooping of the color. Here the pageantry was really in scarlet tunics, bearskin hats, a sight to behold. The guards and the household cavalry on men having brightly polished shining black horses with the breast plates, plumed hats, kilts and regiments and bands of pipes and drums. Then came the Queen on a beautiful bay horse, wearing the scarlet tunic, navy blue skirt and hat and on her arm the black armband of mourning. She looked poetically radiant. Following her were the Duke of Edinburgh on a black horse and the Duke of Kent on a grey. Following in limousines came the Queen Mother, Prince Charles, Princess Anne, Prince Edward, Prince Andrew, Princess Margaret and the other members of the royal family, all smiling and waving. The Duchess of Windsor could be seen peering at the scene from a window in the Palace. To bring an end to the festivities the Queen and all the royal family appeared on the balcony to day the fly past the Royal Air Force. The cheers were deafening and the Queen smiled and waved to all. This was well worth the 5 hours we stood watching such a magnificent sight. Back to the hotel where we made preparations for our return journey to Canada. The end of a busy and tiring holiday, but one which we will remember for many years to come.

Arising at 5 a.m. we left our hotel and boarded a bus for Heathrow Airport as our plane was due to leave at 8:55 a.m. However it was delayed till 10:30, so we did have time for breakfast, besides checking our luggage. Finally with a little sadness in our hearts, we boarded our Air Canada flight for Canada. Flying at 35,000 ft. it was clear enough for the pilot to point out such places as Manchester, Blackpool, Glasgow, the outer Hebrides, Greenland, Fro-bisher Bay and our frozen northland, Churchill, Selkirk and also Winnipeg. We arrived here at 12:30 noon Canadian daylight time. Tired, yes, but glad to be back on Canadian soil.

Then you must know the correct procedure for obtaining a licence . . . and here it is.

1. A single public draw will be made on Tuesday, August 15th, for both hunting periods of the coming season in Duck Mountain Provincial Forest (game hunting area 18). Deadline for applications is 5:00 p.m., Monday, August 14. Applicants must be residents of Manitoba and must indicate their choice of hunting period A (September 11 to October 28, 1972 — male elk only) or B (December 11 to 23, 1972 — elk of either sex). If interested in either period, indicate order of preference.

Application forms are available from offices of Regional Directors at Winnipeg, Dauphin and The Pas and Conservation Officers throughout Manitoba or by writing the Department of Mines, Resources and Environmental Management, Room 802, Norquay Building, Winnipeg — R3C 0P8.

2. No draw will be held for combination elk-moose licenses valid from December 4, 1972 to January 27, 1973 around Riding Mountain National Park (game hunting areas 23 and 23A). These will be sold on a first come, first served basis to Manitoba residents and will allow the holder to shoot either one elk OR one moose of either sex. Application may be made in person, commencing Monday, August 28, to 120 1st Avenue, N.E. Dauphin and 1129 Queens Avenue, Brandon. Conservation Officers at Neepawa, Roblin and Grandview and the Secretary-Treasurer, R.M. of Rossburn, Rossburn. Applications will also be received in person or by mail at the Department of Mines, Resources and Environmental Management, Room 1003, Norquay Building, Winnipeg — R3C 0P8, also commencing August 28.

Elk-moose hunting in areas 23 and 23A takes place on privately owned and agricultural land, so hunters are advised not to purchase a licence without first finding a place to hunt.

One person may submit only one application. Where two persons apply on the same form, neither may submit a further application.

No person receiving an elk licence for hunting area 18 is eligible for an elk-moose licence in areas 23 and 23A.
