Horticultural Society

holds meeting

RESTON—The Reston and District Horticultural meeting was held Tuesday evening, July 11th with nineteen members present. Arrangements were made for the annual flower, fruit and garden show to be held in August.

Those present were unanimous in deciding to take a bus trip to the Polo Park flower show in Winnipeg. Instead of going to the English Gardens and Conservatory the members chose to go on a trip up the Red River on the Paddlewheel.

The possibility of having earlier entries for the Agriculture show was also discussed.

Municipality may stock poison

Grasshoppers are a threat?

RESTON—The Manitoba Department of Agriculture has informed the Rural Municipality of Pipestone that it will be responsible for the distribution of grasshopper spray to the farmers within the municipality for as long as the insects are a threat in 1972.

In a letter taken up at the

July 13th council meeting, the department explained that the two main commercial distributors of the insecticide in the province no longer have it in stock. Fortunately the Agriculture department was able to obtain a supply of "Hopper-kill" from Saskatchewan.

Those farmers requiring spray

are to contact the municipal office who will place an order with the provincial government. At the present time the council has had no requests for the spray but councillors were pessimistic that the grasshoppers would continue to be a threat for the remainder of the summer.

In some isolated areas near Pipestone and Scarth they are reported as being thick, and if the weather continues dry the menace could grow.

At the present time the council is looking into the possibility of stocking some of the spray in case of emergencies.

During the morning meeting Bill Busby made a representation on behalf of the Reston rink committee. Mr. Busby explained that unless the rink received additional funds the doors would have to remain closed this coming winter.

The council requested that the rink committee map out a "rink district" to ascertain what people of the surrounding districts make use of the rink. From such a study the council could derive at a method of raising money to cover the rink overhead.

It was also announced that the Rural Municipality of Pipestone's share of the evening meal during the Western Region Municipal Convention was \$121.50. During the month of June general accounts came to \$96.018.50 while waterworks accounts totalled \$2,007.88.

At the same meeting the council agreed to declare July 27, Reston Fair Day, and August 7 statutory holidays.

Another motion was passed which endorsed the building of a veterinary clinic at Redvers with the municipality in favor of contributing their share of the cost of the same.

The Agricultural Committee's recommendation that a n Agricultural School be sponsored in Alida from Dec. 4th 1972 until March 1973 was endorsed. Also approved was the recommendation that a Income Tax meeting be held in Storhoks some time in December. The Committee also recommended that the Municipality purchased Ruene and made it available to farmers at cost.

The air strip near Storhoks was discussed and the suggestion was made that the Village of Storhoks and the Municipality share the cost of maintaining it. The strip is being used more and more by oil companies and flying farmers from the surrounding districts.

Mrs. Rita Gauthier, sec-treas, was granted leave of absence from July 17th to August 5th for her holidays.

Accounts totalling \$7,550.58 were approved for payment. Reeve Nelson Harvey occupied the chair and councillors Milton Malin, Andrew McMillen, W. T. Real, Rene Chicoine and Emile Cop were in attendance.

A heavy rain on Monday evening helped the crop picture. Over an inch
