## Winter works program approved for Division

VIRDEN—The Port La Basse School Division No. 41 recently received word that 100% of its winter works program had been approved. The Division made application for grants under the 1972 Provincial Employment (P. E. P.) Program to cover labour costs incurred in a number of projects planned throughout the Division. The grants approved total \$9,264 while the Division will put up \$5,870 to cover the cost of materials.

The projects include the painting of about 38 classrooms, hallways, stairwells and washrooms; repairs to windows, doors desks and playground equipment; and the building of shelves, cupboards, etc.

The work which will provide employment for approximately a dozen persons must be completed by the end of May.

The Board of Trustees under the chairmanship of F. R. Manning approved the 1972 budget which now goes to the Public Schools Finance Board at the Department of Education for its approval. The budget, the first for the Division under the unitary system, totals \$2.3M.

## Local initiative still the biggest factor

RESTON—Local initiative is the key to the growth of a community, it was stated, at the briefing of REACT Caravan, which visited Reston on Friday February 18th. Several examples were cited, one being Steinbach, which in the opinion of economists, had no reason to exist, yet through local initiative it has shown tremendous growth.

The Caravan, who did not really attract many people, was viewed, however, by a good representation from the various surrounding areas, and was considered a success.

By means of maps and charts, a short film and explanations, much statistical information was made available and is now in the hands of the REACT Committee in the form of a 300 page booklet.

Among the statistics was the population shift, which showed the R.M. of Pipestone had lost 25% of its population since 1968 and also that the size of the farms had increased by approximately the same amount.

The possibilities for development of the area were also discussed, with mention being made of the ground water potential in the Broomhill district which could be used for irrigation purposes.

The possibilities for development of the area were also discussed, with mention being made of the ground water potential in the Broomhill district which could be used for irrigation purposes.

## Rules to be enforced at Hospital for visiting hours

RESTON—Hospital Administration is asking the question: Is the public aware of problems encountered by the staff during visiting hours? Hospital personnel will soon be asked to crack down on visitors that break hospital rules while visiting—but before such action is taken another question comes to mind: "Is the public aware of hospital rules about visiting?"

When asked about hospital rules, Mr. Exner, administrator of the Reston Community Hospital, presented the following with explanations of each.

### IF YOU ARE A GOOD VISITOR

Make short visits that do not tire patients. Visitors can be comforting and consoling but a long visit is exhausting. Think back to the last time you were in hospital. Short visits also allow others to visit the same patient. The observance of the rule that there should be no more than two visitors for each patient has been sadly neglected.

Mr. Exner was especially disturbed with this breach. With 17 patients in hospital we would normally have 34 visitors but with unlimited visiting the number could rise to 50. The noise and congestion is difficult even for healthy people to put up with. Furthermore, two people is all a patient can carry on a decent conversation with anyway.

Too often, I've seen visitors visiting with visitors instead of the patient. Very often these loud conversations will be about unpleasantities experienced by the visitor. By the time the visitor is ready to leave the patient is ready for a sleeping pill and a nervous patient after listening to the horror stories. Visiting should be quiet and the conversation should lead to pleasant thoughts after the visitor has gone.

In speaking to Mrs. Sutcliffe, Director of Nursing at the Reston Hospital, we gathered that the nurse on duty should be consulted more than at the present. Very often visitors will be caught lighting a cigarette around a patient receiving oxygen, or sitting on a patient's bed or bringing food to patients on a particular diet. Why should the nurse be asked about the patient or why shouldn't the visitor do the above. The nursing director replied that although oxygen doesn't burn or explode on its own it feeds even the smallest spark and stale smoke is repulsive to those who do not smoke. We have enough chairs to seat two visitors for each patient. If the number of visit-

ors exceeds two, visitors resort to sitting on the beds which breaks two of our rules. Sitting on a bed is at the least uncomfortable for the patient. A more important reason for observance is the spread of countless thousands of bacteria which surround each one of us. Many of the bacteria are left behind to be transferred to the patient who in his weakened condition will sometimes be worse off for having visitors. Everyone has from time to time heard stories about patients going into hospital for one ailment and attracting several others when he is in hospital such as pneumonia, gastro-enteritis etc. These ailments are not necessarily picked up because of carelessness on the part of the staff but are often left behind by visitors. In other words, visitors leave bacteria behind but they will also pick up thousands.

## WHY KIDS TAKE DRUGS

Discussion on drugs has reached the ludicrous stage where parents are full into a "guilt trap" egged on by numerous studies, surveys and pontifications of psychologists and psychiatrists.

Studies reveal that kids take drugs because Daddy or Mummy take tranquilizers, or they drink, or they don't go to church, or they are too busy with business, or Mother works.

So what's new? Humans have had their frailties since Eve plucked the apple and Adam ate it.

Kids take drugs for the same reasons adults take tranquilizers, or drink, or overwork -- they are lonely, scared, disappointed, have failed, are experimenting or trying to find out who and what they are.

The sooner adults stop flailing themselves with guilt about where the

kids are at, and begin to act, the sooner ways will be found to cope with the drugs. Use of drugs is not going to be stopped by ~~guilt~~ failed adults stiffening laws, lengthening jail sentences and asking the police to do their work for them.

Parents first have to lay down a few ground rules for children: like getting home on time, revealing where they were and with whom, helping with chores of running a home and a family. Next, parents should try talking and listening more.

Tonight would be a good time to discuss with the children why some parents drink, smoke, are busy with business, don't go to church or why Mother works. Then the subject could move on naturally to the children's ideas, thoughts and responsibilities.

It could be a beginning.

## COMPUTERIZED AUTOPAC?

From the experience of our provincial government with the computerized handling of Autopac, one comes to the conclusion that computers are not the end all and be all, that they are supposed to be.

As is now well known, because of delays and errors in connection with the computerized mailing of registration forms, the Manitoba government have had to extend the deadline for the paying of Autopac to March 15th.

The trouble with computers is that they are stupid. They can't even add one and one unless a human programmer directs them to. Citizens tend to blame the computer when errors occur, but the computer does exactly

as it is told to do, and when it errors the fault is usually human.

In the case of the Autopac blues and doubts a great deal of the troubles lies in the fact that this is a new venture and all the human errors have not been eliminated, like the applications that list only the cost of the licence plates and not the cost of insurance.

Fortunately in cases as mentioned above these can be straightened out at local Autopac agencies, but the late mailing is beyond the services that can be corrected by these agencies.

No doubt, as experienced is gained, many of the problems will be solved.
