Contract for Alstone let More funds needed

RESTON—The tender for the addition to the Alstone Lodge has been let to Delta Construct-ion for \$35,863.00; this figure is much higher than projected cost so it leaves the board short of funds. The municipality of Pipe-stone have agreed to find \$5,000, the municipality of Alsert have agreed to find \$2,250. The Snow-mabile Cuib have already donmobile Club have already don-ated \$1,400. The board itself could produce about \$1,000 from could produce about \$1,000 from reserves. It is necessary to have an equity of \$18,348 to maintain rents at present level of \$58.50 per single unit and \$73.00 for double. The above amounts now come to \$9,650. So one can see

The wholehearted support of the citizens of this community to keep the rents down is needed so that the board does not have to raise them to the limit al-lowed by Government of \$64.00 per single and \$84.00 per double. PIPESTONE A fire of un-known origin, totally destroyed a barn Wednesday night, July 19th on the Aurel Perreault farm, seven miles south of Pipein the Souris Hospital. The second accident occurred: on Friday night, July 21st when Mrs. Doreen Beauchamp was in-jured when ahe fell from the horse ahe was riding, and re-ceived back injuries. She was taken to Reston Hospital and then transferred to the Brandon hospital

farm, seven miles south of Pipe-stone. At about 12:30 p.m., the Res-ton fire brigade was called to the scene of the blaze, but by the time they reached the farm the fire had a good start. Ob-servers said the flames from the burning building were vis-tible from the outskirts of Reston.
