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## Contract for Alstone let More funds needed

RESTON—The tender for the addition to the Alstone Lodge has been let to Delta Construction for \$53,883.00; this figure is much higher than projected cost so it leaves the board short of funds. The municipality of Pipestone have agreed to find \$5,000, the municipality of Albert have agreed to find \$2,250. The Snowmobile Club have already donated \$1,400. The board itself could produce about \$1,000 from reserves. It is necessary to have an equity of \$18,348 to maintain rents at present level of \$58.50 per single unit and \$73.00 for double. The above amounts now come to \$9,650. So one can see

the board's dilemma.

The wholehearted support of the citizens of this community to keep the rents down is needed so that the board does not have to raise them to the limit allowed by Government of \$84.00 per single and \$84.00 per double.

Just stop and think—where can our senior citizens find a place to rent which is lower than ours and expect the same accommodation?

Remember we have chosen this method of financing so that we can maintain control of our Lodge.

RESTON — During the July 20th regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce held in the Memorial Hall two representatives on behalf of the Assiniboia Community College & the local detachment of the R. C. M. P. were heard.

Mr. John Stonehouse, representative for the Assiniboine

Community College outlined the diploma courses offered at the college and described how they could be obtained for a very reasonable cost.

Corporal A. Peck, of the local detachment along with Constable Tudball were present to answer questions concerning the R. C. M. P. Mr. Peck said that

we could enjoy the co-operation of all concerned of which the meeting expressed its satisfaction and support.

The Chamber of Commerce president Walker thanked both representatives for their attendance.

A report was heard on the success of stocking the pool with fish earlier this year. The report expressed a need for a screen over the mouth of the culvert.

During the annual municipal meeting held June 20th some of the Chamber executive heard a submission by McDowan, a representative of the Manitoba Telephone System. Mr. McGowan assured them that the present set-up of the Sinclair, Pipestone and Reston exchanges would not be changed. The M. T. S. representative pointed out that a rise in cost was inevitable, but was maybe not as high as we had been led to believe.

L. Ludlam, Jim Walker and A. Smith were elected to a committee set up to formulate an estimate on the cost of fogging material and maintenance.

On the motion of L. Ludlam and Dave Bradwell, Art Smith, Henry Clausen and Gordon Bieber will comprise a committee to approach the town merchants about promoting Big Buck Days. It was noted that it was the 80th birthday of Reston and the 70th of the building of the Munro Store.

It was reported that two picnic tables have been constructed and donated to the campsite.

The committee was reminded to be on hand for the cooking of the hot cakes for the breakfast on fair day. Prices were set at 35c for hotcakes and 50c for hotcakes and bacon.

By motion of John Abbey and Art Smith it was decided to invite Mr. Norman Williams, regional manager for Greyhound, Winnipeg to speak on Greyhound.

Mr. Dave Bradwell suggested that a Padel Pushers Club for bike riders be started. Such a club would provide instruction for bicycle riders in courtesy on the road and bicycle care. Mr. Bradwell also brought up the possibility of using the gravel pit as a swimming hole, providing it was cleaned up.

Nineteen members and four visitors were present at the meeting.
