RESTON — Anyone receiving the old-age security pension and owning a home can now receive a grant for repairs or improvements. Mr. Lorne Watt, N.D.P. candidate for Arthur today the Recorder on Monday. Recent changes in the regulations make this possible.

A grant of \$150.00 is available to any pensioner, and a maximum of \$500.00 to a pensioner receiving the full supplementary pension. A pension of from \$80.50 to \$96.00 qualifies for a \$200.00 grant and from \$97.00 to \$168.00 for a \$300.00 grant. Beyond that \$400.00 is available up to the maximum.

Mr. Watt emphasized that these are outright grants and are not repayable to the government.

The minutes were read and adopted, and the financial statement for January approved as presented.

Bills amounting to \$3,843.77 were approved for payment. The following grants were paid: Muscular Dystrophy Ass'n, \$10.00; C.N.I.B. \$10.00; Salvation Army \$10.00; Red Cross Society, \$10.00; 4 cemeteries in Municipality \$35.00 each.

Tenders are to be advertised for supplying of Diesel fuel to the municipality for the 1972 season and also for supplying of 135 gallons 2-4D Amine 80 and 10 gallons LV Brush Killer 64. Tenders to be in by March 1st, 1972 at 1:30 p.m.

Next regular meeting to be held on March 1st due to the convention coming up on March 6th.

Paul Lanski and Omer Sylvestre will be hired as grader operators for the 1972 roadwork season at \$2.10 p.h. as of April 1st, 1972.

Financial statements for the month of Bellegarde and the Water & Sewer statements for both hamlets were reviewed. The budget was discussed quite at length and is to be finalized at the next meeting. Letter from Municipal Assistance, Authority concerning installing of metal signs was reviewed and found to be quite favorable. Some discussion was brought up on the possible erection of a Veterinary Services Clinic in Redvers. The matter of buying a fire truck was brought up. The Reeve and part of the council is to meet with the Fire Brigade and the Village council on this matter.

Wolves are few in numbers

R.M. of Pipestone
gives a \$5000
grant for Alstone

RESTON — The R. M. of Pipestone council at a meeting on Thursday of last week made a grant of \$5,000 towards the enlargement of the Alstone Lodge.

Alstone Lodge has a waiting list of 14 people some of them having been on the list for two years.

Frank Patmore and Rev. E. Schurman interviewed the council on behalf of the Lodge Committee. It is anticipated that six additional suites will be added to the building at a cost of something over \$50,000, of which about \$12,000 must be raised from local sources.

Walter Redlick of the Provincial Games Branch interviewed the council in regard to the petition asking for the eradication of wolves in the Cromer-Ebor district, where it was alleged that they were destroying the cattle.

Mr. Redlick told the council that an aerial survey had been made in the area and only two wolves were seen. A subsequent ground survey indicated the presence of from six to eight wolves.

Thirteen of the 25 signers of the petition were interviewed. Mr. Redlick stated and none of them were certain that they had any livestock losses with the exception of some poultry.

Mr. Redlick pointed out that wolves were the only controlling factor of nature for skunks and raccoons. In areas where the coyotes have been practically eliminated there was a high incidence of rabies, which is generally spread by skunks.

Discussion took place on the proposed Veterinary Clinic and it was felt that the municipality would not enter into the agreement until the R. M. of Wallace agreed to provide the land and the necessary water and power services or pay \$900 towards such services.

On motion it was agreed that the Unincorporated Village District Committee of Reston would take over the responsibility of the operation of the water and sewer system in the village.

Other actions of council included:

- Authorizing the payment of the \$20.00 membership in the Manitoba Good Roads Association.

- Passed a by-law authorizing the borrowing of up to \$100,000.

- Authorized all council members and the secretary-treasurer to attend the Municipal Officers Seminar in Brandon on March 1st and 2nd with expenses paid and the council members to receive \$10.00 a day.

- Approved payment of December accounts in the amount of general municipal \$55,824.09 & waterworks operating \$17,775.73 and January accounts of general municipal \$4,173.18 and waterworks operating \$1,767.76.

Reeve Carl Wadsworth occupied the chair and all members of the council were in attendance.

Sifton Council will reconsider its position on the Veterinary Clinic

OAK LAKE — The R. M. of Sifton Council held their meeting on Tuesday, February 8th, 1972 with all members present and Reeve G. W. Howat occupied the chair. Accounts totaling \$6,425.94 for the month of January were approved.

A grant of \$200.00 was made to the Hartney Cameron Lodge.

Council appointed Municipal officials for the year for offices of poundkeepers, appraisers and fire guardians.

G. W. Howat was appointed as proxy, and Lloyd Atcheson was appointed as alternate to the West-Man. Regional Development Inc.

The R. M. of Sifton will use their snowplow to clear snow off the ice on Oak Lake Beach for the Manitoba Snow Festival.

The R. M. of Sifton has received requests to reconsider its decision not to join a Veterinary Clinic. It is council's decision to find out what the ratepayers' feelings are towards this plan. Ratepayers are urged to discuss with the councilor in their wards, the advantages and the disadvantages of joining in such a Clinic and let their opinions be known.

A grant of \$25.00 was approved for the Boy Scouts of Canada.

Due to increase in costs in operating, the Council have had to increase the rates for municipal machinery. The new rates will be effective immediately, and are as follows: HD 16 Cat and Scaper or Cat and Dzer-\$15.00 per hour. 600 Champion Grader-\$12.00 per hour; F12 Caterpillar Grader \$10.00 per hour. Ratepayers will still be able to have up to 8 hours work done in any one year.

Meeting was adjourned to meet again on March 14th, at 10:30 a.m.

WHERE ARE OUR PRIORITIES?

Spacecraft that can quickly be turned into nuclear bombs, underground nuclear tests that bring protests from around the world, missiles fired from the submarines and bombers—these are the monstrous weapons that continue to haunt mankind.

Total defense costs around the world are today nearing the \$200-billion figure annually. This is an indictment of national leaders, and tends to point up particularly, the stupidity of the two superpowers, the United States and the Soviet Union, whose defense planner admits that Washington and Moscow have reached nuclear parity.

The most ludicrous aspect of the continuing arms race is the sorry state of the United Nations, without doubt the most vital single organization in the world. Although Washington and Moscow spend countless billions on defense, between them they

owe more than \$45-Million to the U.N. The worst offender is the Soviet Union which owes a total of \$32-Million — \$22-Million for this year, and \$10-Million for previous years.

For the first time in history, the United Nations annual budget for 1972 will pass \$200-Million, yet the nations of the world each year spend a thousand times more on weapons and other means of defense.

The arms race and the financial plight of the United Nations, which is always pleading with its members to pay its debts, are negative examples of mankind's follies. Where do our priorities lie? Do we keep pouring billions of dollars into nuclear and thermonuclear bombs until some fiend like Hitler decides to attempt global conquest by nuclear war? Or do we seek world peace through a body like the United Nations? Any sane person will know the answer.

A REMINDER

The Southwestern Manitoba Deer Project is gaining notice, the Brandon Sun having given it coverage last week, and T.V. crews being out on the trapping areas too. Keep posted for noon programming.

It is now considered that one deer per day in each of five traps is a fair average. In areas where trapping was weak, relocation of traps was undertaken—no problem as the traps are mounted on runners.

Yields from the trapping has resulted in roughly twice as many females being caught in the Lauder area. In the Lyleton area, the ratio of bucks to does is about 50-50. The majority of the animals checked turn out to be young ones, probably owing to curiosity that has not yet been tempered by adult caution and alertness. The attraction for these deer is a little wheat used to bait the traps.

Getting on the subject of birds, a report last week in the Western Producer stated there now are 80 Whooping Cranes in the world, an increase of four over last year's count. Fifty-four adult and five young whoopers arrived in late December at their winter home, the Aransas Game Refuge in Texas. Twenty-one Whoopers exist in captivity.

Who has seen Horned Larks? Sunday, report had it that some had been observed northward from Pipestone Junction along Highway 83. Shortly after, three Horned Larks were seen a few miles south of the Junction. No more Horned Larks were seen that day, but 33 Sharp-tailed Grouse were, mainly in the Clairiere area, as well as Redpolls, Gray Partridge and Magpies. Please report sightings of Horned Larks.

Concerning Magpies, farmers or others who need to reduce the numbers of these noisy and noisy poachers may obtain plans for the construction of Magpie traps—useful also for catching Crows or Sparrows—by writing to: Canadian Wildlife Service, Prairie-Migratory Bird Research Centre, Mobile 1, Saskatoon, Sask.

According to Dr. E. A. Christenson, Associate Research Officer, Geology Division, Saskatchewan Research Council, the Pipestone Valley is cut into glacial drift and bedrock of the Riding Mountain Formation (gray shales), neither of which contains catlinite (pipestone) as far as is known. The theory, then, that Indians were responsible for bringing the material here from Minnesota appears to

be practically confirmed, and hence they deserve the credit for why the valley and creek came to be known as the Pipestone.

Driving in town is revealing in several ways. Not only does one see man's works, affections and disaffections in the midst of the framework of nature, but also the very nature of man as shown by where and how he drives. Have you noticed how much man herds together with man when he drives in the same old, tried and true track that

everyone else has used? Ironically enough, the tried and true way is the same way that developers holes, ridges, soft spots, roughness, and other inferior qualities that are emphasized with continued driving in the same old track. If every driver drove with even a bit of originality and imagination and perseverance therein, the road would remain longer in a better condition and become cleaner sooner. But no, man appears to be a prisoner of tradition and habit, and must stick to the beaten track, following the behaviour

of his fellowman like a blind sheep. Consider the magnificence of William Ellery Channing's words: "I call that mind free which resists the bondage of habit, which does not live on in its old virtues, which listens for new and higher warnings of conscience, and rejoices to pour itself forth in fresh and higher exertions." Isn't there something in this for driving as well as for the greater trip, life itself?

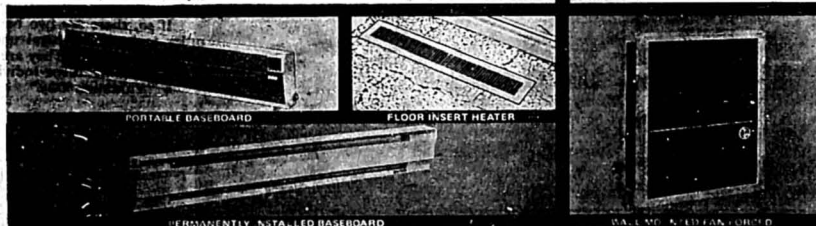

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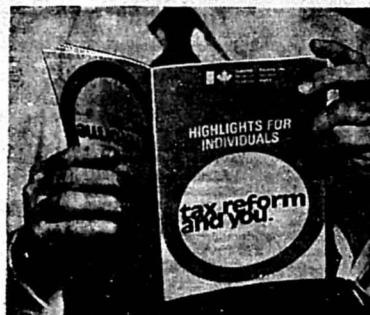

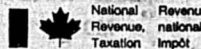
