WHERE ARE OUR PRIORITIES ?

WHERE ARE ON Spacecraft that can quickly be turned into nuclear bombs, under-ground nuclear tests that bring prot-tests from around the world, missiles fired from the submarines and bomb-ers—these are the monstrous weapons that continue to haunt mankind. Total defense costs around the world are today nearing the \$200 -billion figure annually. This is on in-dictment of national leaders, and tends to point up particularly, the stupidity of the two superpowers, the United States and the Soviet Union, whose defense planner admits that Washing-ton and Moscow have reached nuc-lear parity.

ton and Moscow have reached nuc-lear parity. The most ludierous aspect of the continuing arms race is the sorry state of the United Nations, without doubt the most vital single organiza-tion in the world. Although Washing-ton and Moscow spend countless bil-lions on defense, between them they

owe more than \$45-Million to the U. N. The worst offender is the Soviet Union which owes a total of \$32-Mil-lion — \$22-Million for this year, and \$10-Million for previous years. For the first time in history, the United Nations annual budget for. 1972 will pass \$200-Million, yet the nations of the world each year spend a thousand times more on weapons and other means of defense. The arms race and the financial

and other means of defense. The arms race and the financial plight of the United Nations, which is always pleading with its members to pay its debts, are negative examples of mankind's follies. Where do our priorities lie? Do we keep pouring bil-lions of dollars into nuclear and ther-monculear bombs until some fiend like Hitler decides to attempt global con-quest by nuclear war? Or do we seek world peace through a body like the United Nations? Any sane person will know the answer.

The theory, then, that Indians were respon-sible for bringing the material here from Minnesota appears to

be practically confirmed, and hence they deserve the credit for why the valley and creek came to be known as the Pipe-. . .

Consider the magnificence William Ellery Channing of William Ellery Channing's words: "I call that mind free which resists the bondage of habit, which does not live on in its old virtues, which listens for new and higher warnings of conselence, and rejoles to pour itself forth in fresh and higher exerctions." Ian't there some-thing in this for driving as well as for the greater trip, life it-self
