Friendly and Outgoing

(from West-Man Publication
"As Others See Us")

Sinclair, Manitoba, is a town in transition, struggling for survival, fearful of losing more people. It is indicative of the town's population of thirty souls that they want to hold on to what they have, and even to what they enjoy the services of a local elementary school, rarely these days for smaller populations.

Sinclair Elementary School is the largest building in town, apart from the elevator. It is a two-storey stone structure, in good repair for its age, its bell tower and bell still in use daily, an anachronism these days of single-storey schools with electronic communications. Tucked into the lee side of Sinclair Elementary, like a chick beside its mother, is a small white frame building, its faded lettering reads "Clover Hill School". The Sinclair and Clover Hill schools are the first in the pattern of transition: they now represent four former sub-districts: Bardal, Clover Hill, Sinclair and Diana. But Sinclair now has joined the Fort La Basse unitary system, and within a couple of years the district youngsters in all grades must be bused to Reston. Watching over this constant pattern of change is the primary teacher, Alice Bartel.

"I studied the area before I got to know the people. I do think there are differences, subtle differences, between East-Man and West-Man. Here the landscape is more rolling, and the tree growth is different to what you'd see on those Red River valley plains. I find the people friendly and outgoing, and in some ways trying to resist the changes going on around here." To emphasize her topic, she pointed at the walls and blackboards of her little white schoolhouse, its single room bright and friendly with samples of artwork by its grade one and two pupils.

Now in her third year with the Sinclairites, Miss Bartel has every sympathy for their position. "I know that the educators tell us that their units are more efficient, and present more challenge, but I'm a primary teacher and all I can think of is little Johnny getting lost when he's thrown in with four hundred others. That can't hap-

pen here, not in a school this size.

Miss Bartel is fearful of the social consequences of the unitary system. "I think I know how the people of this district are attached to their home town, no matter how small it is. When we have a meeting of Home and School, they show a real, genuine interest in what's going on."

"But their children may not follow their parents in this respect. Why should they? If every morning they're wrenched out of their homes and shipped off to school elsewhere, they'll end up with divided loyalties to their home and to other people... perhaps no loyalties at all."

Miss Bartel's interest in tightly-knit communities may spring from her own background in East-Man. She took her first ten grades of school at Kleefer, then eleven and twelve by correspondence, then 3½ years at Bethesda Hospital in Steinbach, and a year of permit teaching before going to the University of Manitoba for a year of teacher training. She is a Mennonite, and others of her faith represent a growing segment of the farm population in the Sinclair district. A few miles west and north of town is a collection of Mennonite farms, their owners of Dutch or German extraction, former residents of the Red River Valley. These families, about twenty-five in all, have relocated gradually, following the path of the first families who moved here in the late '40s. Their children represent five of the eighteen youthful scholars in Miss Bartel's two-grade room. They attend the Mennonite Church of God in Christ at nearby Bardal.

Some city dwellers might be surprised to learn how self-sufficient villagers can become when they want to. "We have only one small store in Sinclair, but it's surprisingly complete. I really don't have to leave town if I don't want to, but I do go to Reston once in a while; to Virden occasionally for in-service teacher meetings; and once in two years I've shopped in Brandon."

STRONGER CASES FOR SEAT BELT USE...

The treacherous condition of Thunder Bay streets and a rash of accidents recently brings up the subject of seat belts and the need to wear them. Safety belts are proven injury deterrents & Canada has been hounding drivers to use them ever since they were first installed in cars. But between 65 — 70 per cent of the drivers in this country stubbornly refuse to use them even though every car produced in Canada after Jan. 1st, 1971, must be equipped with belts. By contrast, 60 — 70 per cent of Australians use belts.

A timely article in The Financial Post states drivers may not only save their lives by using belts, they may also save money in the event of a crash. In two cases in Canada a judge found accident victims partially responsible for their deaths because they failed to wear belts. Even though the other driver had caused the accident the victim's beneficiary received less money in the settlement.

There was the case of Dr. Yuan of British Columbia who was thrown from his car and killed in a highway accident. His wife was sitting between her husband and another passenger and her seat was not equipped with belts and she collected full damages for injuries sustained in the crash. However, the award for loss of her

husband was reduced by 25 per cent even though the other driver was fully to blame. Dr. Yuan was found guilty of "contributory negligence." In other words, his failure to buckle up had been partially responsible for his ejection from the car and his death.

The judge, Mr. Justice Munro based his decision on this evidence and "upon the general knowledge of mankind." He found "that lap belts are effective in reducing fatalities and in minimizing injuries." He adopted the view of an American judge, Felix Frankfurter who once said, "There comes a point where this court should not be ignorant as judges of what we know as men." Dr. Yuan knew better than to disregard the safety belt.

It is rather obvious Canadians are immune to publicity aimed at using seat belts. Something stronger is needed. Dr. Allen Linden, a professor at Osgoode Hall Law School, Toronto, wants to have laws passed making belt use mandatory, and he feels that if the courts accepted the contributory negligence argument more often it would push legislatures into pushing such laws.

Maybe it's about time a little muscle was added to save lives motorists persists in endangering.

ARE PRISONS GETTING TOO SOFT?

Time was that "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" was the guiding principle for punishment. Most people conveniently overlook the fact that a careful reading of that passage in the Bible shows it means an eye for an eye is the maximum punishment that can normally be sought. The message of the Bible surely is that mercy (not to mention commonsense) should prevail.

This should be remembered when considering the extensive penal system reforms being introduced by Canada's Solicitor - General, Jean - Pierre Goyer. He is trying to change the system from punishment to rehabilitation.

In his short term of office he has moved to allow payment of a basic wage to some prisoners, provided them with ordinary civilian clothing, allow-

ed them normal haircuts, eliminated censorship of their letters and allowed thousands of them to leave jail on the weekends.

Canada has probably jailed more people, proportionally, than any other civilized country. It is something that every thinking Canadian must face.

And it hasn't worked. The crime rate has continued to go up. What's more, it's expensive. It costs more than \$10,000 yearly to keep a man in prison; only \$400 a year to keep him on parole.

Society's treatment of prisoners works much the same way as its treatment of youth, the aged, dissenters, policemen, and in fact, any group you want to mention. Members of all those groups will tend to behave the way they're expected to -- be that good or bad.

We have to help people to their feet if we expect them to walk.

News from the sky: The Pioneer 10 spacecraft is en route towards the planet Jupiter at a reduced speed of 20,500 miles per hour, having already at one stage of its flight, been travelling at 31,413 miles per hour, nearly 7,000 miles faster than any space vehicle has flown. 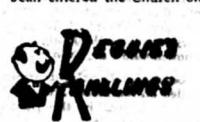
After a week or so of that 30 below stuff, it felt like spring when we stepped out of the house on Monday morning into the balmy 20 above weather,

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Outdoors Only...

Wouldn't it be interesting to know what the weather has around the corner for us? That way, at least, one could be better prepared for some of the wildly changing conditions, such as, for example, last Monday's spinning, melting drizzle in the forenoon to frigid, blustery gale in the evening. Ah, well; such is the variability of our fascinating climate; throw me mukluks, Miranda!

Even snowshoes serve well since the last, mild blizzards accumulations. A ramble on them last Saturday in Reston Park was a specially interesting occasion, partly for the patterned trails, sparkling gobs of snow, and blue shadows, and partly for some first photo shots helped by a new telephoto lens.

The same day a spin-out north of Reston discovered a flock of Snow Buntings, swirling and alighting ahead of the car, about 85 strong, patterning their flight with beige, black and white. More interesting yet was the flock of 19 Pine Grosbeaks at a most untypical location, in snow-laden scanty bush and ragged grass beside a frozen slough. A logical explanation could be that the attraction was hips, to which the snow almost reached—rose hips, that is. Richly rosy males and gray and dusky golden females appeared to be making a good job of this tasty and nutritious diet.

Only near home on the return trip from the lakeside Sunday celebration the Oak Lake

festivities awed the nearest environment! were Horned Larks encountered: 13 over a 6-mile stretch—a clear migratory increase over counts of the week before.

About a half a mile west of Hillview School Evan Ellis observed a rather special owl. Snowy Owls aren't so rare, but in this instance the Snowy was loaded, not with mouse, or Snow Bunting, but with Gray (Hungarian) Partridge. That must have made a good meal for the owl. Anyway, either the usual winter fare for the owl was running low or that partridge was just unlucky.

Even more outstanding has been the report from David Hatch of the Manitoba Museum of Man and Nature about a Red-bellied Woodpecker having been observed in Victoria Park at Souris, February 22. The event is remarkable because the Red-bellied Woodpecker is a rare, permanent resident of far southern Ontario; rare, accidental visitor to Saskatchewan from the south; and has been seen (recorded) only three times in Manitoba.

Extensive black-and-white zebra-like barring of back and wings, combined with red on the head, distinguishes this species from other Canadian woodpeckers. Males have the whole top of head, nape, and back of neck bright red. The red suffusion on the belly is hard to see in both sexes. It was Mrs. Barbara Robinson, a reliable observer from Brandon, who saw one of this species of woodpecker at Souris. However, as is usual for official records, another reliable sighting, supported by color photographs, would provide the unarguable evidence for the Red-bellied Woodpecker to be

Deer tagging complete

in this area

BEANDON — Residents of southwestern Manitoba are being asked to assist in a program being carried out by the Manitoba Department of Mines, Resources and Environmental Management to determine how large an area a specific group of deer occupy and to determine the extent of their winter and summer grazing ranges.

About 85 deer were marked in the program to make them easy to identify. Persons seeing these animals are asked to report the locations to help develop management decisions for the maintenance of deer in the southwestern part of the province.

The deer were caught in 24 large wooden traps placed throughout the area. These traps have doors at both ends which close simultaneously when the animal touches a string located above the forage left in the centre of the trap. They were checked several times a day by conservation officers, volunteers and persons hired for this purpose.

When a deer was caught, a collar of plasticized rope carrying a large numbered tag and seven 'flags' of various colors was placed around its neck. The collar was fastened with a metal clip which gives way if the collar is to catch on a fence, tree branch or other object. The color pattern of the flags identifies the individual animal and the area in which it was taken. A metal ear tag similar to that used on domestic cattle is also attached to provide identification if the collar is lost.

The predominant colour used on the collars is rocket red and is similar to the colour of a hunter's cap. It is hoped this will alert hunters to the fact the deer is marked and encourage them to make sure of their target.

The mines, resources and environmental management department will be making ground and aerial checks of the deer, but will depend to a large extent on reports by persons seeing the animals. If one of the marked deer is seen, note should be taken of the number on the neck tag if possible, the pattern of the collar flags, and the location of the sightings. These facts should be reported to the nearest conservation officer or departmental biologist.

Marked deer may be seen throughout a large portion of southwestern Manitoba as the traps have been placed in a number of locations that will give comparisons of the type of habitat in which the deer live.

Members of the Department of Mines, Resources and Environmental Management will meet with interested groups to explain
