Manning-Dyck exchange marriage vows at a ceremony in Winnipeg

WINNIPEG—The marriage of Dr. Frank Arthur Manning and Karin Hertha Dyck was solemnized in the First Mennonite Church here at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, July 28th, with Rev. Ron Hunsicker performing the double ring ceremony.

The bride party entered the church to music played by the church organist. Members of the party were the bride and groom; matron of honor, Mrs. Erica Trimble, sister of the bride, Dr. Garry Krepert, best man; Joyce Carlson, friend of the bride, Victor Dyck, brother of the bride, Lauretta Manning, the

groom's sister, and Ross Manning, his brother; the little flower girl, Andrea Dyck, niece of the bride and her nephew, Christopher Dyck, the ring bearer.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. August Dyck of Springdale, and the groom, the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. R. Manning of Reston.

Soloists for the occasion were Erica Dyck, cousin of the bride, and Eileen Funk, a friend of both Frank and Karin, who sang "A Wedding Song" accompanied on the guitar by her husband Robert.

The bride was radiant in her gown of chiffon embroidery on white silk tulle with guipure lace trim. The gown was empire style with short puffed sleeves. Her cathedral veil of silk illusion was completely edged with guipure lace threaded with white satin ribbon. Her flowers were a bouquet of white gladioli with centre of petals from her attendants bouquets, all tipped in tangerine and sprinkled with bridal wreath.

The bride's attendants all wore identical floor length gowns of empire waisted cool summer green voile with white cameo shaped flowers on them. 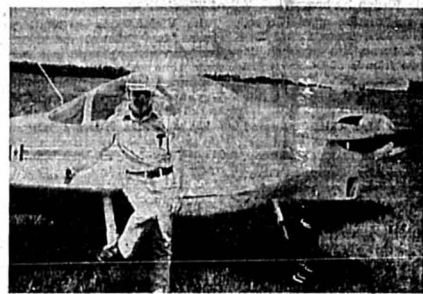
Master of ceremonies at the reception was Dr. Garry Krepert. The toast to the bride was proposed by the groom.

Verne Glass and his home-built plane



Verne Glass, a former resident of Reston flew into town last week from Winnipeg and used the No. 5 fairway at the Reston Golf Course as a landing strip for his home built aircraft. The plane, built from plans provided by a French designer, Pierre Emeraude took Verne five years to build. Classified as an ultralight by the Department of Transportation, the machine weighs only 557 pounds empty. It is a low wing two passenger plane powered by a 90 horse power Continental engine which gives it a cruising speed of 128 miles per hour. Fuel consumption is four gallons per hour and with a 20 gallon tank it has a range of over 500 miles, without refueling. The frame of the machine is wood and the wings are fabric covered. Wing span is 28½ feet and the fuselage is 22 feet long. Painted white with blue stripes the machine reflects the immaculate workmanship of Verne. Those who remember him when he operated the theatre at Reston, will recall his many talents, figure skating, photography, radio repair work and boat building. He has been employed with the C. B. C. for many years, since moving to Winnipeg.

Harvesting in this district will be two weeks later than last year, agent says

RESTON—The harvest this year is running two weeks behind that of last year, according to Reston United Grain Growers agent, Bob Turnbull.

By last Monday, August 14, only 500 bushels of rape had been brought to the U.G.G. elevator, as well as a small quantity of barley. The rape graded

No. 1 northern and the barley No. 1 feed, although Mr. Turnbull said he hadn't really seen enough of it to predict the average grade.

Mr. Turnbull told the Recorder on Monday that he expected barley and rape to come sometime this week, while wheat could be delayed a week to ten days. But with the rain and damp weather of the past week it could, foreseeably be much later than this.

John Williamson, Manitoba Pool agent at Reston reported he received 500 bushels of new barley last week which graded No. 1 feed.

At Pipestone, Reg Yeo, the United Grain Growers agent reports that a small amount of rye had been delivered to elevator.

Not enough grain has been combined to forecast an average yield, but fields generally look promising, although there are reports of aphids in the wheat and staghead infestation in the rape fields.

RESTON—Medical coverage at the Reston Community Hospital will be provided by various means until a permanent general practitioner can be located. The service will be reduced but it is possible that this will be the case only until the 20th of August when it is hoped that a doctor will set up a temporary practice to the end of this month. The Local Administrative Committee is hopeful that a permanent doctor will then practice in Reston.

Keystone Center request \$20,000

RESTON—Administrators of the Brandon Keystone Centre have asked the Rural Municipality of Pipestone to pledge \$20,000 (one half mill levied for five years) towards the building costs of the new centre.

At a conference attended by three councillors from Pipestone municipality along with delegates from other surrounding municipalities, the Keystone board explained that the grants

would be used only for construction purposes. Any deficit incurred by operating expenses beyond total gate receipts would be picked up by the federal and provincial governments.

During the August 10th council meeting councillors were split on their next course of action, but agreed to wait until the matter could be brought forward for public discussion. The question of a Keystone grant

will therefore be a major topic at the next annual meeting and it is hoped that a Keystone representative will be able to attend.

If the municipality was to pledge the money to the Centre the Keystone board could borrow money on it without upsetting the municipal budget for 1972. At present the committee is attempting to raise money by canvassing private corporations.

In a letter to the municipality the Virden town council requested the help of the council in setting up an airport committee to supervise in up-grading the Virden Airport. At present the town operates the institution but if such a committee was set up the airport would be eligible for a federal reconstruction grant.

According to the West-Man Development Corporation, the airport could receive an initial grant of \$3500.00 with subsequent grants of \$500.00 annually. The airport committee would also be eligible to take out a \$20,000.00 mortgage.

The council was asked for only ideas and no financial aid was requested.

● Agriculture minister Sam Ustick notified the council that an insecticide which controls the Bertha Army Worm has been stocked by the government. The poison will sell for \$8.15 a lb., of which 10 pounds will protect 40 acres.

The minister also announced that the hopper-kill obtained from Saskatchewan will sell at \$11.40 per gallon. The council has stocked 12 gallons of the grasshopper insecticide.

● The National Energy Board has authorized the construction of pipeline crossings, one of which is located near Cromer.

● Councillor Harold Forster was named representative to the veterinarian service board recently given authorization by the provincial cabinet.

● Councillors estimated that wheat yields from 20 to 25 bushels would be recorded if the maturing was not hampered by cold weather.

● The municipality's share of the cost of installing an underground telephone line was estimated at \$200.00. The regional Manitoba Telephone System representative told the councillors that the cost could conceivably be less.

Recve C. Wedow presided at the meeting and all councillors were in attendance.

When over 25,000 fans jammed Winnipeg stadium on Tuesday night, Aug. 8th to gleefully watch their beloved Bombers stomp the Calgary Stampede 41-14 it was more than just a record breaking crowd, and more than just an important win.

What happened in Winnipeg last week was indicative of what has occurred all over the league to date. Big and enthusiastic crowds watching a superb brand of football. What was once a league comprised of reject NFL imports and woefully inept Canadians has finally come of age.

Even as recent as two years ago the Canadian Football League was only a proving ground for suspect American college talent, and junior college stars biding their time until they became eligible for the NFL draft.

The league was a convenient farm system for the likes of Vic Washington, Margene Adkins and Jake Scott. More or less a well paying stop-over on the rocky road to National Football League stardom. But indications are that all has changed.

During the last two or three years a different kind of football player has been graduating from the U.S. colleges. A player who considered football secondary to his business con-

cerns, and not the grinding full time job it is in the American league. A player who has suited perfectly to the night practise schedules adopted by most Canadian teams.

Thus teams such as the Toronto Argonauts have been able to sign the Joe Thiesmans and the Leon McQuays to long-term CFL contracts. While this year the British Columbia Lions picked up Johnny Muccio, Ray Nettles, Ron Estay and Don Bunce, last year's Rose Bowl hero.

But what is even more astounding about the CFL's new look is the amazing potential shown by the cream of the crop from recent Canadian university drafts. The talents of people like Bobby Kraemer, Doug Strong and Jim Young often rate favourably with their fellow American players.

It is safe to say that the Canadian league will never approach the professional excellence of its American counterpart. Nor will it reach the astronomical commercial heights that the NFL has enjoyed in recent years.

But we still own the most exciting brand of football on the North American continent.

(Editor's note: And now if the C. B. C. would only condescend to let us see some of the games!)

10 Years Ago Aug. 16, 1962

Fire broke out in the eye field owned by Frank Patmore on Wednesday, August 8, destroying about 25 acres of ryegrass. Harp, president of the Manitoba Horticulture Society, and also head gardener at the Morden Experimental Farm. What is believed to be the heaviest rain fall in a 12-hour period fell here on Friday evening and Saturday night. The official measurement was 3.86 inches. In some districts to the north gauges on farms indicated rainfall of five inches in the same period. Digging for the sewer lines commenced on Thursday at the corner of Railway Avenue and the west street in town.

An average yield of 30 bushels to the acre for wheat was predicted by Charles Cook who farms about four miles northeast of Reston. The collegiate at Reston and the high school at Sinclair will open on August 28th and the one-room high at Pipestone on September 4.
