Thus teams such as the Toronto Argonauts have been able to sign the Joe Thiesmans and the Leon McQuays to long-term CFL contracts. While this year the British Columbia Lions picked up Johnny Muosso, Ray Nettles, Ron Estay and Don Bunce, last year's Rose Bowl hero.

But what is even more astounding about the CFL's new look is the amazing potential shown by the cream of the crop from recent Canadian university drafts. The talents of people like Bobby Kraemer, Doug Strong and Jim Young often rate favourably with their fellow American players.
