## Mrs. L. E. Milligan buried at Virden

PIPESTONE—On January 16, 1972, Mrs. Lillian Elizabeth Milligan, one of the oldest and most respected residents of this district passed on to eternal rest. She died in the Brandon Assiniboine Hospital, where she had been a patient for some time.

Although she was in her 90th year she still kept a lively interest in the world around her. A non-denominational funeral service held in the Carscadden Funeral Chapel in Virden, was conducted by Father Louis McClosky, on Wednesday, January 19th at 2:30 p.m. Interment was in the family plot in Virden Cemetery.

Honorary pallbearers were: Douglas Minnis, Percy Reid, Homer Davis, Harold Mills and Cecil Forke. Active pallbearers were: Bill Kruger, Alvin Kruger, Fred Misener (all nephews of the deceased), George Rollins, Cyril Hopkins and Doc Sexsmith.

Mrs. Milligan was born in Buffalo, New York, on Aug. 25, 1873, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Kruger, who migrated from Germany to the United States and then to Canada in 1891, namely in the Belts district, on the farm now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. George Rollins. Prior to joining her parents in Belts in 1903 she worked as a seamstress in Buffalo, New York. On Feb. 4th, 1904 she married Edward Milligan, in Brandon and settled on their farm in the Belts district.

She was predeceased by a son Jimmy in 1912 and her beloved husband, Edward on November 26th, 1919.

She spent a great deal of her widowed life with her daughter, Mrs. Dunphy of Brandon, and some time with her grand-daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Davis of Pipestone. In addition to her son Edward of Pipestone and her daughter, Mrs. Dunphy (Ella) of Brandon, she is survived by 11 grand children and 32 great grandchildren. She was the last surviving member of a large family, consisting of six brothers and four sisters.

## Suspended sentence for wilful damage

RESTON—Larges Eagle of Pipestone, appeared before Magistrate Harry Forrest on Saturday morning and pleaded guilty to three charges. On a charge of wilful damage, he received a three months suspended sentence and must make restitution within one month to amount of \$8.89 for a mirror; on a charge of causing disturbance by being drunk he was fined \$25.00 and costs or 30 days in jail and on a charge of illegal possession of alcohol he was fined \$40.00 and costs or in default 30 days consecutive. He was allowed one month to pay.

Jack Allister Sotheran, of Reston, appeared before Wm. W. Busby, J.P. on Jan. 22nd and was fined \$10.00 and costs or 15 days suspension of his driving licence in default of payment, on a charge of careless driving.

Appearing before Magistrate Harry Forrest at Melita on Wed., Jan. 27th, Adolph Hamel of Pipestone, was fined \$50.00 and costs or in default of payment by Feb. 26th, 30 days in jail on a charge of cruelty to animals. Evidence presented was to the effect that Hamel was allowing his pigs to starve. Dr. Best, Federal Veterinarian, was a witness for the Crown.

Kenneth Moore of Peebles, Sask., was fined \$40.00 and costs on a charge of speeding and in default of payment within a month, he faces a 43-day suspension of his driver's licence. Moore was clocked at 80 m.p.h. in a 60 m.p.h. zone. Proceedings were by way of ex parte.

# Annual meeting of United Church

RESTON—The annual meeting of Reston United Church was held on Wednesday of last week, following a pot luck supper. A good number attended the meeting in spite of the extremely cold weather.

The financial statements and various reports were presented in printed form and showed a very successful year in the life of the Church.

Elmer Bulloch, reported for the Committee of Stewards. It had been a busy year for them, with some of the accomplishments being: the installing of new doors on the front entrance of the Church with the plaque in memory of the late Joseph Ashley. Mr. Ashley left a considerable legacy to Reston church.

The new doors are of Teakwood and add to the appearance of the church. A railing was installed on the stairs going down from the front entrance; this railing was donated by Mrs. Iris McMurchy. The front steps had also been painted.

New microphones and two new communion chairs were purchased from the Memorial Fund.

At the back entrance a new door, new stairway and railing were installed. A light which is on an iron pole by the south side of the side walk does an excellent job of lighting up the back

entrance. A drain pipe from the eavestroughing to drain the water away from the church was put in.

The "Every Family Plan" for the Observer to envelope givers has been started. It is hoped to recover the cost of this through special envelopes placed in the weekly offering envelope package.

Replacing Sid Jago and Mrs. Alex Watt, whose term of office has expired, David Braddell and Maurice Shank were elected to the Stewards.

Named as members of the Session were: Elwood, Bulloch, Horace Campbell and Sid Jago. Mr. Campbell who replaced Bob Armstrong who has moved away, allowed his name to stand. John Rainnie resigned and Mrs. Inez McMorran's term had expired. Membership is as follows: 109 resident members and 125 non-resident. Six were removed by death and 4 by transfer.

During the year three joined by profession of faith and three by transfer. There were also six baptisms during the year.

Mrs. Frank Harrison was the choice as presbytery representative, and Mrs. McMorran was named to C. L. & W. committee.

Mrs. McMorran was also re-elected choir leader, as were Mrs. B. Marlin, organist and Miss Rhea Forde, her assistant.

Other office administrative personnel include K. C. Seaford, supervisor of transportation and maintenance of buildings; F. C. Cole, director of special services; and H. W. Chornoboy, superintendent of schools. Miss Deborah Evers and Miss Shirley Smith are the office stenographers.

The Division recently submitted its application for winter works to the Provincial Government for approval. The winter works project come under the Provincial Employment Program (P.E.P.) for which some \$2 million was appropriated and which is to be used for labour costs for approved projects.

The Board approved the sale of Bellevue School, which has been closed for the past two and one-half years, to the Bellevue Community for the sum of \$1 plus transfer costs.

In other business the Board:

● Authorized its members to attend the trustees' seminar at Brandon on February 23-24.

● Appointed Mr. C. Winnill as custodian at the Assiniboine School in Oak Lake with duties to commence on February 1.

● Received information on United Nations High School Seminar held in Brandon last summer and a request to sponsor a division student (s) to the seminar during the summer of 1972.

● Received and studied the MAST, MTS proposal for provincial group life insurance for division employees.

● Authorized five of its school principals to attend the annual principals' conference in Winnipeg during the latter part of February.

● Authorized its superintendent and curriculum coordinator to attend the annual superintendents' conference at Falcon Lake later this month.

The choir has a membership of seventeen with an average attendance of around 12. Anthems and hymns were rendered at the regular services with special music at Easter and Christmas. The choir was in attendance at all funerals in the church with extra persons assisting on these numerous and sad occasions.

The year's activities ended with the New Year's Eve service "Cornerstone 72".

The choir held a two hymn-sings at Altona and also visited the Sherwood. They were entertained during the year at several hours.

The U.C.W. report showed a total of \$397.05 received for the year. The money was raised by the 4 units, general meetings, anniversary donations, membership (77), wedding, serving at the fair, cookbook sales etc. The bank balance at the end of 1971 was \$794.90.

The C.G.L.T. under the leadership of Mrs. Art Wilkins, Miss Joan Fraser and junior leader, Janice Benzie, had a very enjoyable year. Some of the highlights were the "waxless test", collecting for the Heart Foundation, a "Lady Kascote Cosmetics" demonstration, by two ladies from Brandon. Mrs. Braddell assisted the girls with their crosses, their handicraft project for the year. Mrs. McAdzean showed the girls her rock collection. They also had a film called "Jamie-Sibling". A party was held to finish off the year. The girls also put on the annual Vesper Service before Christmas.

The Christian Education Committee was chosen with Mrs. Reg Berry, Mrs. Ev Lockhart, Mrs. J. Fotheringham, Larkie and Barrie Elliott and M. A. Gould as members.

Worship continued in his work on Sunday School superintendent. Sunday School attendance seems to remain constant, offerings, however, are down. There are 90 children enrolled with an average attendance of 59. There are fifteen teachers in the pre-schoolers, kindergarten, primary boys, primary girls, junior and intermediate classes. Volunteers are needed for intermediate boys and a senior class.

The Manse committee reported it had finally got the eavestroughing on the manse replaced after trying for two years. The chairman Maurice Ludlam presented the report.

Mrs. T. S. Forsyth reported on her term as lay delegate to Brandon Presbytery. She has attended 12 meetings of Brandon Presbytery, two of which have been two day study sessions, 3 meetings of Manitoba Conference, each a three day event. She had served as secretary of Committee III of Presbytery, from November, 1969 on. Mrs. Forsyth has also given fine reports of her activities to both Pipestone and Reston congregations, on fifteen Sundays during her term.

Rev. Schurman, in his report, spoke of how her and his wife have enjoyed their life here and feel they are "at home". During the past year he had conducted 25 funerals in this community and three outside the parish. Since coming to Reston 2 1/2 years ago, there have been 25 funerals, 40 in Reston and 12 in Pipestone and 3 outside the parish.

Mr. Schurman visits the local hospital about 27 times a month (except in times of quarantine) and the Souris hospital once a week.

There have been six baptisms in Pipestone and 6 in Reston in 1971. There were six weddings at Reston and 2 at Pipestone in the past year.

A detailed account of Reston financial statement is not yet available, but will be forthcoming when circumstances permit. Mrs. Arlene Miller was re-elected as secretary-treasurer.

He was an accomplished tradesman as one can see by looking at the structure. As a boy of twelve, many a time I stood out at the back where he had his work bench and marvelled at the job he was doing. Later the family came from Ireland and they farmed in the Bardal district.

Billie Good and Frank Harris homesteaded I think in the Wauchope, Sask., district where Billie stayed for a long time. Last time I saw Frank Harris was in a hotel in Winnipeg. Good and Harris worked again with Bill Pierce on a stone barn they built for my dad in 1905. Big Frank Harris could always tell a good yarn. I remember of hearing him tell one that after he had been in the west for some time he thought he would take a trip back to Ontario and see his Dad. He didn't tell his dad he was coming and just walked in on him. The first thing he said to the old gentleman was "Father, I have come home to die." And the old man looked up from his arm chair over the top of his glasses and said you did like heck Frank you came home to eat my seed potatoes. As far as I know the workmen who built the G. S. Munro store have all passed on. Thanks Russell for listening.

## THIS COULD BE OUR LAST CHANCE—LET'S NOT BLOW IT!

"If you don't take an interest in making the decisions that will affect the future of your part in the province, you can be sure that a bunch of middle-class urban bureaucrats, who don't know a thing about rural Manitoba will make them for you."

That's what was the warning issued to representatives of 40 southern Manitoba communities by Reg Forbes at a three-day Regional Action Conference in Brandon last month.

There's no doubt that when decisions are made in Winnipeg for the rest of the province, rural Manitobans lose by default.

That's been happening on an increasing scale for a long time, and people have become used to it. Whenever governments wanted to know the best way of developing rural Manitoba, they hired a file of experts from New York or sent out a group from Winnipeg to study the area. Five years later, the experts offered several alternative plans to the province, and the people were asked to select one, without having had access to any of the facts that the experts used in the first place.

The provincial government of Manitoba, for whatever reasons, has said they want to change all that.

More precisely, Premier Schreyer said in a speech in November to the Union of Manitoba Municipalities: "This government is firmly committed to the concept of local participation in economic planning. We cannot be effective without local involvement and initiative."

Presumably, the government is also aware that the average person has neither the information necessary for regional economic planning, nor the time, energy or inclination to discover these facts.

So they've taken care of that first step.

Early in 1970, they compiled all the known data about southern Manitoba—that part of the province bounded by the Saskatchewan and Ontario borders, and the 49th and 53rd parallels, excluding Winnipeg. All branches of government: municipal, provincial and federal were contacted for their information which in any way related to the area; its people,

the land usage, public services, population trends, economic resources and development potential.

The next summer, the residents of 5000 southern Manitoba households were questioned about their education, income, shopping habits, and their attitude towards the public services available to them in their home areas.

All this information has been distilled into a series of maps, tables and charts, available to the residents of rural Manitoba for their use in coming up with ideas and suggestions on how they want their area to develop.

The Regional Action Conference in Brandon was the second step in a long process called the Regional Analysis Program. There, representatives of the communities involved got a sneak preview of the information and a chance to null over the program and figure out what their areas could contribute to it and get out of it.

The third stage of the program is the presentation of all this data in the 78 larger communities in southern Manitoba. Representatives of the Department of Industry and Commerce will be in Reston with films, slides and displays on Friday, Feb. 18th.

The fourth and final stage of the program is to be undertaken by 'community committees' in each rural area. This is a group of individuals, each interested in a particular area of development, which studies the survey findings to determine what direction future development should take. They will be asked to report by early summer to their regional development corporations their conclusions and recommendations concerning the development in their area.

It has taken a long time for any government to ask the people of rural Manitoba what they want for the future of their areas. Now the provincial government has invited local participation in economic planning, and even gone to the trouble of doing the legwork of fact-finding for us.

It's the first time we've been asked to give an opinion. If we don't at least take an interest, it may be the last chance we get.

Let's not blow it.

10 YEARS AGO (Jan. 25, 1962)

Berry, chairman of the Reston School Board, said that the teachers' salaries may go before an arbitrator if no agreement can soon be reached, at the annual ratemakers meeting on Friday. A total of five persons attended the meeting. Seven persons attended the annual meeting of the Pipestone Consolidated School District on Jan. 18th. The financial report, given by F. Patmore, showed a balance on hand of \$6,803.87.

20 YEARS AGO (Jan. 24, 1952)

A second drilling rig was moved to the Linklater district last week. Cold weather has hampered operations but drilling is expected to get underway shortly. Messrs. Jack Grant, Billy Lawrence, Clair Claus and Harold Forster were elected to the board of the Pipestone Memorial Hall at a meeting held in the Hall on Tuesday. Other members are Louis Henuet, Cyril Hopkins, Dolph Henuet and Frank Patmore, the latter being chairman. Mr. Andy Wright is the secretary. Lewthwaite's Hardware and the King's Hotel at Redvers, were destroyed by fire in the early hours of Friday morning. The loss at the hardware is estimated at \$40,000 and the hotel \$60,000. A blizzard struck the district on Monday and as a result, all side roads are blocked. A high wind accompanied by a snowfall, cut visibility to practically zero at times. The Young rink of Carlyle, Archie Young and three sons, Bill, Howard and Ron, won the cars at the Nipawin, Car 'spiel' last week. Two other rinks well known here, Lawrence Borison of Antler, and Jim Duncan of Virden, made the play-offs.

30 YEARS AGO (Feb. 5, 1942)

The farmers around the Linklater district are again engaged in business of cutting and storing ice, which was interrupted by the recent mild spell. The local salvage committee have received instructions from the Minister of National War Services to conduct a drive for the collection of old rubber. In charge of the drive are: C. S. Hewitt and H. Claus, Pipestone; J. Hayward and Lloyd Bulloch, Sinclair; A. Slater and H. Dennis, Ebor; H. Snape, Butler; J. Payne, Ewart; H. Chispe, Bellevue and J. Cuthill and W. Mennie, Reston. The Antler annual bonspiel opens on Feb.

2nd and already 26 rinks have entered. There are three open competitions and the consolation.

40 YEARS AGO (Jan. 28, 1932)

The Reston School Bonspiel terminated on Saturday afternoon. Seven rinks took part with Don Guthrie winning both the Challenge and Citizens events and Kay Sibbald the Consolation. Russell Manning was second in the Challenge, R. G. Guthrie, second in the Citizens and Clyde McMurchy in the Consolation. Goldwyn McLean won the Hard Luck. Reston defeated Melita in a game on Tuesday night. It was the last game for the season for Foster McDougall who has joined the strong Virden line-up. Other members of the Reston squad: McIntosh, E. McMurchy, D. Guthrie, Wynn, R. Guthrie, Busby, Brandon, F. McMurchy, Shippam. All previous records were broken when the Sinclair Rustic Club met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Alex McKay on Thursday evening. Travel was by cutters and sleighs. Whist and games, new and old, plus lunch made for a marvelous evening. Reston hockey team journeyed to Oak Lake on Tuesday but lost after a two period encounter. Because of road conditions it was practically necessary to push the truck all the way and they did not arrive until 11:00 p.m. in an exhausted condition, but went out on the ice anyway in order not to disappoint the fans who were still on hand.

50 YEARS AGO (Feb. 2, 1922)

A number of beaver dams are evident along the Pipestone Creek, at Geo. Harper's, A. T. Smith's and T. S. Bulloch's and also at Cromer. This is the first time for many years that beavers have been present in the Pipestone. ## Outdoors Only...

The two week lapse in the appearance of this column wasn't due to the plunging temperatures we've experienced, or to plunging necklines (that we haven't experienced), but to plunging into pools of professional problems—nothing serious, really; just time consuming.

The time has allowed some collecting of further data on the Southwestern Manitoba Deer-tagging Operation from Dave Dickson who is in charge of operations in this district.

So far, results are relatively few, as can be expected where many unknown factors come into play in a new project as this. Two deer were taken week ago Sunday, and two more week ago Monday, comprising two female fawns, one male fawn and one doe. Each was identified with its 1 inch-diameter, permanent, metal tag, clipped on to the top of the right ear close to the head; with its 1/4 inch-diameter polypropylene yellow cord around the neck; and with another metal tag carried on the cord.

In addition to the identifying acts, information was collected as to each animal's sex, condition, maturity and age. If the animal were a migrant from other areas of Southwestern Manitoba, later observations would show green-corded deer to be from the Turtle Mountain area and red-corded deer from the Spruce Woods area.

Deer are enticed to the traps by bait such as alfalfa hay, grain, or both, sometimes salt being used too. A little wheat appeals to the local animals.

Lauder area deer have not been responding to traps, as though natural food were yet more desirable and plentiful. A different problem turned up in the Spruce Woods area: two deer monopolized the trap, coming back to it repeatedly for the apparent handouts, thus preventing other deer from getting in to the act. Possible transportation of the moochers to other locations was being considered.

About twenty biological technicians will be involved in this program directed by the Environmental Management division, and lead by Mr. Larry Bidlake, the chief biologist for the program, located in Brandon.

Late as it is to comment on the lunar eclipse that was at its darkest last Sunday morning after 4:35 a.m., two sightings on the event are worth mentioning. Late the previous evening, the moon, high overhead in a perfectly clear sky, wore a wide, wide halo of surprising brightness, suggesting a cosmic target at which the earth was getting ready to shoot its shadow at a later hour. It wasn't a welcome target, however, as far as Cambodian soldiers were concerned. According to reports, scores of superstitious soldiers at Phnom Penh discharged weapons including automatic rifles at the eclipse, in the belief that they were killing the dragon that was engulfing the moon. As the result of this display of initiative, one person was killed and about 50 wounded by bullets falling back to earth. Doubtless, a case of a myth being as good as a mile! Phew!

Generally, automobile vehicles "get it in the neck" for being the culprits of carbon monoxide poisoning or pollution. Research now shows that cars are the only offenders in this regard; that

ole, debil, tobacco, in the hands of man, produces sufficient carbon monoxide in a closed car or room to affect not only the smokers but also the non-smokers, and we know, of course, how deadly carbon monoxide can be. Just because millions of smokers don't die of the carbon monoxide released during smoking, is no argument for doing what can reduce the health and well being of smoker and non-smoker alike. Even outdoors, non-smokers allergic to other by-products of tobacco smoking should not have to simply move away from human sources of unintentional pollution—of self and human environment. Ironically enough, another medical research report states that smokers suffer earlier signs of aging, in the form of facial wrinkles, than do non-smokers. Just consider: for less expense, less aging.

Haven't heard any more about the Cromer wolves. What's the evidence? Where are the tracks? Or pellets? Or are there uncontrolled dogs? Let's not kid ourselves; dogs that are not properly looked after and checked can and do get out of hand. Sometimes occasional dogs go feral—return to wild state for lack of care and management—and banding together, commit havoc that is easily thought to be the work of wolves. Our wolves, whatever few there are, are primarily coyotes which eat rabbits, the occasional fox, and literally tens of mice, jet alone rats, snakes, crickets and other small forms of animal life. Granted, the odd chicken, lamb or calf gets into the coyote's diet. As long as the domestic diet is not a proved habitus act by the coyote, the loss of one calf, even, is small reward for the tremendous favor the coyote does naturally for man.
