## Charles Ritchie long-time resident of Woodnorth district celebrates 90th

WOODNORTH—Last week we had the honor and happy privilege of extending to Mr. Charles Ritchie congratulations on the occasion of his 90th birthday. Mr. Ritchie was born near Ellon, Aberdeenshire the first day of June, 1882. He attended school at Bog Bray and worked on the farms about Ellon in his early years.

The manager of the North of Scotland Bank in Ellon was a man by the name of Gillies. In the winter of 1907 he was looking for men to go to Canada to work on farms. Mr. Gillies' brother Stuart, farmed north of Virden, and he and some of his neighbors required men for the spring season. The banker persuaded Charlie, along with others to emigrate to Canada. Mr. Ritchie sailed from Glasgow aboard the Corinthian (a converted cattle boat, according to the local legend) on March 1907 and landed in Virden on the 5th day of April. Also on the voyage, which was hampered for several days by icebergs, were Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Kerr and Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Ritchie, who eventually settled at Virden and Cromer respectively.

That first spring in Canada, Charlie went to work for Mr. Wm. Reid on the farm 1 mile north of Virden, now occupied by Roy Brown, Virden Optician.

When the seeding was completed on the 24th of May, Charlie and Jimmie Mathieson (latterly of the Sanderson district, set out for Hargrave, there to break virgin land on 11-11-27 the farm on which Mr. Reid achieved the title of Master Farmer. The two young Scotsmen with their breaking plows and good Clyde horses broke over 200 acres that summer. In the fall Charlie came back to the Virden farm to assist with harvest, Mr. Mathieson remained to double disk the breaking. Wm. Reid harvested a bumper crop off this land in 1908 and enjoyed great success there in the following years.

Mr. Ritchie married Miss Clara Ingram in 1916 and the couple came to live on their own farm at Woodnorth, where they still reside. The land was purchased from Mr. Joe Williams. Mrs. Ritchie came from County Durham in England, arriving in Virden April 19, 1910.

We are happy to report that they both enjoy the best of health. Charlie assists his son and grandsons with the farm in busy periods. After the disastrous windstorm of the 2nd of September last year, when the swaths were scattered to the four corners of the fields, he took over the side delivery rake and gathered a half section of crop into windrows so that it could be combined.

The Ritchies have enjoyed semi-retirement for the last few years, and have travelled extensively, with several trips to Ottawa, where a daughter (Beulah) resides, to the west coast, the Eastern States, also one journey back to the moor and misty glens of the homeland.

The people of the Woodnorth community are very proud and fond of the Ritchies and wish them well.

A barbecue supper was enjoyed by all at the Arena following the marching.

The day was topped off by a dance for all 4-H members at the Arena.

Likely because of the present  
difficulty to see them. Yet some  
of these species appeared prior  
to heavy leafage and when id-

entification was easier.  
Cedar Waxwings have been  
seen on the east side of town  
since about May 20. Two Hum-  
mingbirds showed up briefly on  
Bert Pierce's property May 30.  
John Milliken mentioned one  
had visited his gardens about  
May 14 or 15. One paid us a  
lightning call last Monday, sound-  
ing like a miniature B-52 Bom-  
ber heading for Hanoi at a thou-  
sand miles per hour. Another  
observation was a Black-billed  
Cuckoo that Norma Milliken  
heard early on Sunday. Please  
let us know of any sightings or  
sounds of these species; so much  
needs to be learnt about them  
but will not be unless much  
more information is made avail-  
able.

Two years ago Sid Jago had  
the special experience of observ-  
ing a Red-headed Woodpecker,  
rare, as far as it is known, in  
this part of the Province. About  
two weeks ago (May 25) a Red-  
headed Woodpecker turned up  
again, although this time Reg.  
Berry was the fortunate obser-  
ver. Seen not far northeast of  
Reston, this woodpecker was  
prominent with its all red head  
and neck, white breast and bel-  
ly, and black back, wing and  
tail interrupted by white rump  
and large white wing patch. In  
flight, these patches appear as  
large white squares on the rear  
portion of the wing. Any sight-  
ing of these species deserves  
special attention and reporting.

May 19, Valerie Berry and her  
parents saw the brilliance of  
Baltimore Oriole on their lot.  
May 28, similar brilliance show-  
ed in yellow and black dress and  
rollercoaster flight of a pair of  
American Goldfinches dancing  
in bush and tree on the Berry  
lot. The next day, Valerie and  
her father spotted a House Wren  
north of town, carrying material  
for nest-building. The same  
Monday, Debbie and Gwen Jor-  
gensen must have had a fine  
sight when a Baltimore Oriole  
perched on a fence near the house.

Bigger game has been observ-  
ed in Reston, too. At 6:15 a.m.,  
May 24, as Mrs. Willment was  
walking east on 4th Avenue, an  
odd beast crossed the avenue

Recently this community suf-  
fered the loss of one of its child-  
ren through an accident. If our  
community doesn't wake up to  
why these accidents happen, it  
may suffer more tragedy. I re-  
fer to the children on bicycles  
that are clearly too big for them  
and are not able to control them  
at all times; to the children rid-  
ing bicycles not built for the  
two persons carried on them; to  
the children riding bicycles on  
sidewalks and on the wrong  
side of the road; and to the  
children who, on questioning,  
show no knowledge of traffic  
regulations nor responsibility  
for a public vehicle. For the  
sake of children, let's get them  
trained to live—not let them  
get killed.

Bicycles come under the same  
road regulations—and some oth-  
ers—as cars and trucks, and yet  
no one may drive a car or truck  
anywhere without licence or pass-  
ing a test. Why should cyclists  
be exempt and a menace to  
themselves, let alone to the pub-  
lic. We need to set—not just  
sympathize when something has  
happened.
