They have aided with unsellish gener-osity all worthy local endeavors, national and international aid foreign missions and as on. They rendered aid spiritually and fin-ancially to the construction of the church building, to the er-ection of the manse, to the repair and upkeep of these struct-ures, aided the church board to discharge their obligations with regard ministers' salaries and WOODNORTH - The Ladies orth Methodis

We learn that they made gen-erous cash donations to the Woodnorth memorial park at its inception after the flist world war, to the community hall for repairs and additions, to the community club to assist in the erection of a skating rink. The society purchased the Elm Val-ley school house, and had the building moved and added to the church to serve as a Sunday school room, and a place to hold small meetings and social func-tions.
