Sixtieth Anniversary of the Woodnorth U.C.W. to be observed today

WOODNORTH—The Ladies Aid to the Woodnorth Methodist Church formed in July 1912, has functioned without interruption for 60 years, the name changed for a time to the Women's Association of the United Church, and now known as the United Church Women. The original name still seems to describe this group clearly and properly, no body of people have striven with such dedication to be of aid, not only to the church, but to mankind in general. They have aided with unselfish generosity all worthy local endeavors, national and international aid programs, to name a few, Red Cross, the Belgian relief fund, foreign missions and so on. They rendered aid spiritually and financially to the construction of the church building, to the erection of the manse, to the re-

pair and upkeep of these structures, aided the church board to discharge their obligations with regard ministers' salaries and other expenses.

We learn that they made generous cash donations to the Woodnorth memorial park at its inception after the first world war, to the community hall for repairs and additions, to the community club to assist in the erection of a skating rink. The society purchased the Elm Valley school house, and had the building moved and added to the church to serve as a Sunday school room, and a place to hold small meetings and social functions.

Checking the financial statements contained in the records, it would appear that about \$25,000.00 has been raised during the years and used to further the

work of the church and community betterment. The effort put forth in earning such a sum is indeed commendable, the ingenuity and plain hard work put into the various undertakings has been enormous. Fowl suppers have been held in the autumn to mark the anniversary of the opening of the church, only twice in the sixty years has this function been cancelled due to conditions beyond control, for many years oyster suppers were held, an event of the spring season, as most of the earlier settlers came from maritime countries, sea food was a favorite item; in later years the popularity of such menus has declined. Bazaars were held in conjunction with the oyster supper, sewing and home cooking offered for sale. Mention is made of the brain tub where novelties

were buried and the patron delivered for his prize, a forerunner of the "fish pond."

The society catered to the annual summer sports day, this involved serving dinner and supper to hundreds of thirsty and hungry people. At one ball tournament in the early twenties a record attendance of 800 people paid at the gate. The formidable task of catering to this multitude was met with quiet efficiency of the ever faithful Ladies' Aid. Richardson's local store was drained of all its ready to serve resources but the crowd was fed. The cost of food offers a wide variance with today's inflated prices, for one function the ladies purchased from Mr. Wm. Cameron, pioneer butcher in the village, 25 lbs of cooked ham and 20 lbs of choice beef for \$15.00. The caretaker of

the church, usually one of the society members, received 25 cents for each fire kindled and also the church to be swept and dusted. Don't forget there was no magic to heat the water or cook the food or run the vacuum or polisher.

The ladies sponsored the Christmas concert, purchasing gifts, candles, nuts and other goodies, helping with the costumes, arranging for Saint Nick. We see that John Shoemaker performed this important task one year. Mr. Shoemaker who stood a lean six foot three, hardly fitted the image of the portly saint. However, the youngsters of the era seemed pleased with his actions.

Plays and concerts were produced, great pleasure for the audience, greater pleasure for the participants, and again much

work for the ladies. Profits from these endeavors helped to swell the coffers of the L.A.S. to finance the never ending needs for assistance.

Comforts and treats for the armed forces in two wars were gathered, packed and despatched overseas with much loving care. CO-OPERATION NEEDED

The police work in a community is only as good as the community wants it to be, the Recorder was told by Cpl. Roy Graziano, following last week's editorial. Cpl. Graziano states that to be effective, the police must have the co-operation of the public for it is impossible for them to be everywhere at once.

If an individual has information which would be of assistance to the police in solving crimes (the recurring incidents in Reston of window breaking for an example) and gives such information to the police, they can do

so with the assurance that their names will not be divulged, if this is their wish.

Such information can be of great value in the investigation and could lead to the solving of the crime and the apprehension of the guilty party or parties.

The editorial was in error in stating that there was a 15 miles per hour speed limit past schools. The fact is the speed limit "is safe and prudent" which could mean, under certain conditions less than 15 miles per hour.

SUNDAY SHOOTING

A private members bill has been introduced in the Manitoba Legislature which would permit hunting on Sunday—but it would appear to have about as much chance of becoming law as the water in the Gulf of Mexico freezing over.

We believe that there should be Sunday shooting—as is the case in many of the states in our neighboring country and we understand also in Ontario.

The experience in the states appears to have had little effect on the game bird population and we can speak from experience in the case of

pheasants in South Dakota.

One argument used by the opponents of Sunday shooting is that the birds need one day when they can feed without being molested.

Our support of Sunday hunting is qualified in that we would allow only morning shooting of waterfowl and afternoon shooting of upland game birds, and this would be for every day of the season.

In the matter of big game, we would suggest that the hunting-hours should be regulated by the number of animals that should be taken to keep the herds in balance with the available food supply.

Outdoors only

Sun and rain in spring can do wonders to field and forest. Such wonders surround us now, with bluffs, windbreaks, woods, fields and meadows displaying pleasing masses of green. This effect was very apparent early Sunday morning under misty gray skies on our way via Brandon to Riding Mountain National Park and late in the afternoon on our return home in broad sunshine.

The occasion at the Park was the annual outing there by the Brandon Natural History Society—a guided tour on the Omninnik Marsh Nature Trail, on the Ma-e-e-gon Nature Trail, and of the Bison Enclosure, under the direction of Robert Walker, Chief Naturalist of the Riding Mountain Park.

The Omninnik Marsh Nature Trail, only 100 yards from the Wasagaming main parking lot, consists of a 1.2 miles long floating boardwalk that winds over the marsh. Bullrush, sedge, willows of five varieties and numerous marsh plants, bushes and trees presented an impressive and changing habitat for three kinds of wrens, three kinds of blackbirds, warblers, flycatchers, sparrows, ducks and fish. The chief naturalist stated one jackfish observed in the pool of the marsh had measured 47 inches. Naturally the many marsh scenes and forms of life led to much picture taking and asking of questions that Mr. Walker very capably answered.

The Spruce Picnic Area on the north shore of Clear Lake proved to be a point of special interest on account of the sighting of a Black-throated Green Warbler and a Blackburnian Warbler, a flashy bird with a brilliant orange breast. After these and other species were disposed of, lunch was the meal suffered no lack of informality as Society members and friends reached happily into each other's lunches in the excitement of watching birds, fumbling with the pages of binoculars, and peering through field manuals! Anyway, all was enjoyable.

The Ma-e-e-gun Nature Trail consisted of a 0.6 mile long loop through spruce-fir forest. About three and a half feet wide, the deep sawdust trail led the observers spongy through forest gloom and glade, by barely visible pools or stands of shattered trunks, past signs of elk and coyote, amongst blistered balsam and moss-festooned spruce. Here the Ovenside gave warning of "Teacher, Teacher, TEACHER" till the forested aisles

rang to the sound, and the Northern Three-toed Woodpecker drilled for food and mated. Chipping Sparrows, Evening Barn Swallows, Chimney Swifts, —they and others were to be found and enjoyed.

Impressive was the new Bison Exhibit a specially constructed small pavilion open to the air and displaying pictures, diagrams, hide with Indian calendar symbols, story and statistics of Bison in America. On a ceiling beam, a Phoebe patiently brooded its hatch.

Even more impressive were the drives close among five great bulls grazing or lying in the open pasture. A rising bison at fifteen yards, its head like a looming truck, can cause a thrill of excitement for the driver of a car when his hands are busy with a telephoto camera.

Following termination of the tour at the Lake Audy picnic area, a visit was paid to the dam at the south end of the lake. There a few fishermen cast below the swirling curl of water. In the down-side lee of the dam, hundreds and hundreds of jackfish fingerlings swarmed like black clouds. The adult catch, however, was reported to be poor.

Bufflehead Ducks and Bluebirds, Yellow Warblers & Cowbirds, and still others brightened the way back outside the Park to Onanole. A stop for supper at the Lookout Picnic site on the south crest of the Minnedosa River valley completed a very interesting, and enjoyable, and memorable trip to Riding Mountain Park.

Did you know that there is cold lightning as well as hot lightning, both have a temperature of 15,000 to 60,000 degrees Fahrenheit. The difference is that hot lightning, contains continuing currents (typically 100 amps.), lasts tenths of a second, allowing this lightning to cause forest fires, whereas cold lightning lasts only thousands of a second. Can't even roast a Weiner in that time!

Shydowsky toured Winnipeg on May 25th and 26th. Others, besides the principal who took cars to transport the students were R. Dadds, C. Hopkins and W. Bennett.

20 YEARS AGO (June 3, 1952)

Testing of the Karpinski Well was done and after an initial production of oil, salt water intruded and the well has been placed in the suspended category. Twenty-three schools took part in the field day held at the Reston Fair grounds on Friday, despite the cold day. Woodnorth won first for marching, with Reston second and Pipestone third.

Dr. D. E. Bradley arrived in Reston on Wednesday and commenced his practice. He is a graduate of the University of Manitoba Medical School. On Friday Mr. B. Reiken with his D4 Caterpillar and Bulldozer dug the basement for the United Church which will be built at Fertile this summer. The site for the

Over a 100 people gathered quickly on Thursday evening when the alarm went out that Garry, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Fotheringham, was reported missing. Fortunately the boy was found by his father about a half mile from home, unharmed.

30 YEARS AGO (June 4, 1942)

A social evening at Ewart on Friday night honored three boys, Nelson Love, Dave Johnston and Jim Yates who are home on leave from the armed forces. The staff of teachers for the coming term at the Reston School will be: Arthur M. Preston, principal, of Oak River; Assistant principal, Miss Marjorie Radley, Cardale, Man., Grades 5, 6, 7 and 8, Miss Ruby Ferguson, Boissevain, Man., Primary grades Miss Alice C. Peel, Lenore, Man.

Seeding operations with the exception of some flax and late oats were practically wound up in the district last week. This is the week for shipping salvage at Antler and a car was spotted on the tracks on Monday and will be picked up on Saturday. The women here busy cutting off the cloth from rubber shoes, buttons and metals from rags sent in Monday evening the men, assisted by the boys, gathered up the scrap metal from the various lots in town. A very large collection of old tires have also been secured.

40 YEARS AGO (June 2, 1932)

Colin Campbell went to Weyburn last week to recover his Buick car which had been stolen. The thieves stole another car at that point which was later recovered but the culprits haven't been apprehended as yet. Farmers generally stress the necessity of rain to help out the late sown crops. Some are still on the land but most of the

seeding will be completed this week. The three men who robbed Mr. Minnie Store at Bede about two weeks ago were arrested in Brandon and some of the goods were recovered. Small light colored moths by the myriads have been noted by citizens during the past week. They are said to be the moths that lay the eggs that hatch into the small insects that have done much damage to the maple trees in the past few years.

50 YEARS AGO (June 2, 1922)

The new plates for the storage batteries at the Reston power plant are now enroute from the east and power will be turned off the day when they are being put in place. The Livestock Improvement Train drew a large crowd last Thursday when it visited Pipestone. Several thoroughbred bulls were purchased by local farmers.

Many men, some out of employment and others "gentle of the march" are out on the march through the west at present. Some of the individuals are really dangerous characters and police are keeping a sharp lookout. One Sunday evening one of these gents was given lodging in the Reston jail. It is assumed that the fire of last week that destroyed Mr. McIver's stable was the result of one of these gents taking a night's lodging there.

60 YEARS AGO (May 30, 1912)

A delegation from Cromer were in Reston on Wednesday of last week, getting names on the Municipal voters list that in the case of an election for trustee being called they would not be caught napping. Seven men were asked to be placed on the list as joint owners of a lot worth \$50.00, "Nuff sed" . . . The Cromer School District is in trouble. The district is divided into two factions and these are pulling in opposite directions. They have two boards of trustees and two teachers. It looks like the case will go to the King's Bench at heavy expense to the district. . . A party

made up of six autoloading went from Pipestone to Woodnorth on Sunday to attend a song service. The trip was not made without incident as several machines sustained punctures and accidents of a minor nature. . . The rope for the curfew bell has been repaired and now every evening the bell warns the little ones in Reston that the time to be home has arrived.

Your Manitoba Government wishes to relieve some of that burden, so it's taking on the responsibility of providing from 12 to 14 million dollars formerly raised by municipal property tax. That means a saving of up to \$50 to each person or family that is presently paying school taxes in Manitoba. If you live in an apartment, own a house, or are a farmer, then you pay school taxes and thus qualify. The only people who don't qualify are those who live in rooming houses, subsidized rental quarters and transient accommodation such as hotels, motels and tourist camps.

Your school taxes for 1972 will be reduced by one-half, to a maximum of \$50. ARE YOU A TENANT OR LANDLORD? If you're a tenant, your landlord, as of September 30, 1972, must pass this saving on to you, either in the form of a cash payment or in a rent reduction in which the full amount that you're entitled to will be deducted from your rent in one rental payment period. If you're a landlord, you are required to notify your tenants in writing of benefits due them, and how they will be paid. It's that easy.

OWN YOUR OWN HOME? If you own your own home, your payment will be in the form of a credit on the municipal tax statements to be issued later this year.

FARMERS ONLY PLEASE. Farmers will also receive payment in the form of a credit on the tax statements. But in addition... if you're paying school taxes on more than one parcel of land you are entitled to amalgamate your school taxes so you can bring your benefit up to the full \$50. Just make sure all the land you're claiming is within one municipality and fill out an application to the municipality concerned.

AND FINALLY... This plan should not be confused with the recently announced Education Property Tax Credit Plan which will be in addition to the School Tax Reduction Act and will result in rebates of up to \$140 in 1973.

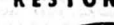
