school. Irvin was one of my pupils and I have several school snaps and interesting memories of him.

him. Quite right that he got on his knees when cars were pass-ing the school in order to lower pupils. He used to walk to school and in winter time, when he couldn't get shoes to fit, he made an opening at the toe of his rubber, then wrapped the protruding big toe, but on e morning it got frozen. Eviden-tly one foot was longer than the other.

Ity one loot was longer than the other. He was kind to the younger pupils and they enjoyed the piggy-back rides he gave them. His intention was to be a Civil Engineer and the last year 1 faught him, he was taking Grade 1X. Later he joined the circus and on his return to Bardal we had a social evening and pre-sented him with a gold jack knife.

sented him with a gold jack knife. The last authentic word we have had about Irvin was at the time of his mother's doath a-bout 10 years ago. Evidently he worked as a fireman in the win-ter months at Coral Gebles and while fighting a fire, he was badly burned end in hospital.

When winter comes to Bran-don, Manitoba, you do one of two things. You play hockey or you watch it.

A boy born in Brandon has three natural instincts: he loves his parents, he loves hockey and he dislikes referees.

A boy learns how to walk mainly because that's the best way to got to the hockey rink. Christmas ian't complete with-out a new stick and pair of skates tucked away under the tree.

Manitoba weather has been described as "10 months of win-ter and two months of tough skating." Little wonder then that the rinks are full of aspir-ing National Hockey Leaguers ... kids who would shun the life of a movie star for that of a professional hockey player.

Bill Faithin is one of many Brandon boys to grow up and falfil that dream. He's now in the uniform of the New York Rangers, in the midst of his hird NHL season with one of pro hockey's top teams.

It's been a long and exhaust-ing journey from the South End Recreation Centre to Madison Square Garden. But Puitbairn, with a steady no-nonsense ap-proach to his profession, has made it.

Ask anyone who saw him play junior nockey six years ago and they'll be quick to tell you they never doubted Fairbairn would play in the NHL As matter of fact, if there's a person in Bran-don who's not a Fairbairn fan, he's never been heard from.
