WINNIPEG—A \$225,000 loan from the Manitoba Development Corporation will be used to help finance the expansion of a laminated wood products operation at Boissevain—an operation which would likely have otherwise disappeared, says In-dustry and Commerce Minister

Len Evans.

The loan was made to Dring (Canada) Limited, which had acquired the fixed assets and inventory of Dring Laminated Structures Limited. Dring Lam

Structures Limited. Dring Laminated had announced earlier this year that it would cease production at the end of May because of financial difficulties.

Mr. Evans said that according to B. G. Chambers, president and general manager of Dring Canada Ltd., the MDC loan and the technical and marketing assistance rendered by the Manitoba Department of Industry and Commerce together with local capital and a federal grant were key factors behind his decision to expand the Bolssevain operatier.

Mi. Evans reported that in its acquisition of Dring Laminated by the private Canadian corporation, Dring Canada, the creditors of the former company is champ reditors of the former company vere being paid 100 cents on he dollar.

"Apart from Dring Laminated's financial problems," said Mr. Evans, "there was, and is, every reason to believe that with the proper capital input the Boissevain operation can be transformed into a most viable enterprise."

We left Winnipeg, May 8th at 6:30 p.m. via Air Canada bound for London, Eng., flying the poi-ar route over the barren north, Hudson's Bay and Iceland and arriving at London's Heathrow Airport at 8:00 s.m. British time. Tired after a sleepless night we immediately booked in to our hotel and had four hours sleep. On waskening we took

Ing Buckingham Palace.

The following morning we boarded a bus for northern Wales, which holds very beautiful scenery. Having apent 3 days in Buckley, Wales we visited one of the oldest cities in Eng., Chester, which dates back to the days of the Romans. This very old city has a wall built around it and one can walk all around the whole city and see many ruins of the Roman times. There is also a beautiful cathedral in Chester and a fig carball results. dral in Chester and a flag car-ried by Gen. Wolfe in his con-flict with Montealm on the Plains of Abraham hangs in this

Leaving Chester by train bound for Northern Scotland, we spent a night in Glascow, on then to Inverness.

There are lots of sheep and lambs and many cattle and also Highland cattle grazing in the fields. Such a quiet peaceful sight. The castle in Inverness is quite impressive, with the river flowing by.

Having spent the night in Inverses we again boarded a train for Thurso and then a short bus trip to Scrabster harbour where we embarked on a mail boat for the Orkney Islands, A journey which lasted about 2½ hrs. over one of the most dangerous stretches of water in the world called the Pentland Firth. Fortunately the crossing was a very calm one and we sailed past the Old Man of Hay which legends say is an old man standing on the sea. In reality, this is a lonely tall cliff standing off the coast of the island of Hay. the coast of the island of Hay

is a lonely tall cliff standing off the coast of the island of Hay. We disembarked at Stromness and our stay, tho' short, on the Orkney Islands, was truly an education in itself. One may not know that the Orkney Islands once belonged to the Scandinavian countries. Some foll is claim it once belonged to Norway and some say it belonged to Denmark. However at one time the Duke of Scotland became engaged to a Scandinavian princess. Her father approving of the engagement of his daughter gave the Duke of Scotland the Orkney Islands as a dowry. On her journey to meet the Duke for her wedding, aboard a boat, it was shipwrecked and the princess was drowned off they coast of St. Margaret's Hopd. Consequently the Duke of Scotland kept the dowry and thus the Orkney Islands became a part of Scotland.

The Orkney Islands cover an area of approximately 300 square miles and I must say every inch is very beautiful and very historical. The islands are covered in heather and not one tree can be seen. The people are a self sustaining race and very warm and kind. Truly the record (friendly record I. have every friendly record Islands.) most friendly people I have ever

These people toll in the fields cutting peat. In our travels around the Orkney Islands one can see many families cutting peat and drying it in preparation for fuel for the fireplaces and cook stoves. This to me was a sight indeed. I spoke to many of these Orcadians toiling in these peat fields and was given boundless information.

These people raise cattle, sheep, chickens, ducks and geese which they use for food and the wool from the sheep is used to make most of their clothing. We visited many homes spinning wheel

Everywhere one goes they are constantly urged to partake of their warm hospitality. Their table has a bountiful appearance and one is offered cheese, butter, duck or goose eggs and many other Scottlah traditional dishes made by their own hands. The oats for their Scottish oatcakes, etc., is ground by the mills on their own land.

Each and every one is very independent and as I said before, one is constantly offered tea or a wee drop of Scotch whiskey and as they say it is the best whiskey in the world.

After all this partaking of the kind hospitality of the people, we proceeded to see some of the historical sights of the Orkney Islands. Our relatives live on the shores of Scapa Flow which I am sure everyone is aware of the history connected there. One may remember this is where Lord Kitcherer, who was commander of the ship called the Hampshire, struck a mine in 1916 and sank 200 yards off-shore taking to the bottom of the sea 600 sallors. A beautiful monument dedicated by the Arcadians stands dedicated to this famous man and his crewoverlooking the cliff depicting this tragedy

In the last war 1939-45 the Royal Oak was torpedeed here by a German U boat and it too went to the bottom carrying 800 men with it and a brightly colored buoy designates this exact spot. The German ship Hindenberg also lies on the bottom of berg also lies on the these waters.

The islands are joined by 5 causeways which we are built during the was of 10 ton concrete blocks, built by the concrete blocks, built by the lialian pissoners of wear open contracting the waters surrounding the Orkney Islands. These causeways are called the Churchill Barriers.

Crossing one of these causeways we toured a beautiful little chapel called the Italian Chapel which has become quite a tourist attraction. It was cona tourist attraction. It was con-structed by the Italian prisoners of war and built out of any materials these men could ob-tain, such as bully beef tins, paper and bits of concrete. The windows are of colored glass bottles and the religious figures are beautifully carved.

In the capital of Orkney call-ed Kirkwall, we toured the beautiful St. Magnus Cathedral built by the Norsemen in 1137. This is truly magnificent, though ancient building.

We then saw the Pick Village, one of many which are now being discovered in the Orkney Islands. This particular village is at Skara-Brae. It dates back to the Stone Age and one can

ing aiscovered in the Orkney Islands. This particular village is at 5kara Brae. It dates back to the Stone Age and one can see the furniture used by these little people and how they lived in those days. This is a fascinating sight. We walked along the shores of the North Atlantic with the waves lapping the sands. However it was much to cold for wading, but we did gather a few sea shells.

We were invited in to have tea with a Mr. Linklater who had the misfortune of being the first man wounded in the British Empire in the 1939-45 war. He showed us clippings from the papers and told us the story of how a German aircraft was being chapted by the R. A. F. and dropped his bombs on the Brig of Weithe and consequently Mr. Linklater, his wife and small daughter tried to take refuge under the kitchen table. Mr. Linklater was hit by shrapnel, but fortunately his wife and daughter escaped unharmed, but the next door neighbor was killed. This Mr. Linklater told us many interesting stories.

Much as we hated to leave the Orkney Islands, its warm friendly people it was time to leave and be one our way. One hated to leave such a quiet serue place.
