## Deficit of over \$2000 reported at Rink meeting

RESTON — An operating deficit of \$222.05 was reported to the eight people who attended the recently held annual public meeting of the Reston Community Rink. The audited statement for the year ending April 30th showed operating receipts of \$9,073.52 while expenditures were \$11,295.57.

The statement showed a bank balance of \$1,832.69 as of April 30th, 1971 and at the same time this year there was a bank overdraft of \$683.36.

The financial plight of the rink was discussed at length by the eight interested enough to attend and it was agreed that the committee would approach the council to discuss the situation.

The receipt side of the statement showed that both sides amounted to \$5,111.13 while purchases on this account totalled \$3,837.63. Sales from the soft drink machines totalled \$1,304.73 but purchases were \$1,086.04.

Rentals of \$300.00, skating receipts of \$519.30, share of the hockey gate \$723.01 and \$549.00 by the curling club for their share of heating the rink were the major items of receipts.

On the expense side it cost \$2,154.52 for heat, \$34.40 for water, \$551.03 for insurance and \$1,333.80 for wages. Smaller items made up the balance.

Nominated to the board were: Bill Busby, Max Caldwell, Oliver Chester and Gordon Forsyth, one of whom will serve a one-year term. Other members are: Buck Martin and Jack Russell, with one year remaining and Clarence Magnusson, Brian Taylor and Jim Walker with two years left.

The retiring members were: Bob Froese and Mel Williamson.

## Will ask for a better deal on policing costs

RESTON — A resolution jointly by the R.M. of Pipestone and the Town of Melita pointing out the discrimination against the smaller towns in the costs of policing will be presented at the annual meeting of the Union of Manitoba Municipalities held in November, it was decided at the

regional meeting held in the Memorial Hall here on Tuesday of last week.

It was pointed out that a town with a population of just over 500 must provide its own policing which, if a contract is made with the R.C.M.P., costs over \$10,000.00 a year, the same as a

town with a much larger population and a much greater assessment.

The Hon. Howard Pawley, minister of municipal affairs, was one of the speakers at the morning session. Mr. Pawley told the meeting that the representation by population policy, which was proposed for rural municipalities, would not be instituted unless there was a local demand for it.

Reeve M. J. Edgar, of the Rural Municipality of Wallace, chaired the meeting which started at 10:00 a.m. with the invocation by Rev. E. R. Schurman. Reeve Carl Wedow, of the R.M. of Pipestone, welcomed the delegates and Reeve Gordon Howat, of the R.M. of Sifton, replied.

Greetings from Reston were given by Jim Walker, president of the Reston and District Chamber of Commerce.

Other speakers in the morning included J. G. Murray, secretary, of the R.M. of Thompson and president of the Municipal Secretary - Treasurers Association; Reeve Bob Adrian, of the R.M. of Portage, president of the Union of Manitoba Municipalities and R. L. McDonald, deputy minister of municipal affairs.

Minutes of the 1971 district meeting were read by J. C. Scott, secretary.

In the afternoon Mr. Bill McGowan, of the Manitoba Telephone System, discussed telephone rates and service provided by the system. Mr. Joe Perle gave a talk on Autopac and also answered questions regarding it.

Reeve John Williamson of the R.M. of Albert, gave an address on the Canadian Grain Council. Reeve Tom Marsden, of the R.M. of Cornwallis, talked on municipal planning.

## JUST A SECOND...

The well-worked phrase "Wait a second" this year takes on fresh significance with news that on June 30, scientists will flick the second hands of the world's master clocks back by one second.

Scientists say this will correct a discrepancy discovered in 1958 with the development of atomic clocks so accurate it would take 50,000 years for one of them to gain or lose a single second (how do they know that?)

A writer on the financial page of a large newspaper has been complaining about those who say we must cut back on industrial expansion in order to conserve our resources and clean up the environment. He says it is more important to rescue a family from poverty than "to leave a given area for the quiet contemplation of the few."

Would a large corporation go broke if it took the planet and all its people into consideration when it planned new products or phased out old? When its Board of Directors met to draw up next year's program, if en-

Planned obsolescence whether of cars or clothing is an obscenity today when we have been repeatedly warned by scientists that we are rapidly exhausting our sources of energy. If we continue to expand industrially without consideration for the facts of environment, there will no longer be a concern about poverty—we'll all be in the same boat and equally destitute—having turned our planet into a desert.

## Bill Watt touring South America

Excerpts from recent letters from Bill Watt presently touring South America:

La Paz, Bolivia, June 10th. La Paz—highest capital in the world at 12,400 feet is poor, but rather nice somehow, although everything is expensive. Hot in the sun—cold at night. In a basin, it is surrounded by beautiful snow covered peaks. Bolivia's economy appears to be agriculture and is heavily cultivated, even on the 12,500 feet altitude plain between La Paz and Lake Titicaca. Plan to spend another day or so here and then leave for Argentina,

and then down to Montevideo by month's end. Will likely be in Buenos Aires shortly thereafter. Canadian Embassy Casilla De Correo 1598. Everything fine here will likely be travelling with a fellow from Toronto for the next couple of weeks.

Salta, Argentina, June 15th I've been sitting in this park all morning trying to write this card but every few minutes some beautiful creature walks by and I lose control—oops—there goes another one. This country is equal to Costa Rica when it comes to beautiful women—I think! It also has some people obviously advanced in agricultural methods, so I thought you might come down and interview them. Combining consists of hand cutting the grain, placing it in a circular pile and then driving a team of horses, cattle or whatever around and around the circle. I am sure with such advanced practices you will have no difficulty in convincing Rosilyn that a business trip is in ORDER. Entered Argentina a couple of days after more than two terrible days & nights on trains and buses across the roof of the world from La Paz, Bolivia. Packed like cattle with hundreds of Indians into almost box car coaches, the smells, the noises and the discomfort, the cold etc., were beyond description. The Andes and the Indians were breathtakingly beautiful and interesting, but I am really happy to be down to prairie like country and white folk—perhaps was getting a bit of claustrophobia or something. The food and the wine here are fantastic, and cheap. So hope to fatten up a bit and enjoy myself doing it. Everything clean and fresh and modern here as opposed to Peru where one relates to an Inca civilization over 1000 years old. Which, of course, was interesting but after a few months starts to get one down.

Will head east in a few days into jungle-like country—visit Iguazu—famous waterfalls and junction of Argentina, Paraguay and Brazil borders—and then down to Montevideo.

May even go to work—if that's feasible.

Sorry to be a bit late getting this away.

We still enjoy getting the Recorder and reading the different write-ups. Especially was interested in the one by Mrs. Foster and Mary Stonehouse concerning the rock used in building the G.S. Munro Store.

The red granite rock used in it was cut from a rock situated less than one quarter of a mile south of the Kinloss School on the farm I owned in the 1930's.

There is a good bit of this rock there yet. It spread out for a piece under the surface of the ground and was used by the Buffalo for a rubbing place, as an old buffalo trail led to it from the south east and on to the north somewhere, as I remember a short piece of this trail across an unbroken piece of the prairie on a quarter section one

half mile south and to the east side of the road.

Ed Pierce owned the quarter with the rock on and later my father, J. W. Sutcliffe, and then myself. I believe it is now owned by Lorne Watt.

One may remember this is where Lord Kitchener, who was commander of the ship called the Hampshire, struck a mine in 1916 and sank 200 yards off-shore taking to the bottom of the sea 600 sailors. A beautiful monument dedicated by the Arcadians stands dedicated to this famous man and his crew overlooking the cliff depicting this tragedy.

In the last war 1939-45 the Royal Oak was torpedoed here by a German U boat and it too went to the bottom carrying 800 men with it and a brightly colored buoy depicting a beef tin spot. The German ship Hindenberg also lies on the bottom of these waters.

The islands are joined by 5 causeways which were built during the war of 5 & 10 ton concrete blocks, built by the Italian prisoners of war to prevent the Nazis fleet from penetrating the waters surrounding the Orkney Islands. These causeways are called the Churchill Barriers.

Crossing one of these causeways we toured a beautiful little chapel called the Italian Chapel which has become quite a tourist attraction. It was constructed by the Italian prisoners of war and built out of any materials these men could obtain, such as bull's head tin, paper and bits of concrete. The windows are of colored glass bottles and the religious figures are beautifully carved.

In the capital of Orkney called Kirkwall, we toured the beautiful St. Magnus Cathedral built by the Norsemen in 1137. This is truly magnificent, though ancient building.

We then saw the Pick Village, one of many which are now being discovered in the Orkney Islands. This particular village is at Skara Brae. It dates back to the Stone Age and one can see the furniture used by these little people and how they lived in those days. This is a fascinating sight. We walked along the shores of the North Atlantic with the waves lapping the sands. However it was much too cold for wading, but we did gather a few sea shells.

We were invited in to have tea with a Mr. Linklater who had the misfortune of being the first man wounded in the British Empire in the 1939-45 war. He showed us clippings from the papers and told us the story of how a German aircraft was being chased by the R. A. F. and dropped his bombs on the Brig of Weithe and consequently Mr. Linklater, his wife and small daughter tried to take refuge under the kitchen table. Mr. Linklater was hit by shrapnel, but fortunately his wife and daughter escaped unharmed, but the next door neighbor was killed. This Mr. Linklater told us many interesting stories.

Much as we hated to leave the Orkney Islands, its warm friendly people it was time to leave and be on our way. One hated to leave such a quiet serene place.

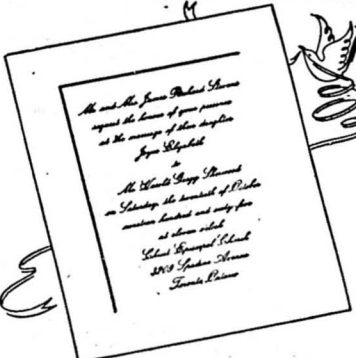
