ARE PRISONS GETTING TOO SOFT?

Time was that "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" was the guiding principle for punishment. Most people conveniently overlooked the fact that a careful reading of that passage in the Bible shows it means an eye for an eye is the maximum punishment that can morally be sought. The message of the Bible surely is that mercy (not to mention commonsense should prevail).

This should be remembered when considering the extensive penal system reforms being introduced by Canada's Solicitor General, Jean-Pierre Goyer. He is trying to change the system from punishment to rehabilitation.

In his short term of office he has moved to allow payment of a basic wage to some prisoners, provided them with ordinary civilian clothing allowed them normal haircuts, eliminated censorship of their letters and al-

lowed thousands of them to leave jail on weekends.

Canada has probably jailed more people, proportionately, than any other civilized country. It is something that every thinking Canadian must face.

And it hasn't worked. The crime rate has continued to go up. What's more, it's expensive. It costs more than \$10,000 yearly to keep a man in prison; only \$400 a year to keep him on parole.

Society's treatment of prisoners works much the same way as its treatment of youth, the aged, dissenters, policemen, and in fact, any group you want to mention. Members of all those groups will tend to behave the way they're expected to, be that good or bad.

We have to help people to their feet if we expect them to walk.

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS REVISED

Those who think the original Ten Commandments are old hat in this permissive age, might be shocked into second thoughts after reading Patricia Clarke's Ten Commandments of the Secular Seventies in the April issue of the United Church Observer.

With tongue-in-cheek, Mrs. Clarke, Associate Editor, in her column, suggests the following list, made up by her family, while sitting around the television set. She notes that the list is by no means exhaustive and invites readers to send a better one if they wish. But she says, "personally we're sticking with Moses."

Ten Commandments re-visited: or, Would Moses suffer culture shock?

1. You shall have no other gods than self-fulfillment. And for this a man shall not cleave to wife and children, but forsaking all responsibility to others shall seek the Real ME.

2. You shall make of yourself a graven image of what is young, sexy and non-smelly; and you shall bow down before Maclean's toothpaste, Gillette shaving cream, Right Guard deodorant, Hai Karate after-shave lotion, Arrow shirts, Carhart jeans and Florsheim shoes.

Management Tip

How to Grow an Extra Bushel of Grain for 12 to 40¢

The amount of nitrogen you need depends on the yield you shoot for.

For instance, you aim for a 60-bushel crop of barley. This needs 1.5 lbs. of nitrogen for each bushel yield. The nitrogen can be broadcast as 21-0-0 or Nitro-plus for about 9.6¢ a lb.
