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## Annual meeting of Pipestone Coop

PIPESTONE — The annual meeting of the Pipestone Consumer's Co-operative was held in the Memorial Hall, Wednesday, April 12th at 8 p.m. with 28 in attendance. The meeting was conducted by Don Harvey, chairman, and Mrs. A. Senkbeil, secretary. The minutes of the last annual meeting were adopted as read.

The directors' report told of a successful year's operation.

The manageress, Miss Gertrude Nicholson, in her report, stated an addition of nine new members, and six removed. Sales were down from a year ago, partly because some good customers had left, and also the fact that two new shopping centers had opened in Brandon during year which she felt had made a difference. She stated that Pipestone Co-op is one of the few Co-ops left who do not charge interest; but wholesalers must be paid every two weeks now. She asked for constructive criticism, continued support and thanked her staff, board of directors and their wives for their loyal support.

The financial report was reviewed by Mr. Jim Gobel, Regional Personnel Manager, from Winnipeg.

Saturday night closing was discussed, and on motion, it was decided to close at 6:00 p.m. with the exception of the months of May and September.

Retiring members of the Board were Miss Mary, Fairbairn and Messrs. Bill Grant, Don Harvey and Ernest Campbell. These four names were nominated for a two year term, and all accepted. Other members of the Board with one year to serve are: Messrs. Chas. Elliott and Carl Atchison and Mrs. Jack Grant.

A delicious lunch of ice cream, cake and coffee and a social hour was enjoyed.

Jack, a life-long resident of the Pipestone district was 64.

## R. M. of Pipestone council decides to purchase new 180 hp Caterpillar

RESTON — The R.M. of Pipestone will purchase a new 180 horsepower Caterpillar D7F crawler tractor with cable controls at a cost of \$53,000.00. The decision was made by council at their meeting on Thursday of last week.

Funds for the machine will come from the machinery replacement reserve account and no increase in taxes will result.

The new machine will be an addition to municipal equipment as there will be no equipment traded on the new machine. Powell Equipment Co. received the order.

A by-law re-engaging Harold Hume, Robert Mason, Ivan Smith and Alvin Wilson as road machine operators was passed. The hourly rate for tractor operators was set at \$2.60 per hour, the provincial minimum.

Notice was received from the provincial government regarding a change in the regulation affecting farm dwelling units. Under the change a dwelling unit on a farm which is considered to be habitable will be eligible for a school tax refund. Previously the unit had to be occupied to obtain the refund.

First reading was given to a certain lands within the Reston by-law allowing the taxing of U.V.D. for local improvements. The by-law will be published

## Small loss reported at Hall meeting

RESTON — A loss of \$42.65 was reported for 1971 at the annual meeting of the Reston Community Hall held in the Theatre on Monday evening. Total receipts were \$10,131.15.

The box office receipts showed a slight improvement over last year being \$5,737.85 compared with \$5,609.70. Other receipts were hall rent \$473.98, municipal grant \$2135.00 and bank loan of \$1400.00 (\$400.00 less than last year).

The main items of expenses were: film rentals \$2078.10, repairs and maintenance \$960.49, wages \$2095.00, fuel \$957.76, booking fee \$300.00 and loan repayment \$1078.71 with miscellaneous items making up a total of \$10,173.79.

A letter from the Virden Health Unit outlined certain improvements that are to be carried. Named to pick the paint which is to be done were Gordon Forsyth and Mrs. F. R. Manning.

Elected to the board for a three year term were: Henry Clausen and Mrs. F. R. Manning, replacing Charles Cook and M. W. Luddidam whose term of office had expired. Other board members are: John Pearson, Stan Sutton, Gordon Forsyth, Art Smith and Jack Guthrie, the latter representing the R. M. of Pipestone.

John Pearson, chaired the meeting and was re-elected as chairman of the board, Henry Clausen was re-appointed as the secretary.

It was decided future meetings will be held on the 2nd Wednesday of the month at 8:00 p.m.

Arne Hansen has been hired to gravel all municipal roads.

It was agreed that we pay our share to the Redvers Veterinary Board to buy an unloading and retaining chute for livestock.

All members of the council attended the meeting. Routine business included the passing of the minutes; the acceptance of financial statements for March and Auditor's statement for 1971. Bills as listed and amounting to \$9,700.82 were approved for payment.

Other actions of the council included:

- A decision to advertise for sale by tender lot 27, block 11, plan 154 in Reston and the house situated thereon.
- To request that the R.M. of Antler guarantee payment if the fire brigade answers a call in that municipality.
- Authorized the sale of block 5 in Search to Henry Lobel.
- Authorized one member of the Volunteer Fire Brigade to attend a school at Clear Lake from May 20 to June 2 with expenses paid.
- Authorized the attendance of the secretary-treasurer and assistant secretary-treasurer at the Secretary's convention and short course in Winnipeg May 1st to 4th.

voiced their opinion on this subject of having an animal clinic in Redvers. All seemed to be in agreement that this would be a good idea, pending more investigation.

A letter from the Kinamen Club of Estevan investigating the need for a Sheltered Workshop in Estevan which would accommodate the special needs of handicapped adult persons in Estevan and surrounding areas was also discussed.

A letter from the Oxbow School Unit was read advising that the school mill rate will be raised from 36 mills to 39 mills.

In other business council decided to advertise for tenders for installing and maintaining of road signs and spraying approximately 200 miles of road to be sprayed by June 15th. The sprayer supplied by municipality. Tenders will be accepted for cutting weeds on roads.

This includes 53 1/2 miles of grid road to be cut to grid standard, and also for cutting other municipal roads. Tenders for above work will be accepted as a whole or as individual jobs. Tenders to be in hands of Secretary Treasurer by 6:00 p.m. Wednesday, May 10th, 1972.

Reeve and Secretary were authorized to sign a consent entry upon a road allowance between LSD 8-17-5-31 and LSD 5-18-5-31 by Mobil Oil Canada Limited for the purpose of constructing, laying, maintaining and repairing a paved flowline road crossing.

\$10.00 grants were sent to Canadian Cancer Society, Sask., Safety Council and St. John Ambulance Brigade.

A bylaw concerning erection of highway traffic signs was introduced. In this bylaw the expression road means any public highway within the municipality as defined in The Highways Act. Signs containing the word "stop" and the word "yield" shall be designated. All signs erected pursuant to sections 2 and 3 hereof shall be erected not less than ten feet and not more than fifty feet from the near edge of the intersected roadway. The provisions of The Vehicles Act shall apply, wherever applicable, to every sign erected pursuant to section 2 and 3. No person shall alter, damage, remove, deface, knock down or tamper with any sign erected pursuant to this bylaw. Any person who violates any provision of this bylaw shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on summary conviction to the penalties in the general penalty bylaw of the municipality.

Doors will be open from 7 to 8 p.m. for audience to view the members' projects.

After the programme upstairs audience will again go downstairs to ask any questions they may wish from the members in Crafts and Clothing projects as each unit will be on hand by their respective projects. Those in Crafts will be demonstrating upon request.

Lunch will be served at the completion of the program.

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## Mill rate is set at April meeting of Rural Municipality of Albert council

TILSTON — Minutes of the March meeting were adopted as read, and accounts totalling \$4100.14 approved at the April 10th meeting of the council of the R.M. of Albert.

A by-law providing for a grant of \$2250.00 toward the enlargement of Alstone Lodge was given three readings and passed.

Council adopted a five year capital expenditure program, which is a program set out by the Minister of Municipal Affairs showing proposed capital expenditures and sources of revenue for the next five years.

RESTON — On April 11th at the Reston Memorial Theatre, Mr. and Mrs. John Jack of Winnipeg, showed some very interesting and well arranged slides of "Wildflowers" of various areas in Manitoba. These were all collected on their field trips.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack were representing the Manitoba Naturalists Society, promoting the idea of visiting our own "Beautiful Manitoba."

There was a good attendance and the silver collection taken amounted to \$50.00 and is to be turned over to the Alstone Building Fund.

A short meeting was held at which trophies for the Flower Show were discussed; it was also decided that a large trophy be given each year to be passed on in following years—the money to be taken from the municipal grant.

Mr. P. J. Peters will show his "Symphony of Seasons" at the Agricultural School in Brandon at 8 p.m. on April 19th. Many who have seen any of Mr. Peters' films will know that they are of excellent calibre.

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## Consent given for construction of dam

OAK LAKE — The meeting of the R.M. of Sifton council was held in the municipal office on Tuesday, April 11th, with councillors Bothe, Durston, Hardy, Atchison, Jasper and Gabrielle present, and the Reeve G. W. Howat in the chair.

Accounts totalling \$5,391.60 were approved by the meeting. The fuel tender from the Oak-Lake-Virden Co-op was accepted by the council to supply diesel and heating fuel for the next 12 months.

Council approved the proposal of Ducks Unlimited to construct the necessary dams to hold water on SW 3-9-24, owned by Everett Batho. The understanding is that no liability for any future damage caused by this operation may be charged to the R.M. of Sifton.

The secretary-treasurer was authorized to order a wreath of flowers for the placing on the Cenotaph on Decoration Day.

Councillor Dean of the Town of Oak Lake, interviewed the Council of Sifton to request lower rates for the use of municipal machinery when the town requires the use of same.

G. Megaffin also was interviewed in regards to a proposal of the building of a Senior Citizens Home in Oak Lake.

## Outdoors Only...

In spite of last Sunday's chill breath, the day's sunny length drew forth more of spring's gentle persuaders, like pussy-willows, crocuses, frogs, black-birds and butterflies, even bigger things, too, such as people. But let's begin at the beginning.

Night of April 8, to start things off, Brent Hensuet, Jim Paul and Larry Donald were motoring home to bed on Highway 2. Near Jim Walker's suddenly appeared a pale, four-legged furry critter standing on the highway, then a retreating; furiously to the ditch from where it came. Further evidence suggested the boys were lucky to see a wandering lynx, considering report of large feet, whiskered face and stubby tail, all on a frame the size of a collie dog. Eerie yowls in the night, spooked animals, a missing chicken might all confirm the presence of such a predatory prowler.

Three reports from Jim O'Rourke deal with geese (30) seen over the home farm, Robins (4) by Bender's place, and a Meadowlark west of Jim Walker's, all observed April 10. The following day two witnesses with Randy Hensuet spotted a very light-coloured Sea Gull flying southward. April 13, a single Sandhill Crane drifted into Bob O'Rourke's sight during his bus run. The following morning, members of the O'Rourke family watched about 150 geese flying over, then 125, finally 100 honkers. Even Tyrone, it was reported, expressed vocal sentiments (Jim's dog)! But this wasn't all; the same morning Dolph Hensuet and

Randy observed over 600 Snow Geese (Wavies) and Blue Geese in northward flight half a mile south of Pipestone. What a grand sight that must have been! More Geese, this time Canada Geese (Honkers) and Snow Geese in three flocks of about 50 birds each, were sighted along No. 52 the same day by Alvin Birnie, Velma and Grant Toews. It is to be hoped that satisfaction and delight are experienced as the soul-eye absorbs the essence of varying scenes of spring migrations.

Slough-side delights were hinted by Velma Toewel report of a pair of Red-wing Black-birds she saw April 14 where Hwy. 2 joins No. 52. Perched on a wire, the pair likely displayed pale shoulder bars that in another month will become ruby splashes. But the top of that day for Velma probably was the sight of new crocuses peeping up at her from the home pasture.

Rambler and family have been generously accorded nature's sights during the past week, for in that time we noted 17 species of birds to arrive or pass through the district. These were Mourning Dove, Killdeer, Great Blue Heron, Sandhill Crane, Pintail Duck, Redwing Blackbird, Scaup Duck, Ring-necked Duck, female Pigeon Hawk, Tree Sparrow, Ring-billed Gull, Franklin Gull, Herring Gull, Red-breasted Merganser (a fish-duck), Cooper's Hawk and Common Coot. Most of these species were observed along the west shore of Oak Lake last Sunday afternoon.

It was earlier that day that a drive north of Reston to a certain pasture netted a collection of dug up crocus bud clusters for transplanting. Appealing little furry pets, aren't they? North and east, a stop along the way harvested two kinds of silky-smooth pussy-willows and a two-toned spring obligato from frogs in a poplar-cirled pool.

At Oak Lake, varieties of ducks, hawks and gulls against a backdrop of straw-ice, sedge, open water, blue sky, green lake-edge lanes and the gray-browns of marsh provide numerous sights worthy of any photographer's or observer's attention. Picturesque and pleasing, it led this shutter-bug to trying a few telephoto shots. A "revolving development" (a Bugs Bunny says) may show however, that there wasn't all the film that the camera registered.

A delicate touch to put the cap on these spring delights were the crocus in full bloom that Mr. Ed. Wilson discovered near the Cochrane gravel pit, and the butterfly that Mrs. Les Lazebny watched, celebrating in the sun, April 17.

## GNP W-H-A-A-T?

Something called the "Gross National Product" has become a cherished statistic of economists, even more so of politicians, probably because it tends to become larger every year.

GNP is an estimate of a nation's total output of goods and services, valued in its own currency.

Canada's 1971 GNP has been announced as \$92.13 billion, an astronomical figure, quite close in fact to the mean distance in million-miles between earth and sun. It is up 9.1 per cent from 1970, which was 7.5 per cent over 1969.

If rising GNP is a prosperity indicator, which some people think it is, these figures should cause gratification.

But others are sceptical about GNP, or at least the way we interpret it. Statistics Canada credits over

a third of last year's gain to "price increases", that very inflation so generally conceded to be a bad thing.

Far from signalling a boom in the Canadian economy, this rising GNP the last two years has been accompanied by factory shutdowns, increasing unemployment, a definite recession in the Atlantic provinces and pockets of poverty elsewhere. Beyond doubting that GNP measures prosperity, looms an even more disturbing thought. Suppose we are reading it wrong way to?

Can it be that increasing GNP actually tallies the amount by which we are consuming our national resources faster than we can replace them, and, combined with similar processes in other nations, is measuring the rate at which we are speeding toward world economic disaster?

## WRONG INTERPRETATION?

Murray Bater, manager of the Manitoba Chamber of Commerce was kind enough to forward the position paper from which the Tribune article headed "Retire small towns: chamber" was based, and which was mentioned in this column last week. Mr. Bater in his accompanying letter stated the story "accentuated the negative and eliminated the positive."

After reading the position paper, we can, with all due respects to Mr. Bater, understand how such a story could be written. The preface, in which it states that the number one economic problem facing Manitoba is that of declining rural population, etc., in the third paragraph states "We believe that the best approach is the concept of the larger community. We feel that we should think of the future rural community in the

larger terms of a whole region and that within that region all necessary services and conveniences would be readily accessible."

This is only a position paper prepared by a Task Force of the Manitoba Chambers and will be presented at the annual meeting at Portage later this month. If adopted it will then become the official policy of the organization. The Task Force consisted of a representative from Winnipeg one from Brandon and two from smaller communities, plus two staff members of the Chambers.

Certainly the paper should spark considerable debate and possibly vigorous opposition from those chambers whose communities will disappear if the conclusion of the position paper is revelent.

Reston was the smallest hospital in the province with an administrator. Mr. Donald reported 434 admissions during the year and a total of 2949 hospital days. Operating receipts were \$55,103.58 and expenses \$58,071.01 leaving a surplus of \$1,031.97... Bev Milliken reports that Stoney Creek is running this year, an improvement on last year when even the pot holes along the creek were not filled... The Ladies Rink Committee, who operated the refreshment booth, turned over \$1000.00 to the rink committee and retained \$50.00 to start next season. Mrs. Fred Paul Jr., secretary told the Recorder.

26 YEARS AGO (April 17, 1952)

The R.M. of Pipestone council at a meeting on Monday afternoon decided to purchase a new Turnadozer which will cost \$28,135.00. The Turnadozer which has been operated by the municipality for the past three years will be traded on the new machine with an allowance of \$11,635.00 for it... A completely revised prize list with more money for prizes was agreed on at a Directors' meeting of the Pipestone-Albert Agricultural Society, with president Alex McKenzie in the chair and Max Caldwell as secretary. The latter reported that the Society had received \$340.00 for lease of oil rights on the fair grounds at the rate of \$10.00 for the first year and a yearly rental of \$1.00 per acre. Century Oils Ltd. are the leaseholders... The hourly rates were set at the R.M. of Albert council meeting on April 8th as follows: man 90c, man and 2 horses \$1.50, man and 4 horses \$1.75, working foreman \$1.00.

36 YEARS AGO (April 24, 1942)

Several parcels of land were sold by the R.M. of Pipestone council at a meeting on April 15th with the price ranging \$425.00 for a half section up to \$2000.00 for a full section... It is well for motorists to remember that gasoline dealers cannot retail gasoline after 7:00 in the evening except on Saturday when they can remain open until 9:00... Many sloughs that have been dry for years are filled with water this spring and as a result there are more ducks in the district than for many years... A plebiscite will be held on Monday, April 27th on the question of releasing government from any obligation arising out of the past commitments restricting the method of raising men for military service (i.e. permitting conscription if needed)... At a meeting of the R.M. of Albert council on April 10th, the following hourly rates were set for work: man 40c, man and two horses 65c, man and four horses 80c and working foreman 50c.

40 YEARS AGO (April 21, 1932)

A congregational meeting was held at Bolton on Sunday and the following were elected: Robert Dodds, sec. - treas., Messrs. R. Dodds, Jack Forke and Hayward Hopkins, trustees, Mrs. T. Robertson, organist, Mrs. Jas. Dodds, Sunday School superintendent and Edna Motz, organist... It is stated that beginning May 1st, the passenger train from Winnipeg to Regina thru Reston will be hauled by a semi-diesel instead of a steam locomotive. At present the traffic is so light the service does not pay its way... A bin of seed wheat belonging to C. Ashley in the Lambton district, was broken into last week and around 60 bushels taken. The R.C.M.P. at Virden were notified and the wheat was traced and the thieves taken to Virden. It was quite a surprise to work and may put an end to some mysterious happenings lately.

50 YEARS AGO (April 20, 1922)

The formation of a high school district at Reston is the subject of two letters, one in favor by A. E. Smith and one in opposition by Charles Grose. The cost factor is the main theme of Mr. Grose's opposition in the plan... The crocus are beginning to make an appearance,

the first sign of spring... A Wheat Board, similar in power and along the same lines of that operated during the war is one of the demands of the Progressive Party at Ottawa... The small boys are out in force trapping gophers to obtain the bounty of 3c per tail offered by the Municipality... G. Sharples of Estevan, is offering the lot north of the Baptist Church for \$75.00... At a meeting of the Farmers' Party held at Virden last week it was decided to run a candidate in Virden Constituency and a convention will be called soon to pick the person.

60 YEARS AGO (April 18, 1912)

Owing to last Sunday's blizzard the Session of the Presbyterian Church decided to postpone the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper until April 28th... At a meeting of the R.M. of Albert council on March 27th at the home of A. McIver, authorization was made to pay A. McIver \$10.00 as rent for the first three

months for the council meetings and also to pay W. Kilkenny's salary of \$135.00 as sec.-treas., for the same period... For the first time in several years the sloughs are well filled with water this spring... George Milliken's fine horse Sir Lynedoch will be on the road again this

year... The well drill is busy punching for water in the Ewart district. We hope they are successful... George Fraser is operating an auto livery using his Case car and is prepared to take travelers and private parties any place during the summer months.

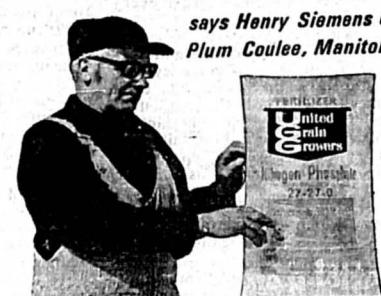
