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Last rites for David Thomas Bailey at Pipestone

PIPESTONE — Last rites for the late David Thomas Bailey were held in the Pipestone United Church on Tuesday, Nov. 21 with a large number of friends and neighbours in attendance. Rev. E. Shurman officiated.

As a special tribute Mrs. Alice Senkbell, who was organist, played "Over the Waves" and "After the Ball is Over" preceding the funeral. The choir was in attendance at the service.

Dave as the deceased was known to his many friends, died in the Deer Lodge Hospital on Saturday, Nov. 18, after an illness of some weeks duration. He was 82 years of age having been born in London, England, on December 21st, 1889.

Dave came to Canada and to the Pipestone district in 1910 and made his home here since, with the exception of service in the armed forces during World War I.

A good friend and neighbour he was very fond of children. A talented violinist, he played at many entertainments and concerts at Pipestone and in more recent years at the Sherwood in Virden for the senior citizens there.

He is survived by his wife Dorothy and a son James Edward, of Pipestone and a daughter, Mrs. Rita May Couto of Transcona.

Burial was in the Pipestone Cemetery with Legion Honors, conducted by V. J. Gloor. The Legion and Auxiliary members attended the service in a body.

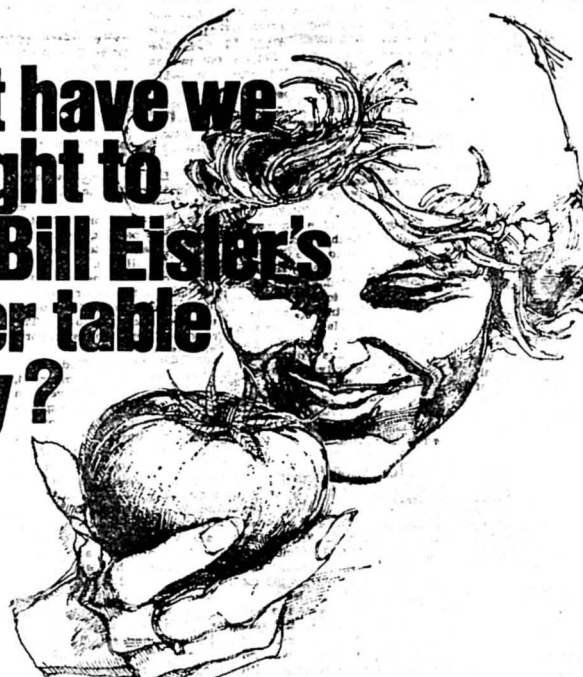

REGIONAL GOVERNMENT

At a recent meeting with the Provincial cabinet at Morden, Manitoba, the Manitoba Chamber of Commerce urged the development of a new form of regional government in rural Manitoba. Premier Schreyer, after the meeting, seemed to indicate close agreement with this policy.

The Chamber's position, as outlined in a recent policy paper, is that the ease of modern transportation and communication have ended the economic reason for existence of many small communities, especially those with a population of under 500. The paper stated that "The community of tomorrow" will permit smaller towns and villages to pool their resources and provide higher quality services at a lower cost with a reasonable time distance which is defined as not more than one hour's driving time.

Stating this proposal in general terms does not prove it, however. To suggest as the Chambers report does, that rural areas will have more qualified professional people or better retail stores, simply because the rural boundaries are redrawn, is a highly debatable proposition. The argument that better recreational facilities or improved planning will occur ignores the fact that such development is already taking place at a very rapid pace in the country, and some rural citizens now probably have a better access to libraries, rinks, or other recreational facilities than their urban counterparts have.

The idea of services located within one hour's driving time could be very harmful. Many towns, for example, have hospital facilities within

one hour's distance of a larger hospital. If such hospitals are to be closed, the effect could be devastating for these communities.

The Chambers recommendations are similar to those contained in the report of the Manitoba Boundaries Commission which suggested that larger municipal units would have lower administrative costs and could therefore increase the moneys available for the improvement of local services. The idea that larger government will be less expensive to administer may be difficult to explain to many rural people. The creation of large unitary school divisions has certainly not had that effect. In one such division, operating costs have risen by 55% over a five year period and this experience seems typical of many unitary divisions.

It is worthwhile to study and debate the role of rural municipal government but a number of hard questions must be faced. What will be the effect of regional government on the already overburdened owner of real property, on the farmer, the small businessman and the homeowner? What are the opinions of rural Mayors and Reeves who have a great deal of experience in this area? Will large municipal areas be really run by the people or by the civil servants who will have to be hired to administer them?

Changes should be made only after careful study of these and other questions and not on the basis of sweeping conclusions which may sound better than they work.

Outdoors Only

Nothing like change to bring smiles especially after the weeks of uniformly gray weather we had up to Wednesday a week ago. Then it happened—the blazing sky, brilliant sunsets, and crystal nights. Smiles doubtless lessened with the weekend's windy spells and snow flurries. Yet these seasons didn't prevent fun for rambblers or young alike when one considers that, in a few locations, children with initiative have capitalized on nature and are using frozen ponds as skating rinks. This could be done right in Reston.

Eagles, Ravens, Boreal Chickadees, Pine Grosbeaks, Red Crossbills and Snowy Owls have a common characteristic — being native to northern forests or the tundra arctic shorelands).

as in the case of the Snowy Owl. Interesting has been the numbers of reports of the presence of these birds in our district and latitude. Why should we be seeing these species? Well, of course, we know about the cyclical visits that the Snowy's pay us in greater numbers every four years. This doesn't account, however, for sight of other northern birds as they normally are seldom seen, unless under severe winter conditions. In this part of the province.

At the Brandon Natural History Society meeting last week, Mr. Robert Walker, chief naturalist of the Riding Mountain National Park, revealed some interesting facts about the ecology (environmental conditions and relationships) of these species. This year, Spruce Grouse and ruffed Grouse population in Riding Mountain National Park are low. Since eagles and ravens depend a lot on carrion from kills that include grouse and rabbit, these birds are being forced to forage farther from their usual haunts, and naturally find the remains of deer hunters' kills in our district very attractive and satisfying. Furthermore there was a very scant crop of spruce cones in the park and other coniferous forests this year. Since such a crop is such a considerable source of food for Pine Grosbeaks, Red Crossbills, White-winged Crossbills, Siskins, it is no surprise, then, that members of these species are found now in unusual locations such as local parks, town lots and gardens containing coniferous trees. The Boreal Chickadee (brown-headed variety) came along to get a conservative view of the liberalization of the N.D.P. movement.

It is Bald Eagles, nevertheless that are most impressive to record, no matter what the circumstances, and that to continue within sight. Last Friday, while on patrol, Dave Dickson observed a pair of Bald Eagles not far northeast of Grande Prairie. Another was seen in the Bede — Bernice area over the weekend, as was also a Snowy Owl, by Gary Gould and other persons. Regretful is the lack of details: size, degree of coloration, acuity, types of perch, degree of wariness, and direction of flight. Any such information is always appreciated and important.

An interesting letter from Mr. Ray Murray, now resident of St. James, West Winnipeg, con-

cerns Blue Jays of which quite a few are seen, one coming often to feed on peanuts on a table while Mr. Murray watches only three feet away. Mr. Murray mentions that the Jays produce not only a ghastly racket if the peanuts are not on hand, but also the most beautiful notes of birdsong he has ever listened to. The regular peanut pirate even matches when a red squirrel buries a nut, then promptly exhumes the meaty tidbit and downs it as an appetizer. Bread spread with peanut butter and cut up into tiny squares is also a great favorite of little squirrels and birds alike.

Mr. Murray commented also on the film "American Wilderness" that he and his wife viewed, too, remarking on the number of letters (in the paper) disapproving of the snooting of the wonderful animals seen. I sympathize with this view, although it must be said that, as was pointed out in the film, the trophy animals in question were in their final years and might not have survived another season. If shooting of such an animal provides material and information for a greater understanding of the species and its preservation, then the shot has some justification. There are practically always other bulls or rams ready to assume leadership of the flock whose leader has just been killed. Thank you, Mr. Murray, for news, views and photo; all much appreciated.
