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## Six units to be added

RESTON—Municipal Affairs Minister Howard Lawley has announced that a grant of \$10,200 will be forwarded by the province toward the construction of a six-unit addition to Alstone Lodge.

The grant amount is to be included in a \$39,937.00 mortgage from the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation to build the units. In turn the province

has agreed to pay annually the related principle and service charges on the mortgage as in the original agreement covering the first units built.

The Elderly and Infirm Persons Housing Act requires the local sponsor (Alstone Lodge Inc.) to provide a minimum of ten per cent of the construction cost, plus serviced land for the project. In this case tender is

still out and it is not known how much the Alstone Inc. will have to put up. Several organizations have already pledged financial support and it is not anticipated that any great difficulties will be encountered in raising the required sum.

The land for the addition was purchased last December and is ready now for the addition. Secretary of the Alstone Board, Rev. E. Schurman was happy with the agreement despite the six month delay in the grant settlement. The provincial government offered to take ownership of Alstone over entirely. Mr. Schurman told the Recorder, but the board wanted to retain its independence despite the greater responsibility.

The six suites to be constructed are all to be single unit house-keeping affairs because there is little demand for double units. Mr. Schurman estimates that rent for the new accommodations will be around \$58.00 per month. Under the senior citizens housing act the Alstone is not allowed to charge more than \$64.00 for a single unit and \$79.00 for a double.

The Alstone has 14 single unit applications on its waiting list so that the six new units are likely to be occupied upon completion of the construction.

## LOCAL INTEREST NEEDED

Reston's Historical Museum seems to be fated to lie unrecognized by local residents, despite repeated favorable references by organizations on the prairies.

Upon recently touring the local structure Colin Watson, curator of a Saskatchewan provincial museum, commented that the value of the relics contained there should be insured for at least \$10,000.

Organizations within the province have also seen fit to give the museum a little unevoked applause. The Brandon Chamber of Commerce mentioned it in one of their brochures and it is referred to on the most recent Manitoba road map for tourists. Both the Canadian and Manitoba Museum Associations record it in their directories on museums, with the latter describing the museum as an educational and informative establishment.

Unfortunately, the people of Reston and surrounding district do not share their enthusiasm for the institution. The local museum board has called several public meetings without

much success, due largely to the people's apathy, and it seems as though the board is becoming discouraged at their futile efforts to create local interest.

It is possible to have the museum open to a group on any given day, simply by contacting a member of the committee headed by president Arthur Smith. Individuals wishing to tour the museum may obtain a key from Alex Watt, Tom Lockhart, Arthur Smith or Charlie Ashley at the Alstone.

In 1967 Mr. Ashley, with his late brother, Joe Ashley, donated the antiques which form the nucleus of the exhibits. Since then many articles have been added and even the most recent visitor will find something new to interest him.

Mr. Ashley, Mr. Smith and Mr. Dave Braddell are willing to conduct tours through the museum for interested individuals.

This year some two to three hundred signatures have been recorded at the buildings, quite ideally located in the Memorial Park.

## WE PAY THE PRICE

It was not so long ago (only four years) that Canadians, young and old stood gazing hopefully towards Parliament Hill, where the Canadian political assembly line had produced a new head-man. Colorful and a federalist, Pierre Trudeau had come to lead us out of the Canadian financial desert caused by American domination. But time has come and gone and Mr. Trudeau's popularity has declined in the face of an impatient electorate. Meanwhile and not to surprisingly, Canadian patriotism, probably more empty defined as anti-Americanism, has been on the rise.

Unfortunately, it seems as though Canadians have become so psychopathic in their passion to denounce "Uncle Sam" that we have completely disregarded our need for progressive development industrially, financed by what few Canadian dollars we can muster. During the past four years we have been "standing on guard" for Canada, only we have been facing the wrong direction. It is not so much that they have taken our economy, but that somewhere during the course of time we chose to give it to them.

What is even more unfortunate is the fact that we have decided to recognize the problem at a time when it is more of a fore-gone conclusion than anything else. In other words we are standing up on our American-made soap boxes and shaking our small insignificant little fists at the big new owner without stopping to remember that there was a time when we had an equal chance to bid in the same market place. We prepare for the battle when the "war" is actually over.

There is some merit, I suppose, in our realization that the mega-corporations own us, and well we should because the situation is not a new one. It is only when you stop to realize that Pierre Trudeau, Diefenbaker, Mackenzie King, Wilfred Laurier all the way

back to Sir Isaac Brock are playing on the same Canadian team; only in an American league, that you come to the real essence of the problem. Canadians have been shaking their indignant little fists southward since the time of the first British Empire Loyalists.

When this realization is brought into perspective we establish that any solution we can come up with to kick the Yankees out of our hallowed land will have to cover a number of years, more likely decades. Anti-Americanism might have been the solution at one time, but it has long since become obsolete.

It is important now that we cease worrying about the possibility of large scale American investment, (this seems to be the basis of our anti-Americanism) because it has become our reality. We have to start originating our own development; something we haven't done successfully for years. Naturally the development is going to be slower but the era of the boom years is past anyway. It is we who have to pay the price if we truly believe in an independent Canada. More than likely incomes are going to be lower, and most of us are going to be worse off than before. But there is no politician who can wave his magic wand and cause every U.S. dollar to abruptly fly back home.

The fact remains that it is not so much that we can't develop Canada ourselves because in time, we can. But when it comes down to the final analysis it is truly easier for us to dispel all our pangs of conscience in a colorful flurry of meaningless punches at "Uncle Sam." Somewhere we ventured off the track and ended up on the New York Central or the Great Northern. It seems the time has come for us to be less anti-American and more pro-Canadian.

## The Days Gone By

10 YEARS AGO (July 12, 1942)

Existing stations on the Inter-provincial Pipe Line at Cromer and Glenboro will have their ninth pumping unit installed this summer. The unit will be electric and will be installed outside. Last week it rained every day and the total was 1.06 inches. A lay-off of exactly one year worked wonders for the Antler ball club who won first money at the 62nd Antler Sports on Monday, July 2nd. Pitchers Bill Ralston and Felix Martine served up the slants that baffled the opposing teams. Eight teams took part and Elkhorn was the loser in the final. The rye crops in the district are a pretty picture standing as tall as the fences and as even as a board. George Guthrie's expansion probably best describes the crop conditions, his words being: "The full of the earth."

20 YEARS AGO (July 12, 1922)

A promising oil strike has been made at a well four miles north-east of Tilton, it is reported. The well, Cal-San Tilton Prov. 5-32 was at the 3126 level, when on testing Saturday oil flowed to the surface. California Standard paid \$3200 for the first year for oil rights on a half section of land six miles east of Tilton. Over 2500 attended the two day sports held at Bellegarde on Saturday and Sunday. Twelve teams took part in the open tournament on Saturday with Fairlight winning first, Parkman second and Fannystelle third. An eight team invitational tournament was the Sunday feature. Alida won first defeating Reston 10 to 7 in the final. Fannystelle stayed over and were rewarded with third money. Doreen Camplin of Bellevue and June Forsyth of Pipestone, are members of a group of eight young people of the United Church, rolling through Manitoba in a Caravan movement. The eight young people have a sound knowledge of handicrafts, recreation schemes and are proven leaders. The freak storm of last week played some queer tricks. At the Louis Henequet farm, two racks of balck hay stood in the yard covered by tarpaulins, close by were two empty racks. The wind made kindling of the two empty racks but the tarpaulins never moved on the full ones.

30 YEARS AGO (July 16, 1912)

Elmer McMurchy, R.C.A.F. Yorkton, arrived on Friday to spend a short furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. McMurchy. Stanford Hayward of Sinclair, had an alarming experience on Friday while in the act of topping off a stack of hay and a swarm of bees appeared on the scene. The Queen alighted on his head. He soon moved down but the bees followed him for a 100 yards before he shook the queen from his cap. The bees were eventually hived by Jack Hayward. Frank Benzle has joined up with the Winnipeg Rifles and is now in uniform. John and Jim Morrice who are in training at Sussex, B.C., arrived on Monday to spend a short leave with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Morrice. Mr. D. Hean has purchased the house on Antler's main street which was until lately, occupied by Chas. Dyson. With a good crop in prospect, farmers have one headache—the matter of harvesting same. With most of the young men in military training, the farm labor problem is bound to be acute. A limited amount of money will be available under P.F.R.A. for the construction of dug-outs and farmers are requested to leave their names with the R.M. of Pipestone if they want one dug.

40 YEARS AGO (July 14, 1912)

Myriads of full grown grasshoppers were noted on No. 2 highway between Reston and Pipestone. The insects it has been suggested, are visitors from across the line and with favorable weather conditions the district is likely to be in for a fight against these pests in another year. Reston citizens who attended Brandon Fair last

week report an excellent show. The only thing lacking was the usual large attendance to make the fair a financial success. Reston will be well represented at the dedication service of the Peace Gardens south of Boissevain today. A number of residents of the Belas district motored to the Turtle Mountains to pick Saskatoons and found them very plentiful. The induction service for Rev. N. Daynard was held in the United Church on Wednesday evening, July 8th. Rev. Harvey of Reston, occupied the chair. A shower in honor of Miss Avis Bulloch, a bride-elect of this month, was held at the home of Mrs. Frank Brady on Monday night. The evening was passed at bridge and the guest of honor was presented with a gift of Community Silver. M. W. Cormack of Edmonton, was a guest at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Smith last week. Miss Mildred Smith and Mr. Wm. Cormack left for Vata on Monday where they will visit the latter's parents.

50 YEARS AGO (July 13, 1922)

Owen Moore in "Reported Missing" and Harold Lloyd in a comedy "Now or Never." Election returns will be reported during the evening. Admission is adults 50c and children 25c. Reston seniors won first money at the Wood-north Sports on the 6th. The day was raw and the crowd attending was not as large as usual.

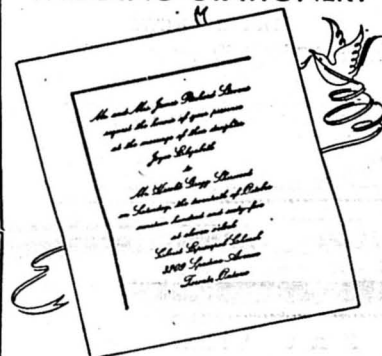
