ONE VOTE

Since the Federal election, when almost every newscast seems to indicate the importance of just a vote or two in determining the success or failure of a candidate at the polls, one becomes aware of the importance of a single vote. Candidates who were an-nounced winners on election night have been declared losens after a re-count. Many scats seem to be still hanging in the balance, and the future of many supposedly successful candof many supposedly successful cand-idates seem to be in jeopardy.

Never in the history of Canada has there been a Federal Election with such uncertain results. One day the two major parties are tied, the next day one is in the lead by a single can-didate, or vote in the House, and by the next deay the given by the next day the picture has been re versed.

It is interesting to look back over history and see some of the major decisions that have been decided by only a vote or two. An interesting paragraph to this effect appeared in the October 28 edition of the War

the October 28 edition of the War Cry. "In 1649 Charles I of England was ordered executed by a nation-wide high tribunal of judges. The vote was 68 to 67. Subsequently Oliver Cromwell was given supreme power over England. The vote was 91 to 90. Two American presidents, Jefferson in 1800 and Hayes in 1876, were elect-ed by the majority of one in the votes cast by the Electoral College." One sometimes wonders how differently the history books would read today if a recount had changed those decisions, if King Charles had lived to reign and Oliver Cromwell had not risen to power. If those who are responsible for tabulating votes on election night would realize the importance of one

vote, and the need of being thorough and correct in their work, the upsett-ing experience of a recount would be-

vote, and the need of being throug, and correct in their work, the upsett-ing experience of a recount would be-come unnecessary and rare, and the people of Canada would not have to wait for days or even weeks to dis-cover who will form the government, and the election of candidates from all parts of the Dominion, represent-ing different parties and different points of view, major decisions that effect the nation are seldom decided by such a narrow majority, but lobby-ing and conniving can swing the vote. History reports that when Martin was condemned as a heretic by the Holy Roman Emperor, the Em-peror didn't have the backing of his six electors. So, under the pretence of waiting to submit the decision to the Diet, he waited until Luther's suppor-ters had gone, and then took a vote from those who were ready to give a verdici-in the Emperor's favor. He did not want to appear to be acting on his own. The American declaration of war against Canada in 1812 was a con-troversial decision influenced by a group of hot heads who lobbyed until they influenced a small majority vote in their favor.

group of not needs into inclusion they influenced a small imajority vote in their favor. These things have happened and no doubt will happen again. The only time the people get the opport-unity of having their say in govern-ment affairs is in the election of cand-idates. It is here especially that one vote counts. That vote should be ac-counted for and credited to the candi-date for whom it is cast. The necessity of recounts makes one wonder if the individual votes are really that impor-tant with the people who take charge of them after they have been cast. L.W. in the Neepawa Press

This summer live liger noses were counted and only 1927 were accounted for (the twenty-eighth liger got the counter!). As tiger skins are worth \$1400 to \$2400 each on the open hide market, poison-ing, trapping and 'shooting are reducing the numbers of tigers at such an alarming rate that extinction of this species may be only ten years away. Just as in our environment, foxes, wol-ves, hawks and owls exert nec-csaary controls on other species of animals, so the tiger in his environment is a necessary fac-tor of control. For this and other reasons, the World Wild-life Fund is attempting to raise \$1,000.000 to save the tiger from, extinction in Bangladesh. This could be done through the establishment of refuges (like game management areas) where ligers would have absolute progame management areas) where tigers would have absolute pro-tection. This would mean a great amount of planning, or-ganization, governmental act-

lon and hard work. If this could not be achieved and the tiger were to become extinct, millions of dollars probably would have to be apent on con-ducting game management pro-grams in order to maintain the natural controls normally pro-vided by tigers. Soon you may be able to purchase tiger-head coins at banks and other special outlets as part of the project to pro-serve the Bangladash tiger from man's destruction and extinc-tion.
