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Three resolutions sponsored by Fort La Bosse approved at convention

VIRIDEN — Three resolutions sponsored by the Fort La Bosse School Division No. 41 at the 1972 fall convention of the Manitoba Association of School Trustees (MAST) received approval from the 400 delegates attending the two day session held in Winnipeg last week.

Doug Rookes and Mrs. Mildred Whiteford, newcomers to the Board this fall, were delegates to the Convention and reported to the Board at its first regular meeting on November 16, 1972. The resolutions dealt with highway safety as it relates to school buses, tuition fees of students attending school in neighboring provinces and an

increase in travel allowance while on division business.

The five standing committees recommended by an ad hoc committee were approved by the Board. The committees include staff, curriculum and future planning, transportation, finance, property and maintenance and salaries and negotiations.

The Fort La Bosse Division Association (Teachers) were represented at the Board meeting by a committee of teachers who presented salary agreement proposals for the 1973 calendar year. The next meeting will be called after the Board has had time to study the teachers' proposals.

Driver education for high school students is well underway in the division. One class at the Viriden Collegiate is about to graduate & the second to commence shortly. The first class at Reston commenced this week. Instructors at the two schools are Don Whiteford and Fred Nixon, respectively.

Mr. and Mrs. Don Bewell, reading consultants with the Department of Education have been visiting elementary schools in the division during the past three weeks. The purpose of their visits is to test students who are experiencing reading difficulties and to assist teachers in dealing with these problems. During the spring term, a mobile reading centre will be made available to the consultants and the division for a 3-week period.

The Board of Trustees decided to advertise the position of secretary-treasurer after the Board and the present secretary-treasurer, K. G. Runions, were unable to come to an agreement over salary for the 1973 calendar year.

In other business, the Board received a letter of resignation from Ralph Durand, custodian at the Assiniboine School in Oak Lake.

Turned down a request from the Sandhurst Memorial Committee for a donation towards the construction of a cairn.

Received correspondence from the Manitoba Teachers' Society re teacher sick leave.

Agreed to rent school facilities to Pool Elevator and K-Vet at the Cromer and Ebor schools, respectively.

Decided to send representatives to the MASBO-sponsored seminar on budgeting to Brandon next week.

Approved the transfer of a Grade IX student within the division.

Amended the cost-per-mile in a contract on Route No. 35.

Amended previous motion re the servicing of buses coming into Viriden.

Received the Attendance Officer's report for October.

Learned that the total cost of transportation during the month of October was \$33,727.00.

Reached agreement with F. C. Cole, assistant superintendent and co-ordinator of special services on a salary figure for 1973.

Approved a principal-trustee meeting on Dec. 4, 1972.

Land use maps are available

WINNIPEG — A joint federal-provincial program to classify and map land use in Manitoba in the area south from Flin Flon and west of Lake Winnipeg has been completed, Mines, Resources and Environmental Management Minister Sidney Green has announced.

The "Canada Land Inventory" program is designed to provide basic data on land use for resource development planning by classifying lands for agricultural, forestry, wildlife, sport fishing and recreation use. The program includes mapping present land use.

The information provided by the study will be used to encourage resource use planning at the regional, provincial and national levels.

Maps have been prepared covering the following areas:

● Soil capability for agricultural use in the Winnipeg, Brandon, Viriden, Riding Mountain, Neepawa, Selkirk and Duck Mountain areas.

● Land capability for recreation in the Neepawa and Viriden areas.

● Land capability for waterfowl in the Brandon, Viriden, Selkirk and Grand Rapids areas.

Copies of these maps can be obtained from Information Canada booklet, 393 Portage Avenue, in Winnipeg, or from Information Canada, in Ottawa.

Further information on the entire program and copies of larger scale capability and land use maps can be obtained in Room 800, Norquay Building, Winnipeg.

R. M. of Albert favors radio station in S. W.

TILSTON — At the inaugural meeting of the R. M. of Albert Council held on Nov. 8th in the council chamber a resolution supporting the application of a re-broadcasting station in the Boissevain area was approved.

The resolution which received unanimous support reads as follows: "Resolved that where as application for a re-broad-

casting radio station to be located in the Boissevain area has been presented to the Board of Radio and Television Commission by CFAM and CHSM of Radio Southern Manitoba.

"And whereas it is the opinion of this council that South-Western Manitoba is in dire need of a signal strong enough to provide consistent day and

night night service.

"Therefore be it resolved that this council go on record approving the location of the re-broadcasting station and pledge our full support to Radio Southern Manitoba in its attempt to locate a station in the Boissevain area."

Another resolution approved at the meeting favoured supporting the Reston Community Skating Rink for operation and maintenance by way of levying not more than one mill on a proposed area. The area being: Sections 19 to 22, NW 1/4 28, sections 27 to 34, and SW 1/4 35 all in 5-27 WPM, sections 2 to 11, 15 to 24, and 27 to 34 all in 6-27 WPM, sections 1 to 5, 8 to 36 all in 6-28 WPM, and sections 15 to 36 in 6-29 WPM.

Another resolution of the council was not to issue any permits to hunt predators for the year 1973 in the municipality.

It was decided to charge all custom work accounts outstanding for more than one year to the parcel of land that it affects on the tax roll.

All council members and the secretary-treasurer were authorized to attend the Municipal Convention in Winnipeg on November 21, 22 and 23.

Accounts of \$7863.90 were approved for payment.

A grant of \$75.00 was authorized for the Children's Aid Society.

Reeve John Williamson was in the chair, and he and councillors Allan Gould, Ward 1, E. H. Patmore, ward 2, Frank Curtis, ward 3 and Marion Molt, ward 4 were declared in office in accordance with section 115 (1) of the Municipal Act.

ONE VOTE

Since the Federal election, when almost every newscast seems to indicate the importance of just a vote or two in determining the success or failure of a candidate at the polls, one becomes aware of the importance of a single vote. Candidates who were announced winners on election night have been declared losers after a recount. Many seats seem to be still hanging in the balance, and the future of many supposedly successful candidates seem to be in jeopardy.

Never in the history of Canada has there been a Federal Election with such uncertain results. One day the two major parties are tied, the next day one is in the lead by a single candidate, or vote in the House, and by the next day the picture has been reversed.

It is interesting to look back over history and see some of the major decisions that have been decided by only a vote or two. An interesting paragraph to this effect appeared in the October 28 edition of the War Cry.

"In 1649 Charles I of England was ordered executed by a nationwide high tribunal of judges. The vote was 68 to 67. Subsequently Oliver Cromwell was given supreme power over England. The vote was 91 to 90. Two American presidents, Jefferson in 1800 and Hayes in 1876, were elected by the majority of one in the votes cast by the Electoral College."

One sometimes wonders how differently the history books would read today if a recount had changed those decisions. If King Charles had lived to reign and Oliver Cromwell had not risen to power.

If those who are responsible for tabulating votes on election night would realize the importance of one

vote, and the need of being thorough and correct in their work, the upsetting experience of a recount would become unnecessary and rare, and the people of Canada would not have to wait for days or even weeks to discover who will form the government.

It is fortunate that, under our democratic system of government, and the election of candidates from all parts of the Dominion, representing different parties and different points of view, major decisions that effect the nation are seldom decided by such a narrow majority, but lobbying and conniving can swing the vote.

History reports that when Martin was condemned as a heretic by the Holy Roman Emperor, the Emperor didn't have the backing of his six electors. So, under the pretence of waiting to submit the decision to the Diet, he waited until Luther's supporters had gone, and then took a vote from those who were ready to give a verdict in the Emperor's favor. He did not want to appear to be acting on his own.

The American declaration of war against Canada in 1812 was a controversial decision influenced by a group of hot heads who lobbied until they influenced a small majority vote in their favor.

These things have happened and no doubt will happen again. The only time the people get the opportunity of having their say in government affairs is in the election of candidates. It is here especially that one vote counts. That vote should be accounted for and credited to the candidate for whom it is cast. The necessity of recounts makes one wonder if the individual votes are really that important with the people who take charge of them after they have been cast.

If this had not been mentioned last week, such a state might actually be news.

While news isn't, the dullness of the weather is rather a justified criticism in this instance. No ups and downs of temperature, humidity, rainfall or snowfall to break the dullness. Nothing but dull sky and dull earth to dull the mind. Won't it be a shock to wake up to stinging snow, blinding sun, or skin-snapping cold? Perhaps, after all, we should appreciate our neutral November weather, and realize how well-off we really are.

If something doesn't start snapping right here, this column is going to be dull, and I may start making some money!

Snapping wings will do nicely for start. They belonged to a huge, gray-speckled Snowy Owl perched almost above our heads when we surprised it last week east of Bellevue. At least, with pumping muscles, this beautiful female moved off to a telephone pole not far off, its flight a perfect example of soundless movement. In this species, the males are just as silent; women's lib, is for the humans!

Last Sunday afternoon, six miles north of Reston, two dark spots floating above a telephone pole identified, on closer approach, an otherwise spotted Mr. Snowy Owl. This gentleman snored prettily for a telephone shot, but modestly drifted away when everything was set for the best shot. Naturally one should always do one's best, if not the birds.

Let alone the owls, there are goings-on amongst the geese yet, too. November 15, Mr. Ernest-Campion scanned a skein of forty-eight Blue Geese skimming towards the northwest and the flesh-pots of Virden. Let's hope they weren't goose-pots, possibly the geese were seeking open waters of the Assiniboine River or, for all we know, con-

templating a sentimental flight to arctic nesting grounds to see if they had forgotten anything. That would prove what silly geese are like, huh? But seriously, there's nothing silly about wild geese not leaving here until late in November. Of course, if they have akates, the geese might like to hang around and put on a number for the ice carnival. Just imagine the public appreciation for such a wintry item titled "Blue is the Foot - loose Goose!" Pass me some Cold Duck, Matilda.

Turning to something hot, tigers are having trouble in Bangladesh. This summer live tiger noses were counted, and only 1927 were accounted for (the twenty-eighth tiger got the counter!). As tiger skins are worth \$1400 to \$2400 each on the open hide market, poisoning, trapping and shooting are reducing the numbers of tigers at such an alarming rate that extinction of this species may be only ten years away. Just as in our environment, foxes, wolves, hawks and owls exert necessary controls on other species of animals, so the tiger in his environment is a necessary factor of control. For this and other reasons, the World Wildlife Fund is attempting to raise \$1,000,000.00 to save the tiger from extinction in Bangladesh. This could be done through the establishment of refuges (like game management areas) where tigers would have absolute protection. This would mean a great amount of planning, organization, governmental act-

ion and hard work. If this could not be achieved and the tiger were to become extinct, millions of dollars probably would have to be spent on conducting game management programs in order to maintain the natural controls normally provided by tigers.

Soon you may be able to purchase tiger-head coins at banks and other special outlets as part of the project to preserve the Bangladesh tiger from man's destruction and extinction. The money from these sales will be turned over to that project. Let's prove that humans do care about their environment and its preservation.

Frank Hay's cattle

exported to Mexico

WINNIPEG—The transport of 25 head of purebred cattle across the Texas - Mexico border in late October, marked the culmination of another step in the development of a market for Manitoba breeding stock in Mexico. This complete shipment had originated on farms and ranches in Manitoba and was transported by truck to Eagle Pass Texas, where the new owner took possession.

This shipment consisted of 19 purebred Hereford bulls one to two years of age, two Brown Swiss bulls, three Brown Swiss females and one Brown Swiss bull. The purchase was made by the CIA Ganaderos De Atotonilco Cattle Co. for their ranch operations near Yerbals, Durango, Mexico.

The 25 purebred animals were selected for purchase in Manitoba by Miguel Gomez, son of the ranch owner, who spent two months in Manitoba this year. The Marketing Branch of the Manitoba Department of Agriculture assisted Mr. Gomez in his study of our whole livestock industry. Much of his time was spent with Hereford breeders throughout Manitoba.

The Hereford stock in the recent shipment was sold by Wm. Cruise & Sons of Chaffield. Frank R. Hay of Findlay, Jack Hanlin of Minola and E. Percut of St. Lazare. The Brown Swiss were purchased from Wilfred Lane of Salsgirth and Sam Chegwinn of Shoal Lake.

Officials of the Manitoba Marketing Branch are hopeful that this sizable shipment will be followed by further Mexican purchases. To help promote Manitoba breeding stock in that country the branch is presently planning an information booth and display at the 1973 Mexican National Livestock Show slated for Mexico City in January. The booth will be a co-operative venture between Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Arrangements are presently underway to have Mr. Gomez display some of his Manitoba purchase at the Mexico City event.

New customs house

OTTAWA—An \$86,000 contract has been awarded to Tyndall Development Corporation, of Winnipeg, for the construction of a new Customs highway office at Lyleton, Man., Public Works Minister J. E. Dube announced recently.

The successful firm submitted the lower of two bids in response to a public tender call. The other bid was in the amount of \$94,000. Lyleton is located on the Canada-United States border, some 75 miles southwest of Brandon.

A one-storey, steel - frame structure, the new Customs port of entry will measure 33 by 21 feet. It will have an exterior finish of pre-colored metal and will be electrically heated. Air conditioning will also be provided.

The contract includes construction of facilities for off-highway inspection. Estimated date of completion is March 1973.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Winnipeg office of the federal Department of Public Works. Supervision will be provided by H. C. Tod, the department's senior representative in Winnipeg.
