Horse racing is new feature of the Oak Lake Snow Festival on March 5

VIRDEN — The horse racing on ice to be held at the Manitoba Snow Festival at Oak Lake Beach on March 5th is drawing a lot of interest from all over Western Manitoba.

Two Brandon men, Fred Baker and J. W. Wells recall that racing took place in the Assiniboine River starting West of the 1st Street Bridge and running East, to the first bend in the River.

The ice was scraped from side to side across the River by using a 12" x 12" timber 14 feet long that had a blade across the bottom edge and was pulled by a horse at each end. Occasionally a horse would break through the ice during the clearing operation and the other was used to pull it out.

The horses were especially shod for the races on the ice with what are called corks. They are made of lead with a sharp steel insert in the centre. The lead wears down faster than the steel, which remains sharp to penetrate the ice and provides traction similar to a tire stud but much larger. The ice surface provides a beautiful track, smooth and hard the track itself is a straight half-mile long. Those in the know assure us that ice racing is perhaps safer than oval track racing.

Horse racing on ice in Brandon took place on Victoria Ave. too. It was flooded from 8th Street East to 1st Street to

provide a half-mile track. The racing which started prior to 1905 continued at least until 1918 and was a popular event held every Christmas and Boxing Day. Some of the people involved were Roy Rice, Bill McGregor, Tanny Strange and a Harrison fellow of the Brandon Hotel.

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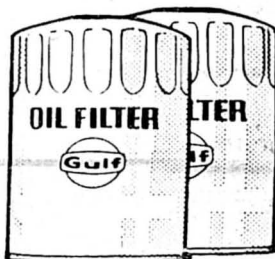
