Two Brandon men, Fred Baker and J. W. Wells recall that racing took place n the Assinibolne River starting West of the lat Street Bridge and running East, to the first bend in the River.

The ice was scraped from side to side across the River by using a 12" x 12" timber 14 feet long that had a blade across the bottom edge and was pulled by a horse at each end. Occassionally a horse would break through the ice during the clearing operation and the other was used to pull it out.

The horses were especially shot for the races on the ice with what are called corks. They are made of lead with a sharp sicel insert in the centre. The lead wears down faster than the steel, which remains sharp to penetrate the lee and provides traction similar to a tire stud but much larger.
