## W. R. Stewart, long time resident of Pipestone is laid to rest

PIPESTONE—Funeral service was held in the United Church on Friday, June 9th for William Robert Stewart, 83, a resident of the district since 1914. Rev. E. Schurman officiated and the choir was in attendance with Mrs. S. Camplin as organist.

Mr. Stewart died in the Assiniboine Hospital, Brandon, on June 6th following a lengthy illness. He was born in Scotland and came to Canada in 1909.

He worked for a time in a bank in Montreal and came west in 1914 and worked for the Ashley Bros., who farmed north-west of Pipestone in the Lambton district. He enlisted in the army in 1915 and following his discharge from the service returned to the Pipestone area and farmed with the Clark Bros., latter taking over the farm.

In 1927 he married Sarah Ashley who survives him. Also left to mourn are two sons Charles on the home farm and Robert in Brandon. There are six grandchildren. A sister lives in England and three sisters and one brother predeceased him.

He was an active member of the Pipestone Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion until 1911 when he was discharged from the service and returned to the Pipestone area and farmed with the Clark Bros., latter taking over the farm.

## UNDERSTANDING NEEDED

The seeming indifference of the veterans and public alike towards the Decoration Day service was evidenced by the small turnout at this event on Sunday, June 4th, makes one wonder whether it is worth the effort that is put into it by the Elizabeth Legion and others.

When one considers that 27 years have passed since the last great conflict, it is understandable that to the younger people, such an event has little significance.

One of the purposes of a Decoration Day and also Remembrance Day is to impress on the younger generation that sacrifices were made to preserve a society which guarantees freedom. And as the years roll by, and those who took part in the conflicts get older, there appears to be a need for such recognition as more and more veterans need financial help.

We see veterans, who have been

unable to make a decent living for themselves or family, subject to scorn, while what they need and deserve is financial assistance despite the fact that they were never wounded or suffered from a war disability which would entitle them to a pension.

There is no doubt that having been a participant in a conflict where death was an ever present threat has had an effect on every person involved. With the passing years, the effects are becoming more apparent, to such an extent that more and more veterans are unable to cope with the realities of making a living.

As the decision making is being taken over, more and more, by people who have never experienced the horrors of war, it would be well to remember that veterans, in increasing number need not only financial assistance, but also sympathetic understanding.

## SWIM SAFELY

If it happened only once a summer, the story would still be an all too familiar one. A family goes to their cottage or favorite beach for a week-end of fun and relaxation. After unpacking and changing into their swim suits, they head down to the water's edge.

The children are all playing together on shore. The parents close their eyes to enjoy the sun, and fall asleep.

Suddenly they're awakened by the shouts of other people. They see lifeguards combing the water for signs of an unattended child who suddenly disappeared.

Sometimes a life is saved. Sometimes a life is tragically lost. But by that time it is far too late to think about water safety measures which could have prevented the child's disappearance in the first place.

Fortunately many Canadians do think about water safety, and the story of their summer is fulfilled and safe as well.

For 26 years the Red Cross Water Safety Service has helped Canadians stay alive with water safety.

The rules are simple. But they can help keep your family safe.

Supervise and educate your children. If they can't swim contact your local Red Cross Water Safety Service and enquire about local swimming programs. (Offered at Virden or Melita).

Even if your children do swim, always keep them in sight. If you know where they are and what they are doing, you can make sure they play safe.

Swim only in supervised areas and at times when the beach is supervised by professional lifeguards. In unfamiliar water, debris or sudden drop-offs which you can't see can hurt you.

Always swim with a buddy. If trouble should occur, someone will be there to help.

Equipped with a respect for the water and a thorough knowledge of water safety, you and your family will enjoy the water more.

So enjoy the water this summer, and stay alive with Red Cross Water Safety.

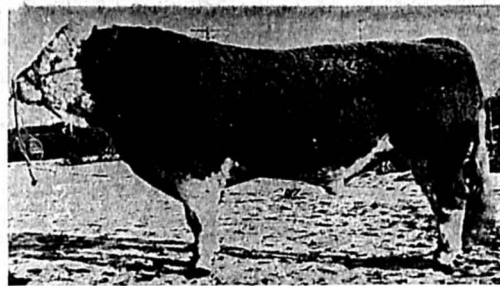

SIEGER

By Dolphe Henuset

PIPESTONE—Sieger 1549, a bull imported in 1970 by Dolphe Henuset for S & L Breeders Ltd. is one of the more popular of the exotics because of the ease of calving of his calves, and is

recognized as one of the most correct individuals imported to date. There will be approximately 4000 calves on the ground by him this spring.

He was chosen from a herd of ten cows in Switzerland and had been reserved to go to an

A.I. stud for use in Switzerland. It is interesting to note that most herds in Switzerland contain from 6-12 cows and that you will find ten to twenty herds or stables in a half mile square. These cows are kept for milking purposes and the calves are never allowed to suck and are pail fed. They are tied in alleys behind the mothers and are given a milk replacer along with very little grain. Those that qualify for registration are fed for 4 to 6 months and then turned to pasture while those that do not qualify are fed out for slaughter, the length of time being guided by the amount of feed the owner can afford to give them, but most calves are sold from 6 to 10 months of age.

Ninety percent of the cattle in Swiss are registered and they must meet a high standard of qualifications to be admitted to the herd book. If the cow has not met a standard of milk and butterfat production and has not met a type and udder score, her calf cannot be registered and the sire must also meet certain qualifications before a committee will allow them to be registered. Some cows are producing 16,000 to 18,000 lbs. of milk a year and the minimum allowed for the first lactation is 8000 lbs. with 37 butterfat.

These cows are confined to the stables in winter and during the day in summer and are 95% hand milked. The barns are immaculate and the living quarters and the cheese house are all on the same establishment. Pasture in the lowlands comes about the middle of April and lasts till the 3rd week in May when they start the herds up the side of the mountain where they climb gradually to mid August to approximately 9000 feet and after pasturing at that level for two to three weeks they again decline till they reach their winter quarters by October 1st.

There is very little grain produced in Switzerland but lots of good grass and the farmers are turning it into milk and beef to make a living. Cheese and butter being the main production. They are making a living on 6 to 12 cows and not more than sixty acres of land. Can you?

It's a beautiful country any time of the year and for any of you who care to stray away from home for three weeks I can highly recommend it as I am sure you'd agree.

Miss Haidish will compete in the provincial finals in Winnipeg in July. Doug Watt purchased the first prize calf at the 4-H Club sale at Melita last week. He paid \$35 a pound for the 900 pound animal.

20 YEARS AGO (June 18, 1952)

Reston "Runs" defeated the Linklater "Links" 8 to 5 in a softball game played at the Reston Fair grounds on Monday night. John Forsyth was on the mound for Reston with John Berry catching. Links used three pitchers, Jim and Wib Morris and Norman Walker. Hank Turner was the catcher. Other players: Reston, Bill Iles, Bill Harper, Ivan Traill, Bev Lockhart, Ben Watkins, Don Benzie, C. S. Campbell, Pat Paterson. Links: F. Jezzard, F. Nash, Connie Karpinski, Allan Johnston, Neil Chester, A. Birnie. Fifty-three members were on hand for the Pipestone Consumers Co-op meeting recently. Jim Forsyth, president reported sales of over \$76,000 during the year. Mr. R. Blanchard, the new hardware manager, was introduced and Mr. L. Grant, store manager also gave a report.

At a meeting of the R.M. of Albert held at Broomhill on June 10th, it was decided to hire G. Klassen road contractor of Winnipeg, to construct two miles of road east of 30 and 31-6-26 and possibly two miles north of 16 and 17-5-26. Almost a half inch of rain fell on Sunday to improve the crop outlook in the district. 40 YEARS AGO (June 16, 1932)

Fewer tourists than usual are noted this year but last week a car from Michigan and one from Ontario were noted in town. The sale of gasoline has dropped off considerably as most car owners are using their cars only when necessary. John Melver, who has been serving with the Bank of Montreal at Brandon has been transferred to the Elmwood branch in Winnipeg. He spent the weekend at his home in Ebor prior to the move. Geo. D. Holmes, of Winnipeg, former Manitoba tennis champion and J. F. Devlin, professional for the Winnipeg Tennis Club will play an exhibition series at Reston on Saturday under the auspices of the Reston Tennis Club.

50 YEARS AGO (June 15, 1922)

Reston and Ewart girls baseball teams battled for supremacy on the Reston diamond on Saturday night and judging by the noise of the fans and fanettes, the game must have been full of ginger. Ewart won 11 to 7 and Charlie Caldwell, who handed out the decisions escaped unscathed. Reston Blues and Antler played the first league game at Reston on Monday night and the Blues were the winners via a home run by Buster McDougall. Gordon Hill was the Reston pitcher and Art Merrill was on the mound for the visitors. Art Morris acted as umpire. Mr. George Bromley, the Pipestone drayman met with an almost fatal accident on Saturday last but is making good progress towards recovery.
