Councillors will allow their names to stand

RESTON—Information reaching the Recorder is that the sitting councillors, whose term of office expires, in both the R.M. of Albert and the R.M. of Pipestone will allow their names to stand for re-election.

In Albert, the councillors are Harry Patmore of Pipestone in Ward 2 and Manson Moir of Tilston in Ward 4. In Pipestone, the councillors are Wilson Skelton, Sinclair, Ward 2, Jim Milliken, Reston, Ward 3 and Elmer Shoemaker of Woodnorth, in Ward 5.

The date for the receiving of nominations is next Wednesday, Oct. 4th and each nomination paper must be signed by 25 ratepayers, or 1% of the electors, whichever is the lesser.

Municipal secretary-treasurer C. E. Hicks of the R.M. of Albert at Tilston and Wm. V. Busby of the R.M. of Pipestone at Reston, are the returning officers. Should an election be necessary, it will be held on Wednesday, Oct. 25th. The successful candidates will take office on November 8th.

Court administrator is appointed

WINNIPEG—Attorney General Al Mackling has announced the appointment of Winnipeg Lawyer P. Thor Guttormsson, 44, to the position of administrator of court services in Manitoba effective December 1.

The court services administrator is responsible for maintaining liaison with court officials throughout Manitoba's courts and for ensuring uniformity and efficiency of practices and procedures in court offices.

The administrator maintains financial records and supervises receipts and disposition of public from court services; reviews from court services; reviews administrative staff requirements for the various courts as well as physical accommodations and is responsible for the administration of the Fatal Inquiries Act. He also communicates magisterial recommendations to the responsible authorities.

Mr. Guttormsson was born in Balour, Manitoba, receiving his bachelor of arts degree from the University of Saskatchewan in 1950 and his bachelor of laws degree from the University of Manitoba in 1956. He was called to the bar on December 5, 1956. Since that time he has served as a legal partner with P. R. Stapley in Winnipeg.

Mr. Guttormsson is a past president of the Manitoba division of the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society and executive member of the River Heights Community Club. He is married with three children.

All nine seats on the Fort La Bosse board to be filled at October election

Little progress made with the harvest

RESTON—A mixed bag of weather prevailed during the week, heavy winds, rain and snow, and temperatures on Monday morning as low as 24 degrees.

Following the gale force winds on Wednesday, a rainy sunny weather prevailed on Thursday and combining got underway again in full force, the weekend however, with rain, snow and sleet halted operations which are presently at a standstill.

Elevator agents at Reston, John Williamson at the Pool and Bob Turnbull at the U. G. G. estimate that 40% of the crop remains to be harvested.

To the north of town, where there was less rainfall a larger percentage of the grain is in the bin, but south of town there is a much larger acreage to be harvested, with some fields still standing.

It will require two or three days of drying weather before the grain will be fit to harvest. Some observers are predicting an excellent October, basing the forecast on the fact that it is coming to us!

Nominations for trustees require only a mover and seconder and the consent of the nominee. The successful candidates will take office on November 8th.

The date for the election is Wednesday, October 25th.

Trustees C. O. Mothral, of Oak Lake, Howard Hayhurst, of Cromer and Adam Turbuck, of Elkhorn were undecided. Dunc Elliott, of Viriden, was away and was not contacted.

Trustee F. R. Manning, of Reston, will let his name stand for one more term if it meets with the approval of the electors.

To qualify for office, a candidate must be an elector and have resided in the Division for six months.

RESTON—The "Big Buck Days" promotion was discussed at the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce held last Thursday evening of last week with Jim Walker, president, in the chair. The matter was referred to the committee to set the dates.

A committee of Art Smith, Gordon Belber and Stan Sutton met with other business men on Friday morning to set the dates and make other arrangements. October 5th, 6th and 7th were dates decided on. Among the attractions will be

a casino and a Fish Derby and there will also be specials offered in all the participating businesses places.

The Casino will be the responsibility of Elwin Smeltz and Gordon Forsyth, while the fish derby, the lake "Reston", alleged to be swarming with Rainbow Trout, will be looked after by Dave Braddell and Henry Clausen. There will be prizes offered and the cost of entering was set at 25c for under 16 and 50c for 16 and over.

This is the first time in this part of the province that a fish derby has been scheduled for a pond that had been planted with Rainbow trout. The pond "Lake Reston" is situated just west of the Reston Motor Hotel. Some five hundred fingerlings were placed there last spring.

Semester system at Reston Collegiate

As some parents know, we have now started on the semester system in the Collegiate. This is not a new system, as Alberta, B. C., Sask., and other provinces have been using it for some time. The students are taking 3 or 4 subjects in a grade up to the end of January and will then write an exam which will be the finish of those subjects. They will then take the remainder of the subjects in the grade until the end of June and this will complete the grade and possibly have a subject of the following grade. If he is ambitious, a student can complete High School in 3 1/2 years rather than 4.

We got off to rather a shaky start on the timetabling but are 'ironing out' as many of the problems as possible. I don't think it is solving all the problems of all students but it is better than before. One very important thing is that students attend school regularly as every day missed means at least two days on the old system and more if Grade XII subject. I have to enforce that a student missing 11 periods (single periods) unless sick will have to repeat the subject.

If a student fails a course in the first semester and they have really tried, we will give them the right to study on their own for a time (during study days today) in the second semester they could take it then.

We would welcome any parent, that would like to know more about the system to drop in any afternoon. I only hope we get the full co-operation of the parents and students and I think it will be a success.

LET'S VOICE OUR DISAPPROVAL

Residents of the Virden Hospital District should take a hard look at the proposal that one central committee would look after all health services within the region. The proposal, if adopted, would mean the elimination of the local hospital boards, which in the past have operated all the hospitals, Virden, Reston and Elkhorn.

In practice, these Local Administrative Committees to give them their proper name, have assumed, responsibilities which in reality, are the responsibility of the Central Board, and we believe in the case of Reston, at least, have done an excellent job.

The council of the R.M. of Albert has gone on record as opposing such a move and we believe that the same sentiments prevailed when the matter was discussed at a recent meet-

ing of the R.M. of Pipestone council. The Reston Chamber of Commerce have also come out as opposed to such a move.

We were in favor of the Unitary School Board, it was strictly because of the fact that there were greatly increased grants available under such system. Such is not the case in the proposals for one board to operate the health services.

In fact, it would appear the opposite is the case, for presently the members of the boards (committees) are not paid and under the proposal they would be.

There may be some need for restructuring the present system, but a central board is not the answer and this should be opposed with all possible vigor.

IT'S A LONG SEASON!

As a non-expert, but interested sportsman, we wonder how the Provincial Games Branch arrived at the decision that there are enough Sharp-Tailed Grouse and Hungarian Partridges in the south-western part of the province to support a season which opened on Sept. 22nd and continues until Nov. 25th. And in other parts of the province the season is even longer, from Sept. 15th until December 16th.

Reports would indicate that there are a few more birds in this area than last year, although on Friday, the opening, it was reported that the game management area in the Broomhill district was nearly barren of birds, an area which is usually quite productive.

The only consolation for the

sportsmen who would like to see our upland game population maintained or increased, is the fact that the limit in the south-west area is three a day for Sharp-Tail with a possession limit of nine. Hungarians are two a day with a possession of six.

One knowledgeable person in the Game Department, once told the writer that the length of season made little difference to the bird population. If the hunting was poor, then the hunters just didn't take to the field and if the hunting was good then there was enough birds to support the season.

Let's hope that he knows what he was talking about!

Our comments: We miss the friendly greeting that always awaited us when we stepped into the house, for Tinker-Bell let you know you were welcome—he didn't wag his tail, he wagged his whole hind-end, and once we got out our golfing equipment Tinker was right there all set for a round. He delighted in running the rough and scaring up birds and what have you. We recall a rabbit he was in hot pursuit of, when he stepped in a hole, did a complete somersault and kept right on going without missing a stride. Outdoors Only...

Another valuable dose of moisture, untimely as it may have been for some farmers, came with last weekend in the form of rain, frozen rain and a leaven of snow Saturday night and Sunday. This added up to almost three-quarters of an inch of good, soft water. Doubtless ducks and geese were very content with what this added to sloughs, ponds and dug-outs.

Larger birds than ducks and geese, however, have made local use of freshened pools. Two slim, long - and - black - legged, slender-necked birds with a wing-span of about four and a half feet were seen September 23 at a dug-out south-east of Reston. As the pair took off in a hurry, being surprised by an equally surprised observer, head markings and a few details were missed. This combined with the limited wing-span creates doubt about the possible species that was seen. If the head had shown a yellow, dagger-like bill and a bare red face, and if the wing in flight had shown a roughly triangular, black patch on the outer part, there would be little doubt that the surprised visitors were Whooping Cranes on their return flight to Texas. The lesser size could be accounted for by age, as this species would not yet have attained its full size. Observers, please report any similar sightings.

Other migrants are thinning out local species, leaving the odd Robin, few Mourning Doves, some Meadowlarks Cedar Waxwings and Crows to hold the feathered fort. Last Friday we observed about eighteen Mountain Bluebirds moving south seven miles south-west of Reston. Is anyone else seeing these gentle, heavenly thrushes?

An American swan - banding program needs the assistance of us Canadians. The swans wear black collars with numbers on them. Please watch for and report any sightings as quickly as possible to Rambler (3320). If you are sharp-eyed and have good binoculars, the number in the collar would be a great help for this program.

Did you know that one pound of burning leaves produces six hundred times as much air pollution, in the form of hydrocarbons, aldehydes and organic acids, as does one pound of coal

burned in a furnace? This fact, based on studies of air quality experts employed by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment, shows further why fall leaf-burning is wasteful and pollutes. If possible, use the leaves to develop a valuable compost pile. Otherwise the sensible action is: not burning but trucking and burying. Of course, a good wind may do the job of removal for you.

It wasn't just a wind that was doing a tremendous job, September 20, of removing the top layer of Manitoba —; that was a gale, gusting up to 48 miles per hour and performing a low-level job of polluting the air. That's what many cities experience because of factories, chemical plants, airplanes, trucks, cars and homes (remember the leaves), but often without the

wind to thin or blow the pollution away. Relatively speaking, we are fortunate. Or are we? The winds bring it to us, too, and we still add to it, don't we? And on the land, stubble, hay or other crops and windbreaks would further keep the soil down and control the pollution.
