RESTON — A Reston and District Community Development Corporation will be formed, it was decided at a well attended meeting in the Memorial Hall on Friday night. Provisional directors elected were: Fred Stonehouse, Rev. E. Schurman, Jim Walker, Jack Guthrie, Wayne Morrow and Manson Moir.

The provisional directors will apply to the provincial government for a charter and if granted, shares will be sold in the organization, and a permanent board of directors will be elected at the first meeting of the shareholders.

The functions of the corporation will be to encourage, lend financial aid, if needed to a community business or manufacturing plant which may be established or presently operating. The powers and scope of the corporation will be limited to the by-laws which also must be passed by the shareholders. No figure was placed on the amount of capital to be raised by the corporation, but the figure of \$10.00 per share was mentioned at the meeting.

The meeting was called by the Reston and District Community Development Corporation to deal with the Re-Act program and the Caravan in this connection which will be in Reston on Feb. 18th with displays in the gymnasium of the Reston Collegiate.

Stanley Patmore, who represented the R.M.'s of Albert, Pipestone and Sifton at a conference in Brandon in connection with the Re-Act program, gave a report at the meeting.

The same committee, which had acted as a provisional committee in connection with the Re-Act Program was appointed to look after the details of the Caravan visit and further developments which might arise from the visit. They are: Stanley Patmore, Gordon Howat, Wayne Morrow, Manson Moir, Jim Walker, Rev. E. Schurman, Jack Guthrie and Fred Stonehouse.

Fred Stonehouse gave a report on the activities of the Reston and District Community Development Committee. He said that a man power survey had

been made, a feasibility study done on a number of businesses and that a good foundation had been made for the future.

Ed Milligan of Pipestone, spoke briefly on Milligan Industries of Pipestone, which is producing scales and was achieving success in marketing them. Mr. Milligan said that some additional capital was required and shares would be offered soon. He said that the books of the company would be available for those interested.

A. T. Chapman, chairman of West-Man, outlined the activities of that organization and stated that West-Man had not received credit in some cases where it was due. He mentioned a number of manufacturing plants that had located in the West-Man region through the activities of the Corporation.

Mr. Rod Bailey, General Manager of West-Man, also spoke briefly and outlined the steps necessary for the formation of a Development Corporation. Fred Stonehouse chaired the meeting and Rev. E. Schurman was the secretary.

'Flu-bug' diminishing

WINNIPEG — At least six kinds of infections were going the rounds of Manitoba during the widespread outbreaks of "flu-like" illness, Health and Social Development Minister Rene E. Toupin has reported.

Mr. Toupin said the incidents of the diseases, most prevalent the last week in December and the first half of January, appear to have diminished considerably over the last two weeks.

The virus laboratory has confirmed 56 cases of influenza A; three of para-influenza II; one of para-influenza III; three of influenza type B; three adenovirus; five coxsackie virus; five respiratory syncytial virus; three mycoplasma pneumoniae and one echo virus type 8.

Towards the end of January there were three deaths registered due to influenza, Mr. Toupin said this is slightly above the usual figure for deaths due to that illness.

Commenting on the monthly report from the preventive medical service section of his de-

partment, the minister said meningococcal infections were up compared with Jan. 1971. There were six cases, three in Winnipeg and the balance in Portage la Prairie and Niverville. Five of those affected with this illness were young children.

Household contacts of the six cases were examined and treated and in one case children in a school classroom had their throats swabbed to determine the possibility of their having developed the disease.

Dr. Emanuel Snell, the director of preventive medical services, said meningococcal infections were more prevalent than usual during the latter part of 1971 and the increased incidence seemed to be carried over into the new year.

Infectious hepatitis cases in January were well down from the same period last year, with 74 cases reported as against 136 in January 1971. Most of the cases were scattered throughout the province except for a moderate outbreak of 19 cases at Cross Lake.

Investigation into five cases of serum hepatitis reported in January have not yielded any definite information on how the disease was spread, Dr. Snell said. Serum hepatitis, clinically indistinguishable from infectious hepatitis, is spread by means of improperly sterilized syringes, and may be the result of illicit use of drugs.

One case of brucellosis, a rare disease since virtually eradication by the programs carried out in the Health of Animals Branch, was reported. The infected man, a cattle rancher, had probably contracted it a disease several years ago in Saskatchewan, Dr. Snell said.

A case of malignant tertian malaria, acquired in Greece, was reported in a 26-year-old female resident of Winnipeg, and one case of leptospirosis was discovered in the south central part of Manitoba.

The infected person had been employed in an abattoir. Leptospirosis is a rare illness spread by contact with urine from infected animals.

Safe driving record will benefit driver

WINNIPEG--A recent amendment to regulations under the Automobile Insurance Act provides for re-assessment of demerit point records of Manitoba drivers and for refund of a portion of additional premiums for drivers who have achieved a reduction in their demerit points.

Municipal Affairs Minister Howard Pawley, the minister responsible for Autopac, said the amendment is aimed at helping drivers with high demerit totals who have demonstrated an improvement in driving habits by achieving a conviction-free 12 months of driving and thereby meriting a reduction in demerit points recorded against them.

The re-assessment period covered is from October 31, 1971, to April 30, 1972.

It is for a driver with six or more demerits who, when making application for renewal of his driver's certificate, pays the additional premium on the basis of the assessment of his demerit total at the time of application and, during the period to the end of April achieve a conviction-free 12 months of driving and a reduction in demerits.

When 12 months of conviction-free driving is reached and a re-assessment of demerits is made, the driver will be entitled to a refund of the portion of the additional premium which is the difference between the two assessments, to the nearest rounded dollar.

"This change in the Automobile Insurance Act will be of particular benefit only to drivers who reduce their demerit point totals through safe driving. It will be of no benefit at all to drivers who, because of bad driving have further convictions recorded, do not reduce their demerit point totals," the minister said.

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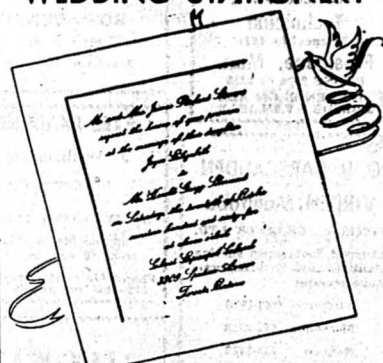

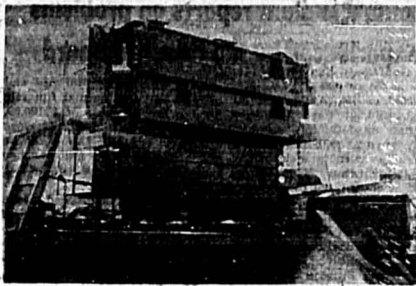

Leonard Ludlam reports on problems experienced by the Hospital Board

RESTON—Leonard Ludlam,
chairman of the Reston Hospital
Board, told of the difficulties
experienced at the beginning of
1971 when the board found
themselves without a doctor or
an administrator. Thirty-three
attended the annual public meet-
ing held in the Legion Hall on
Monday, Jan. 31st.

The arrival of Dr. Furston and
the hiring of Kelly Exner, as ad-
ministrator, solved the diffi-
culties. Dr. Furston found the
practice increasing and secured
the service of Dr. Dizon.

The hospital was looking for-
ward to receiving accreditation
and to this end a pre-accredi-
tation survey had been carried out
word was awaited, Mr. Ludlam
said.

Purchases during the year in-
cluded four hi-low beds and a
crash cart. The latter was pur-
chased by monies from the
Church of God in Christ and
funds from the Ladies Auxiliary
and donations were used for the
beds.

Kelly Exner in his report,
spoke of the accreditation pro-
ject and also on the hospital
rules on patient visiting, which
he stated were ignored by many
people. He also mentioned the
rapidly rising cost of health
care, which, if continued at the
present rate will require 100%
of the Gross National Product
in ten years' time.

The financial report, present-
ed by Mr. Exner, showed income
of \$172,916.00 for 1971 and ex-
penditures of \$168,437.00 leav-
ing a surplus of \$4,479.00. Con-
cern was expressed that because
of the surplus it might be dif-
ficult to get adequate financing
in 1972, but Mr. Exner and Mr.
Ludlam did not think this would
be the case.

John Williamson gave the re-
port of the ambulance fund,
which showed a deficit after
\$500.00 in depreciation has been
allowed. Income for the year
was \$975.00 and expenses \$701.00
and had debts \$100.00. The rate
charged was probably the low-
est in Manitoba, Mr. Williamson
said.

Mrs. G. J. Sutcliffe, director
of nursing, in her report stated
that a vacancy had occurred
through retirement and another
\$500.00 in depreciation work load.
Mrs. Brenda Campbell had filled
the former position and Mrs.
Turnbull the latter. An in-ser-
vice training program will soon
begin and a candy striper pro-
gram is also scheduled.

Dr. Dizon of the medical staff
thanked the nursing personnel
for their assistance during the
year and offered his assistance
in the in-service program. This
program would probably elimi-
nate problems which had arisen
in the nursing department.
