### New provisions for tax forms

OTTAWA — Man farmers should keep in mind several new provisions to the income tax regulations when filling out their 1978 tax returns.

The most important of these is the "roll-over" provision for incorporated farms and partnerships. As of April 10, 1978, a farmer can transfer shares in a qualifying incorporated farm or farm partnership to his children, grandchildren or great grandchildren free of capital gains tax.

The capital gains tax is payable only when the farm is sold to a person who is not an heir.

In the same way, a farmer now can transfer agricultural quotas to his children during his lifetime and defer paying income tax on an eligible capital gain until the quota is sold outside the family.

Manitoba farmers who have invested in new buildings, machinery or equipment in 1978 may be eligible for a tax credit. The rate of the investment tax credit varies with locality. In Manitoba, the tax credit is equal to 7 1/2 per cent of the amount invested.

Legislation now before Parliament could increase the investment tax credit on eligible assets bought after November 16, 1978.

The investment tax credit applies to most farm assets bought after June 24, 1975. The program was set to expire on July 1, 1980, but this deadline now has been removed.

Another new tax credit is

available for some farmers who hired labor in 1978 additional to their normal work force. The employment tax credit allows for a tax concession of \$1.75 per hour in Manitoba for qualifying hired labor. Details of this program are available from

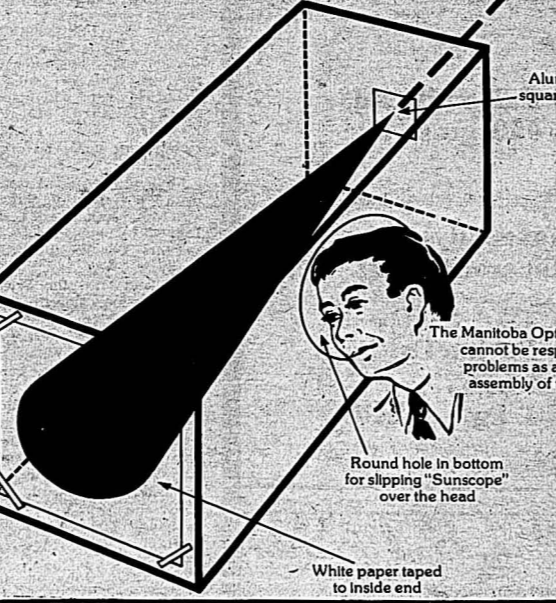
## Solar Eclipse

### SOLAR ECLIPSE A public Safety Message Brought to You by The Optometrists of Manitoba.

Between 10 and 11 o'clock on the morning of Monday, February 26, 1979, the sky over southern Manitoba will blacken as we experience the last total eclipse of the 20th Century. It's a sight you'll never see again. But if you look at it without proper protection for your eyes, the memory of this rare event may become burned into your vision forever.

Even during an eclipse, the sun's rays are so powerful they can severely damage your eyes. Focusing your eyes on the sun can actually make a hole through eye tissue in a way similar to burning a hole in paper by focusing the sun's rays through a magnifying glass. While mild cases of eye injury caused by looking at the sun may heal in time, the condition is usually permanent. No medical treatment can repair the damage.

Part of your central vision is badly blurred while the surrounding area remains in somewhat better focus. Such everyday activities as reading, watching TV and driving become virtually impossible for a person with such a condition. There is no safe proven way to view the sun directly with any device used directly over the eyes. You SHOULD NOT under any conditions LOOK DIRECTLY AT THE SUN with binoculars, telescopes, opera

### BUILDING AND USING A SUNSCOPE

1. Fasten a piece of white paper over the inside of one of the small ends of an oblong cardboard box about 1' x 2' x 3'.  
2. Cut a 1" square hole in the opposite small end. Cover the hole with aluminum foil.  
3. Make a pinhole in the foil.  
4. Cut a hole slightly larger than your head in the bottom of the box.  
5. Seal all light leaks with black tape or paper.

To use the sunscope, STAND WITH YOUR BACK TO THE SUN, the box over your head, and look at the image projected through the pinhole onto the white paper. You can have a trial run before the eclipse by using the sunscope to watch clouds passing by in front of the sun.

**NOTE: DO NOT LOOK AT THE SUN DIRECTLY OR THROUGH THE PINHOLE — LOOK AT THE IMAGE PROJECTED ON THE WHITE PAPER.**

This device is only safe if constructed and used as outlined for INDIRECT VIEWING — should you have any questions or require further guidance, do not hesitate to contact the Manitoba Optometric Society or your Optometrist.

RESTON — It was an eerie feeling when darkness fell and the street lights came on Monday morning. This happened during the total eclipse phase when the moon blocked out the sun and left only a ring of light.

The eclipse seemed to start slowly as the moon moved across the sun from the south and it became progressively darker, although even when total it was more of a twilight than a complete darkness.

Once the total period was over it seemed to become lighter quite quickly.

During the over two minutes of the total eclipse one star to the right of the sun was visible. During the period of totality the temperature dropped noticeably, by ten degrees according to one observer.

For many the eclipse was a "once-in-a-lifetime" experience and will long be remembered.

The event attracted many people to the district. At Pipestone there were two telescopes set up for viewing and all along No. 2 highway many people parked to watch the sight. A number from the United States chose Broomhill, which was right in the centre of the eclipse path, for viewing.

Birds chirped merrily before the eclipse but were noticeably silent during the darkness only to resume their activity when the sun came out again.

Clear skies prevailed during the eclipse despite gloomy forecasts for cloudy skies.

**Disappointing**

Residents of Manitoba will be pleased that the provincial government have decided to lift the freeze on construction of health facilities. The \$15 million program announced by the Health Minister Bud Sherman includes a number of personal care homes. Residents of this district regret however that a personal care home for Reston is not among those to be constructed this year, despite the evidence of the desperate need and overwhelming support for such a project. Hopefully this badly needed facility will be included in the 1980 budget. In the meanwhile the Lions Club and other organizations will be working, raising money for the project.

**You'd Better Believe It!**

A few years ago a company wanted to increase its share of the market for its product. But when they assessed the situation they found they had a real problem on their hands. The product was ugly, relatively expensive, people bought it only when they had to, and then they had no pride of possession and didn't show it to anyone. Therefore the company reasoned, "We have to set ourselves apart by demonstrating that there is an extra benefit to be gained by doing business with us. Something people really care about." So they zeroed in on a concern which a large part of the population could relate to and came up with the slogan, "AT SPEEDY YOU'RE A SOMEBODY". No mention of price, no dwelling on quality or the product, just ... at Speedy you're a somebody. Every day, especially if we live in a big city, we are constantly bombarded by experiences and messages which tend to diminish our sense of worth. If you rode the subway today, you probably saw at least 200 people who didn't know who you were and didn't care. You were even an annoyance to some of them because you got in their way. We are told - "You're too old, too young, too fat, you don't smell right, you have dandruff, you were late coming to work yesterday - no parking - no left turn - have exact fare - keep off the grass - no smoking - it goes on and on."

Christ observed that the same concern about self worth was held by people 2000 years ago. Long before the advent of big cities or mass marketing He said - "Listen, everybody, God, my father thinks you are so important that He knows and cares about each one of you, individually - by name - the hairs of your heads are numbered." What He was saying was: IN GOD'S EYES YOU'RE A SOMEBODY. Now that we are somebody, we have a few things to think about. First, as leaders and spokesmen for the largest group of Protestants in Canada, we see people full of self doubt flocking to psychiatrists, consuming millions of antidepressant drugs, studying transcendental meditation, transactional analysis; and their concern making the books like "I'm OK, You're OK" a best seller. Evidently we are getting our message across as well as SPEEDY is. Perhaps we have so much good news for modern man that what we select to tell them is not what they most need to know. Secondly, as individuals - if God thinks you are important and I am important we have to assume that He thinks

everybody is important. That is not so good because it forces us to change some of our attitudes towards others. What do we do about the neighbor in the next apartment with the loud stereo - the dol who cuts you off in traffic - the loud ones - the quiet ones - the ones who look funny - or anyone who isn't as normal and competent as we believe we are. Whatever we do, we do

not have the right to diminish something honored by God. Namely their sense of worth and their dignity.

Fortunately any necessary changes will be made in us automatically if we approach everyone with a greeting in our minds "Hi there, in God's eyes and mine, you are a somebody."

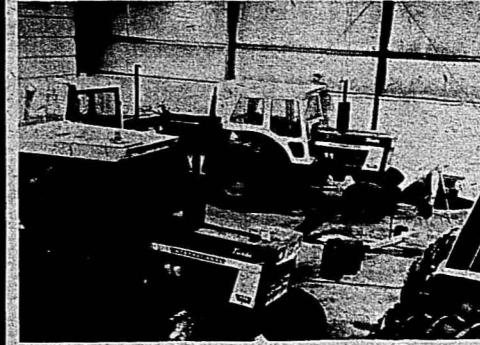

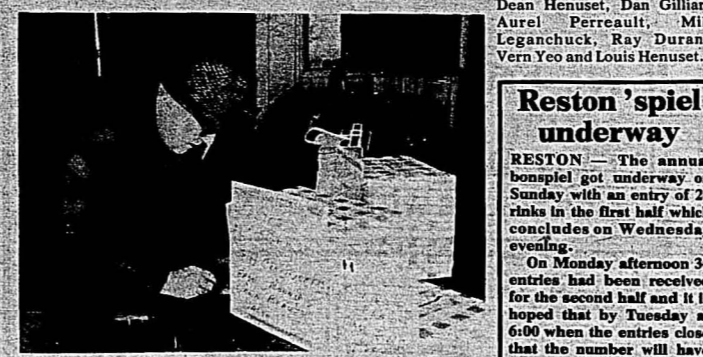
