## Will increase capacity by 120,000 barrels

TORONTO — Interprovincial  
Pipe Line Company announced  
last week that subject to the  
approval of the National Energy  
Board as regards the additional  
facilities in Canada, it has decid-  
ed to increase the capacity of  
its pipe line system in 1973 by  
120,000 b/d to 1,555,000 b/d ex  
Cromer, Manitoba.

This is the maximum increase  
practicable short of commencing  
looping out of Superior, Wiscon-  
sin and will be accomplished by  
fully powering the present two-  
line system out of Superior and  
adding looping and horsepower  
between Edmonton and Superi-  
or and out of Sarnia, Ontario as  
required. Forty - one pumping  
units totalling 114,000 horsepower  
will be added, together with  
225 miles of 48-inch loops be-  
tween Edmonton and Superior  
and 32 miles of 20-inch loops be-  
tween Sarnia and Toronto/Buff-  
alo.

Seven additional receiving  
and breakout tanks will also be  
erected: a follows: one 300,000  
barrel and two 200,000 barrel  
tanks at Edmonton, one 120,000  
barrel tank at Cromer, two 300,000  
barrel tanks at Grifith, In-  
diana, and one 150,000 barrel  
tank at Sarnia. The cost of the  
expansion program is estimated  
at \$116 million.

The company also announced  
a quarterly dividend rate of 25c  
per share payable December 1,  
1972 to shareholders of record  
on November 10th. This is 2c  
per share more than the com-  
pany has been paying.

## CLOUDED JUDGEMENTS

The tragedy in Uganada once again is leading to the kind of talk one hears whenever there are major political upheavals in Africa, Asia and Latin America. Conservative factions are apt to say that people get the kind of government they deserve. If they allow military dictators to run their countries, they must be prepared to put up with all kinds of economic and political disasters. There are dangerous over-simplifications.

The most ill-informed people tend to think that most non-whites are inferior, anyhow, and that if they cut each other's throats — well, that's their business. These attitudes persisted among all too many in North America and Europe during the Nigerian civil war.

All generalizations are suspect, of course. But to adopt a white racist viewpoint toward what happens in the impoverished lands of Africa and Asia is both evil and hypocritical. Indeed, it flies in the face of history. Just over a quarter of a century has passed since the world saw with horror the ghost-like skeletons that sur-

vived the Nazi concentration camps, and heard, at first with total unbelief — how 6,000,000 defenseless Jews had met their deaths. The killers in this greatest atrocity of recent history were white and (so it was said before 1939) highly civilized.

The countless millions who slaughtered each other in two world wars were mostly white. Some of the most outrageous atrocities committed in Vietnam were perpetrated not only by Vietnamese against Vietnamese, but first by the French and then by the Americans.

Nobody would deny that President Idi Amin is an extremely foolish man, and that some of his actions and statements border on insanity. But a specific event and the stupidity of one man must not cloud our judgements. Let us remember instead that every black African who wants his continent to progress from economic backwardness to prosperity and enlightenment, will undoubtedly view what is happening in Uganada with a great deal more distaste than most Canadians.

## STILL MURKY

The latest figures now are that the Liberals have 109 seats to 108 for the Conservatives and 31 for the N. D. P. who hold the balance of power. Further re-counts could, of course, change the situation.

Regardless of the outcome of further recounts, Prime Minister Trudeau will stay in office until his Liberal government meets defeat in the House — when this will happen is out of the control of the prime minister, but happen it will, and the electors

will be at the polls within a reasonably short time.

The election results indicate the cleavage that exists in Canada — the west very decidedly against the Liberal administration and Quebec very definitely opposed to the Conservative party.

It will take people of good-will to heal the cleavage that has grown more pronounced. Whether either of the major political parties can accomplish this is doubtful.

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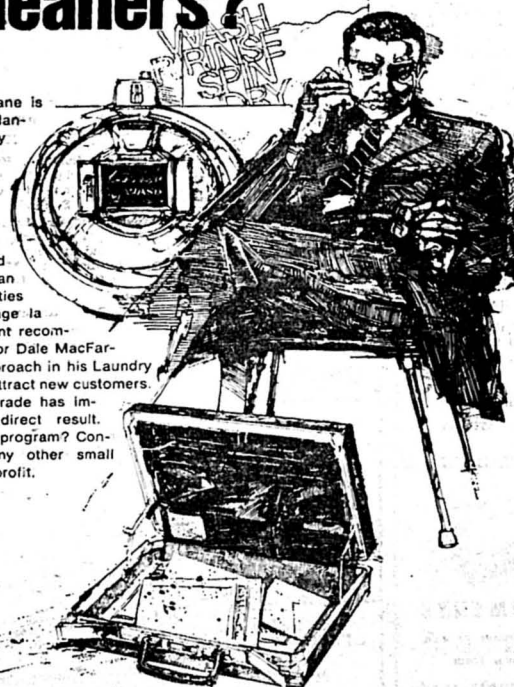

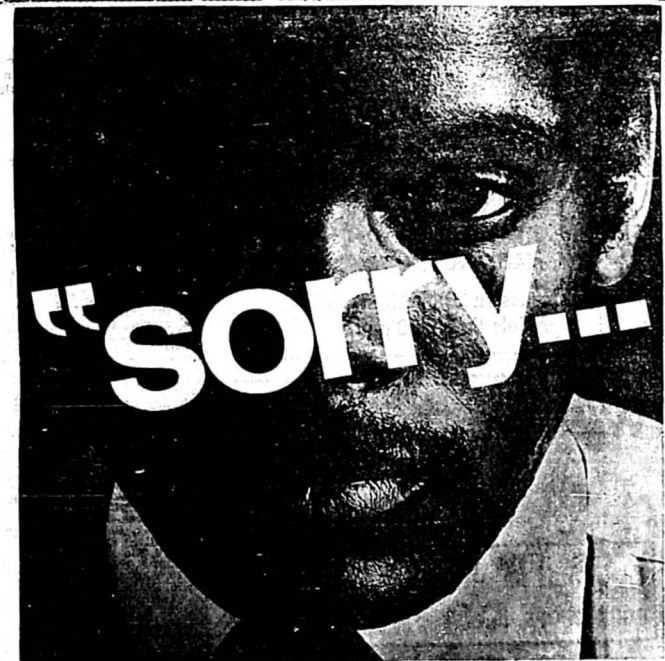
